

From Rev. Lynda Russell

Dear friends,

Here at LMC we are half way through our 'Season of Invitation'. We have been inviting friends, family, and neighbours to come to church with us, to see and experience why we love our church, and to know that God loves them. We don't judge success by how many come along, but by giving out the invitation. Nevertheless, we have been pleased to welcome some visitors, and hope they will come again! The idea is also to learn to be an 'inviting Church' so that we can keep inviting people along long after the 'Season' has finished.

Some people are disillusioned with 'religion' and Church in general, but many people are just waiting to be invited along, and it's these people we have been asking the Holy Spirit to lead us to. In Christ Church we are also planning our own 'Season of Invitation'. We recommend it to other churches.

Our last two services in the series are Advent and Christmas. The waiting which we are faced with in Advent is a time when we prepare ourselves. Before we can be part of the Christmas story we must share in Advent; the time which allows us to reflect on what it means to be part of "the greatest story ever told": the Jesus story. We hope to be able to share this with our visitors.

Advent is the season where we need more than ever to create a space where we can all be encouraged to sit still, a space to ask questions, a space to wonder, a space where - in the darkness of winter - we wait for the coming of the light, the coming of Christ.

"A voice cries out, 'Prepare in the wilderness a road for God'."
Isaiah 40:3

In our society today the Christmas story has often been robbed of its power; our challenge is to allow God to breathe new life into it for those who have become disillusioned, or over-familiar with the story. Or to present it anew in all its power for those visitors who only know parts of it.

From Rev. Kim Plumpton

Dear friends,

Colin and I were given a rare opportunity at the beginning of November. Dad had asked if the boys would like to spend some time with their grandfather, so after dropping them off and seeing family for a short while, Col and I set off for Scotland for four days. It was a dream come true for me as it felt as though it had been such a long time since I had cast my eyes across the majesty of the mountains. Of course autumn colours cascading down the mountains could only add to the glory of such beautiful scenery and we were certainly not disappointed.

On our way up, I asked to visit Rosslyn Chapel just a few miles south of Edinburgh. Built in the 15th century this extraordinary chapel inspired some of Scotland's greatest painters and poets, even Sir Walter Scott penned a poem in 1805. Some have suggested that the architecture of Rosslyn Chapel could be compared to St Peter's Basilica in Rome. My memories of St Peter's are far too hazy to offer any comment but I can say that Rosslyn Chapel is known as one of the most ornate chapels in Europe. The architecture is influenced by its founder William St Clair, the carvings are exceptional, the stone masons were truly extraordinary in replicating exhibits brought back to them from foreign lands.

Rosslyn is of course known by many because it boasts a connection with the DaVinci Code as the final resting place of the Holy Grail. The Knights Templar, the freemasons and the many pagan symbols around the chapel are also part of its historical architecture; a place where the gospel and mystery are entwined. It is a fascinating place, its founder trying to share the Gospel, its magnificent carvings revealing a love and reverence for God but where knowledge and fantasy often overlap. It is a place of intrigue and mystery.

We love a good mystery don't we, so it is not an unfamiliar concept to us. We will of course never explain 'The mystery of God' which tends to encompass the many things we cannot understand about God, but if we could explain everything about an infinite God then we would not be human. Indeed we would be God.

"Christmas introduces us to the paradoxes with which the Gospel is strewn from beginning to end: the infinite God is there in a little child; the Almighty God is present in the weakness of a new-born infant; the Word becomes crying."

God is so much bigger than human comprehension, beyond human logic and beyond our imaginings but it is precisely this mystery that surrounds us at Christmas and even more so at the cross, that draws us closer to understanding what faith truly is. It is precisely our inability to have all the answers that makes us faithful and trusting that there is something beyond human capability, where real hope is offered.

I marvel at God's creative ability to catch us 'on the back foot', unprepared and always surprised by his grace. But in doing so, we often take the next step not in our own strength but in God's.

In a world that likes certainties, may we revel in the mystery that is God made known to us in a small infant child this Christmas and in doing so offer others the marvel of God's love.

Merry Christmas to you all and may God bless you in 2015.



