

The Ministers Write...



From Rev. Ian Howarth

Dear Friends,

When historians look back at the year 2011, I wonder what they will write. Even without the benefit of hindsight the events of the year suggest a time of major change and uncertainty for our world.

Some of the changes hold signs of hope for freedom and progress. The Arab spring that has seen the end of the regimes in Egypt, Tunisia and Libya has challenged dictatorship and corruption, but the questions remain whether what replaces it will in the long term live up to the hope and optimism that first greeted the demise of the leaders. Meanwhile in Syria and Yemen opposition movements have been brutally put down.

Closer to home, the financial crisis of Europe and the move away from democratic governments in Italy and Greece, serves to increase anxiety for many. Will our banking system survive and safeguard our savings? Will our jobs be secure and will our children and grandchildren be able to get the careers that they have worked hard for through their education? What does it mean for the main financial power in the world to move towards China?

It does seem we are on the verge of significant shifts of power and wealth in our world, over which we have no control, and whose outcomes are uncertain at best.

As Christians how do we engage with this? We cannot withdraw into a spiritual bubble and pretend it will go away, or claim it is not our concern.

There are no easy answers, but as we move into Advent we remember that Jesus came into a world that was also at a time of deep uncertainty, with a new Roman empire taking over from Greek dominance. He came into a Roman colony which was maintained by a corrupt puppet King Herod, and vicious proconsuls like Pontius Pilate.

He came into that troubled world as a vulnerable child who grew up to proclaim God's kingdom of love, justice and peace in his words and in his actions and to offer new life and hope to all.

In Advent we pray 'Come, Lord Jesus, Come' in the faith that God has not abandoned His world, and in Christ, in ways beyond our understanding he will come again to redeem it.

Meanwhile, we have to live out our prayer and be ready for his coming, working in our uncertain world for the values of God's kingdom, confident that through the Holy Spirit, God still offers us new life and hope to enable us to live purposefully for him as God's people in God's world.

From Rev. Kim Plumpton

Dear Friends,

Looking through my advent resources I came across an article I had chosen to keep for further reflection and thought I might share it with you. It is part of a sermon written by Barbara Brown Taylor, American theologian and preacher.

"What better way to live than in the grip of a promise? To wake in the possibility that today might be the day. To remain wide awake all day long, noticing everything - the shade of the olive tree, how the smell of the fields processes from east to west, and how the smell of the fields changes from green grass to yellow hay and the sun heats up overhead. To search the face of every stranger in case it turns out to be the angel of God. To take nothing for granted. Or to take everything as granted, though not yet grasped. To handle every moment of one's life as a seed of the promise and to plant it tenderly, never knowing if this moment, or the next, may be the one that grows.

To live in this way is to discover that God is always blessing us. It does not come in the future if we only have the patience to wait. It has not already come to those of us who are older and have lived more of life than what is to come. The blessing and the promises of God are now. It may not be fully realized or fully in hand, but we are called to live with a laughing hope in God's promise today."

It is so beautifully written and it reminded me that within the intensity of Christmas preparations we often forget that we serve a God who continually breaks into our world by offering us the promise of hope, peace, joy and love. The anticipated arrival of a messiah caught many by surprise, off guard, unprepared, unaware of the consequences. But we can anticipate with excitement and joy the arrival of God in the everyday, the world around us, in our encounters, that the world is transformed daily by the presence of Christ with us. It is so easy to be swept away by the commercialism of Christmas, to spend huge amounts of money on unwanted presents. I love Christmas like most people, but we shouldn't need Christmas to remind us of God's goodness and graciousness in sending Christ to be with us. We should live in a perpetual state of thankfulness, recognising that God continually meets us with a promise of so much more than we can imagine.

May God bless us all this Christmas with an awareness of his activity in the world in greater and more exciting and unimaginable ways.

Well, we woke up on Boxing Day to at least a foot of snow, which meant Auntie couldn't drive home. In fact everyone was snowed-in for over a week as we lived in a cul-de-sac. The turkey and gammon sustained us throughout the arctic freeze, and were re-hashed as turkey sandwiches for lunch, turkey fricassee, turkey fritters, turkey curry and finally turkey soup.

Truly a case of God will provide.

Eventually Dad managed to walk the mile to the station and returned to work, and our visitors braved the trip back home.