Reclaiming "A Christmas Carol"



It's my favourite book to re-read during Advent, but somewhere amid the red-nosed reindeer and the talking snowmen of the Christmas season, Charles Dickens' beloved classic has been hi-jacked as just another uplifting but essentially secular tale. It is well known that Dickens wrote his "Ghostly little book" in response to the condition of the working class, particularly a report about child labour in mines and factories, his own experience in a shoe-blackening factory while his father was in a debtor's prison, still stark in his

mind. However, thanks to an annotated version in a local charity shop, I've found that the story is littered with clues to the author's Christian beliefs. Throughout the novel, Dickens embedded scriptural references and biblical allusions that are often missed today, but would have been better understood in 1843. These days the "seasonal" cheery music churned out in our high streets are all "carols", but to Victorians a carol was a song or ballad of joy celebrating the birth of Jesus. Dickens extends the carol idea by calling each chapter a "stave", like the stanzas of a song.

Few people realise that the book's anti-hero, Ebenezer Scrooge has a biblical link, as Ebenezer means "Stone of Help" in Hebrew, (*1 Samuel 7:12*). The old English word for a manger, or crèche, was "cratch", from which gave us Bob Cratchit and his family. Tiny Tim, the symbol of the consequences of the Scrooge's choices, says "he hoped people saw him in the church, because he was a cripple, and it might be pleasant to remember upon Christmas Day who made lame beggars walk and blind men see". However he's most famous for saying "God bless us, everyone", which Dickens uses at the end of the story as a blessing on all his readers.

So this year, rather than a pantomime, we'll be at Yvonne Arnaud's Mill Studio during Christmas week for **SCROOGE**, when actor Clive Francis will bring this covetous old sinner to life.

MWiB "Dalit" Coffee Morning



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There will be a coffee morning in aid of **Methodist Women in Britain's Dalit Project** at **Effingham Chapel** from **10.30am to 12.30pm on Saturday 24th January**. Come and find out more about this project which is part of MWiB's five-year focus (2011-2016) on caste discrimination and the treatment of millions of Dalit people around the world. Perhaps more familiar as "untouchables" within the Indian caste system, discrimination has been outlawed, but still widely practised.

Most Christians in India are Dalits (up to 85-90% of the Church of North India). Dalit Christians (and Muslims) face double discrimination as quota schemes to provide opportunities for Dalits are only available to Dalits of the Hindu, Buddhist or Sikh faiths. Communities are denied education, and make up 70% of prostitutes in India. So called "honour killings", murder, rape, kidnap and abductions are common.

But resistance to all these situations is rising. MWiB aim to raise awareness of this worldwide problem and help local partners in India and other Asian countries to stop this cycle of hatred and abuse.

We are grateful that Archbishop Welby and Pope Francis have already spoken out about the issue, but we need them to keep doing so on behalf of the worldwide Church, especially when they meet with other church and political leaders.

This will add weight to the advocacy work we will be doing at the individual country level."

Another successful season of lunchtime concerts at LMC and Christ Church.

By the time you read this we'll have had our closing concert of two accordion players, one from Poland, one from Russia, both studying at the Royal Academy of Music. A lot of our players are RAM students, some are former students, and some of the more experienced professionals - Jacqueline Phillips (cello), Lynda Chang and Peter Bailey (both piano) for example - studied at RAM as well.

We enjoy our concerts in LMC. The Church is the right shape and size for our style of "chamber music" concert. The combination of the comfy chairs and soft carpeting is offset by the harder surfaces of the walls and windows, and then there is the excellent roof structure. The result is a pleasing room with excellent acoustics for both performer and listener.


It has been a year of so many musical highlights that it is difficult to pick out a favourite concert. Although, finding my 60th birthday fell on a Thursday, I did cheekily ask for mezzo-soprano Georgia Knower and guitarist Fabricio Mattos to perform that day. There was birthday cake too!

In August we heard a lute, and that player brought an archlute (it has bass strings beside the others), and we also had a visit from a theorbo player - as tall as a double bass, with even lower bass strings than the archlute. Our audience members are now lute family experts!

We have also heard singers, piano, harpsichord, harp, guitars, violins, violas, cellos, viola da gamba, clarinets, bassoons, flutes, piccolos, recorders, we even risked a French horn one week, and of course, those accordions. At Christ Church we have heard the organ from its softest, most restrained registration, to pulling out (almost) all the stops; and we have heard the instrument accompanying flautist Emily Andrews, and cellist Anna Tam.

Occasionally we have a player for whom the cross on the wall, the fact that they are about to play in an active Church, have a real significance. So it was for a South Korean violinist who brought her Mother, brother and a couple of friends along. It turned out that the Chinese pianist accompanying her was a member of a central London church too.

Each week a few members of Leatherhead Art Club come along and sketch as the musicians perform. Capturing movement when you can't shout out "could you just do that again" turns out to be very difficult. Then there is Peter Horsfield who often sends in a poem inspired by a concert. We put these two together recently and have produced an anthology of Peter's poems called *Bassoonatic, and Other Poems*, with illustrations by Diana King. Les Prescott has copies for sale, as does Barton's Bookshop.





Dear Friends,

I have recently cancelled my subscription to a magazine called "History Revealed". I've enjoyed browsing through the contents, but at such a slow rate that the initial subscription offer has been enough to give me reading material for a long while yet.

What is it that people find interesting about history? There's the academic approach: the pleasure of discovering new facts about the past. For example, I already knew that Hannibal journeyed across the Alps with elephants. I now know that amongst his army of thousands there were only 37 battle elephants, and all but one died on the journey.

There's the celebratory approach: any excuse for a party, sometimes with little relationship to historical events. I'm writing this on 5th November and I suspect that people setting off fireworks in the distance are more interested in pretty explosions than in an historical terrorist attack on Parliament.

There's the pragmatic approach: learning useful lessons from the past that will inspire and guide us in our lives today. There are some wonderful role models for us scattered throughout history.

And there's the personal relationship approach: getting to know people better by understanding how they used to live. Well-written historical fiction can be good at this. Reading Azincourt (by Bernard Cornwell) gave me a real sense of what it would have been like to be an archer in battle. But even better is a face to face conversation. A few years ago I had a fascinating chat with my mother about her life as a typist in the telegram business.

Christianity is an historical faith, based on certain key events two thousand years ago. We will soon be marking the birth of a baby called Jesus. This is the moment God himself entered history. So what will our approach be?

We might focus on the facts, of which there are relatively few. Much of the traditional nativity story is based on later embellishments to the gospel accounts, but learning to distinguish the two could be instructive. We might focus on enjoying the celebration. Food, drink, family, decorations, parties, presents, more food, more drink – what's not to like? We might look for meaning in the story which we can apply to our lives today. The nativity story raises issues about homelessness, devotion, trust, humility, commitment, vulnerability, divine guidance and many other important topics. *(continued on the back page)*

Update from the LMC & Christ Church Working Groups

The Mission Group

This is the group which is looking at our Mission Statement, and the most important of all things – why are we (as a church) here? Why has God placed us here? What does God require of us?

This is the most basic of questions, and one which we must answer before we do anything else. When we are able to articulate what we believe our mission is, and the most important elements of who we are and what we do, then we will be able to move forward with prayerful confidence, guided by the Holy Spirit in every step.

Over the summer the LMC Leadership Team and Christ Church Elders spent a Saturday morning working with Martin Hayward, the URC Southern Synod Mission Enabler. He went through some of these things with us, asking us again some searching questions, including 'why are we choosing to come together as one church?'

We looked at some reasons why churches decline, and how and why others might grow. You have already seen at least one small result from this with the 'Welcome Card' that Carol designed and we have had printed for visitors to LMC. Of course the "Season of Invitation" is another one, although we were already thinking about that. We need to ensure that this 'culture of inviting' continues long after the 'Season' finishes.

The Mission Group is now working very hard on a specific Mission Statement. This will be followed by what we might call Mission 'criteria'; in other words - how we believe we are called to fulfil the mission we have been given. This will probably then be more specifically short term, medium term, long term. What do we think God's Church in this place might look like... and how will we get there? Who should we work alongside, who should we partner with? Of course all this planning is and must be founded and rooted in prayer. We read in Psalm 127:1:

Unless the LORD builds the house,
the builders labour in vain.