Within the ecumenical partnership of Christ Church, Leatherhead Parish Church and Leatherhead Methodist Church, there is plenty on offer for families who wish to help their children remember the real meaning of Christmas. Here are some of the highlights:

Sunday 4th December, 4.00pm: expect a full house for the **Christingle** service at the **Parish Church**. Sometimes referred to as the "first tingle of Christmas", the Christingle is a highly popular start to the Advent season.

Sunday 11th December, 10:30am: enjoy an all-age **Family Carol and Gift Service** at **Christ Church**, along with members of 1st Leatherhead Beavers, Cubs, Brownies, Scouts and Guides.

Thursday 15th December, 3:30pm to 5:30pm: Messy Church for Christmas takes place at Leatherhead Methodist Church. Messy Church is for adults and children to enjoy together – visitors are very welcome to join us for a mince pie and a cuppa.

Sunday 18th December, 10:30am: Another all-age **Family Carol Service**, this time at **Leatherhead Methodist Church,** including a nativity presentation from the children of "LMC Discoverers".

There will also be special end of term services for the children of **Leatherhead Trinity School & Children's Centre** at All Saints Church (Reception), Leatherhead Methodist Church (Juniors) and Christ Church (Infants). Parents and Church members are welcome – contact Jane Smith for more details.

Finally, at **4.00pm on Christmas Eve,** families will gather again at the **Parish Church** for **Blessing the Crib and Carols for the Family**. A wonderful invitation to pause and focus on God With Us, as we lead into the big day itself!

Make sure you join us at one or more of these services, especially if you have children or grandchildren in tow. If you can't make it to the one at "your" church, why not try somewhere different? It's good to share the celebrations together!

On Wednesday, 2nd November, I attended a meeting to learn more about the churches' response to the request from the Police for Street Pastors in Leatherhead. Our main speaker heads up the Street Pastors' work in Kingston, which has been operational since 2003.

Street Pastors are a well established organisation. They send out groups of trained volunteers to help and assist vulnerable people who are using our towns. They are not there to preach or judge, just show the love of Jesus through their caring.

We did not have Police representation at the meeting, so we are not clear which groups of people, or which parts of Leatherhead, Street Pastors would be most useful. However, we learned that each Street Pastor would need to complete 50 hours of training, at a cost of £300, which could begin in March or September. Uniforms bearing a logo consist of a shirt, jacket and peak cap and need to be bought. The scheme needs to be headed by a steering group containing representatives from each participating church.

The benefits seen elsewhere are a reduction in crime and a Church which is welcomed and respected. Being a Christian based scheme, the Church does what the Local Authority and Police cannot do in engaging with people and changing hearts.

There are four roles where people are required:-

- 1. Those who will train as Street Pastors; wear the uniform and go out in groups of four.
- 2. Prayer Pastors who will commit themselves to pray while the teams are out.
- 3. Pray-at-home pastors with a regular commitment.
- 4. Fundraisers.

At this early stage, let us pray that interested people will come forward to find out more about these four roles. We ask that God will go before us as preparation and training are undertaken and decisions are made about where the need is greatest, to serve Him by caring, listening and helping. 

Collision of Worlds

We have all been taken up with the dilemma surrounding St. Paul's in the last few weeks. The cathedral hierarchy have had to rethink their priorities in the wake of unwelcome media coverage. Not that we - URC and Methodists - should be complacent. How would we respond to alien campers brandishing placards saying "Where would Jesus be?" Of course the protesters do not have a coherent solution. But what they have done is to make the church embrace the moral/political/economic issues of the city marketplace. The church has now shown that it can do its daily work and be involved in protest too.

I find a similar possibility of fusion in the debate over evolution. Recent discoveries are pushing our knowledge further back in time. We now know that life has existed for hundreds of thousands of years, and that man himself has evolved through neanderthals to the human being we know today. So where was God in this? If he created the universe, why did he wait so long to form a relationship with man? When exactly did He intervene? Was there meaningful dialogue before Abraham? We may never know, but I sit comfortably with that. Scientific discovery is exciting, and increases our knowledge of who we are. Equally to me, the Christian revelation of a benevolent, loving God, revealed in the person of Jesus Christ, makes sense of the here and now.

Even if the Large Hadron Collider explodes the theory of relativity, with its mystic equation E=MC², I can live with that too. It never has kept me awake at nights!

The strength of Christianity is its ability to absorb knowledge and respond to situations, however unexpected. We should never try to ignore the truths on our doorsteps.