Unless the LORD watches over the city,
the guards stand watch in vain.

When this work has been completed we will set up a meeting for everyone from both churches to come together to discuss our mission. We hope this will be at the beginning of March.

We should then be in a position to move forward, with our Mission Plan determining the location and type of building we need for the future.

[The Mission Plan is also vital in order to allow us to contact our respective organisations (URC Finance dept.; Methodist TMCP) with a view to finding a definitive answer to what % of property sales they would retain / allow us to invest in our forward mission.]

This is a very exciting time for us all. We have given this part of the process the time it deserves. We can move forward in faith that our God goes before us.

Churches Uniting

This group is about to organise another meeting, and will report back in the next copy of The Link. It has been agreed that the current pattern of monthly united worship will be continued.

It is hoped that some social events can be organised in the spring, particularly some which are more family-friendly.

Finance and CPL Report Group

This group has finished its work for the moment, and awaits the Mission Plan to be able to contact the URC and Methodist Church central organisations.



Principal points made at the Leadership Team meeting held on 30th November.

Pastoral Update: The pastoral leaders prayer meeting is changing to the fourth Tuesday afternoon at 2.30pm in the New Year. We are going to develop a community roll to keep contact with people who come to church activities but are not members.

Finance: Our overall income has reduced by £2500 in collections and our Circuit assessment is going up by £3000 in this next year. Ecumenical: New Fire is going well with increased interest. The Covenant review has not yet begun and is hopefully going to start in the New Year.

7th - 12th April 2015 - ECG!

Let's go on holiday together!

John and I have been going to 'ECG' for the last six years since it began. ECG is a kind of successor to 'Easter People' (or something like 'Spring Harvest') albeit on a much smaller scale. It's led by NXT Ministries, based at Stoke on Trent Burslem Methodist Church, and it takes place during the week after Easter.

Many people ask what ECG means; of course they mainly associate it with a heart rate test. Well that was where the idea came from:

ECG – A Heart for the Nations: Equipping, Calling, Going

- **Equipping** today's generations to bring in God's Kingdom.
- **Calling** Christians to discover and renew God's unique vision and purpose for their lives.
- **Going** to serve, love and lead into discipleship those who don't yet know Jesus Christ.

ECG is an event which sets out to equip local churches for their mission in the world and their local context, through teaching and worship (and fun), and also through their Children and Youth programmes (which are excellent). Many people go along for the week, and come back to their home churches refreshed and renewed, but also with new ideas and even skills to put into practice. The worship is uplifting, and would feel familiar, and the Bible teaching is outstanding.

Of course you can go to as many or as few of the sessions as you want – and there's always the seaside at Scarborough, and the surrounding area to enjoy for those who aren't so keen to join in the event, for which there is absolutely no pressure!

You can stay in whatever accommodation suits your budget and your taste: – from a 'Kibbutz' (like indoor camping – in a local church. Bring your own camp beds and sleeping bags: £20/per person for the whole week!) – to self catering; to a local hotel (of which there are many of different qualities and prices).

The price for adults is currently £90 for the whole week (Tuesday to Sunday), but this will go up nearer the time. There may be some help available if anyone wants to go but finds the prices difficult.

JMA Update

For many years, the children and young people at LMC have collected money for JMA. And many of the adults have enjoyed contributing month by month and seeing them collect their "medals" every year.



Money for Nothing at Christ Church (*but not by Dire Straits!*)

Reclaimed Gift Aid is an important part of our annual Church income.

How it works: The church claims back from the Inland Revenue the basic rate tax paid by the donor. So providing you are a taxpayer, for every £1 you give, the Inland Revenue gives us 25p. All you have to do is fill in a Gift Aid form obtainable from Michael Chamberlain. It's easy, you don't have to commit to a long period of giving, and you can leave the scheme at any time.

URC Southern Synod Together 8th November 2014 at Caterham School

Southern Synod Moderator, Revd Nicola Furley-Smith led the opening worship on the theme of 'Growing Disciples', after which Kingston URC were presented with a Child Friendly Church Award. Nick White, Children's and Youth Development Officer was bade farewell.

The morning's business included:

Synod Council Report included agreement to:

- Hold 2 full day Synod meetings per year from 2015, 14th March and 10th October;
- Focus priorities as a Synod on assisting congregations in Growing Disciples.

Ministries Committee reported on:

Team Ministry, Workloads and training for Interim Moderators.

Introduced material for use on Vocations Sunday entitled 'Spice of Life'.

Finance:

The Treasurer presented the accounts, which showed a surplus due to the sale of property, along with the budget for 2015, which was accepted. The manse fund is healthy at present. Thanks were given to churches for their M&M contributions; however General Assembly has asked that churches increase their giving to M&M by 1%.

Changes to the Synod Manse Policy following a recent review were proposed by the Property Committee and agreed upon.

Synod Clerk's Items included:

- General Assembly asks congregations for their views on same sex marriage in URC Churches. Facilitators from the Synod are available to churches.
- It was agreed that a Children's and Youth Development Officer would be sought to replace Nick White.
- Churches are asked to offer nominations for Moderators of General Assembly 2016 –2018.
- CCLI – churches should be careful about copyright.

In the celebration of Jubilee Ministers Revd Robert Blows was presented with a certificate in recognition of 50 years as a Minister of Word and Sacrament. (We are very grateful that Robert continues to lead worship in a number of churches in the area including Christ Church).

In the afternoon John Ellis Lay Moderator of General Assembly challenged the meeting on the Theme of Growing Disciples. His text was Matthew 28 verses 18 – 20: ‘...go and **make disciples** of all nations, **baptising them** in the name of the father, Son and of the Holy Spirit and **teaching them** to obey everything that I have commanded you.’ Highlighting visits that he has made on behalf of the URC, he made the following points:

- Discipleship leads to Mission, which includes Evangelism – many of our churches find this difficult.
- Keeping the show on the road is all absorbing so it is easier not to think about Evangelism.
- URC is spreading its ministers too thinly.
- Advocated the scalability of pastorates – expansion or contraction as necessary.
- The whole church life should not depend on the minister.
- In the future lay people should lead the congregation and a minister would be a bonus.

John led the closing worship leaving us with much food for thought.

CAROLLING IN FROSTY AIR

Christmas and carols go together. You can't have one without the other. It would require a high degree of ingenuity for anyone to get through the Christmas season without hearing a carol - and probably singing one, too. They're on the speakers in the supermarket, they're on the radio, carol singers come round the streets singing them, the brass band plays them in the market place - and, of course, there's the church carol service, the crib service and the midnight communion. Most of us could name lots of them: Hark the Herald, Good King Wenceslas, In the Bleak Midwinter, Away in a Manger, Once in Royal David's City . . . and so on.

Some of those carols are very old, some relatively modern. They're perhaps the only Christian songs we actually know the words of - but familiarity can breed if not contempt, then at least inattention. Occasionally in those familiar lines we sing absolute nonsense: 'In the bleak midwinter, frosty wind made moan, earth stood hard as iron' - in *Bethlehem*? 'Little Lord Jesus, no crying he makes' - so the baby Jesus wasn't human after all? 'And io, io, io by priest and people sungen'? No, not a bad case of the stutters, but a medieval carol-writer's mischievous description of the mumbo-jumbo of incomprehensible Latin in church.

We've been spared other bafflement by the work of editors. Charles Wesley's first line was originally 'Hark how all the welkin rings' - no 'herald angels'. 'Welkin' comes from an Old English word meaning 'heaven' and has absolutely nothing to do with shell-fish. But enough of problems. On the whole carols are wonderfully clear in their message and profoundly moving in a simple and touching way. The last verse of 'Once in Royal David's City' always moves me:

*Not in that poor lowly stable, with the oxen standing by, we shall see him;
but in heaven, set at God's right hand on high.* Trust Mrs Alexander to get it exactly right. And Christina Rossetti's last verse asks a question so searching that her meteorological musings fade into thin air:

*What shall I give him, poor as I am? if I were a shepherd, I would bring a
lamb; if I were a wise man, I would do my part; yet what I can I give him -
give my heart.*
