The Ministers Write...



From Rev. Ian Howarth

Dear Friends,

In Leatherhead it has been good to share in some inspiring joint activities between LMC and Christ Church over the Christmas and New Year period, from our Christmas Day service, through the New Year social and the Covenant service. The two churches are now considering how we build on that sharing as we look to the future. We have had the first of our joint sessions on Radical Welcome and a small group from both churches is considering how we conduct the Local Mission and Ministry review which United Reformed Churches have to undergo, and see how we can use it as a tool for planning our way forward.

More generally, colleagues in the Methodist South East District have pointed to me to some work by a German evangelist, Christian Schwartz, which proposes eight qualities that go to make up a healthy church, and which all churches ought to be working towards. I am quite suspicious of such formulae, but think this might be a helpful framework for us to bear in mind.

The eight qualities are (in no particular order of priority):

- Empowering leadership
- Gift-orientated lay ministry
- Passionate Spirituality
- Functional Structures
- Inspiring worship services
- Holistic small groups
- Need-orientated evangelism
- Loving relationships

Schwartz stresses that the important word in each quality is the first one, the adjective which describes the quality of what is going on. He also says that the strength of the weakest quality is what determines the overall health of the church.

Seven of them can be wonderful but if one is not in place, then the church is not healthy and will not grow. It challenges us to work out the priorities we need to work on in our churches over the coming year.

I say that in the context of believing that the Holy Spirit is moving all our churches on, in creative and positive ways, as we go forward into the future. May we be open to go where God leads us in the days to come.

From Rev. Kim Plumpton

Dear Friends,

I took a trip to Windermere on a training course recently (I know a minister's life is never easy). Going through the dales after visiting mum in Harrogate, the ground was covered in that icy frosting but the scenery was just beautiful, with the sun blazing through the clear blue sky. It took me back so many years before when the scenery had been the same but far less inviting. Back in the late 70's, I had made part of this journey by bicycle on one that had taken me nearly two years to save for. With 5-speed gears, this men's racing bike had caught my eye at an exhibition and I was determined that one day I would own it.

On the day I bought it, even though I had not ridden a bike since I was 12, I announced to my father that I intended to take a trip to York, a 42 mile round trip. As far as I was concerned this bike would enable me to explore the very countryside I had come to love. My father really didn't know what to make of me but had far more to say when I suggested that I make a trip to Skipton the following week. A longer journey, this would take me through the dales, through a terrain that was markedly different from the relatively flat road to York.

Long and winding roads, literally up and down dale, with some difficult hills to climb, it would mean the journey would not be an easy one, but I was up for the challenge. I set off with enough money to buy a drink at Skipton and very little else. It took me over two hours to get there and after a short walk around I decided it was time to return home.

The weather got increasingly worse with dark clouds looming and the threat of a downpour. The dales are a wild place when the weather turns and before I knew it I was cycling in a storm with wind and heavy rain. There's one place along the way which is particularly bleak in those conditions and I stopped at the top wondering how on earth I would ever get home. Thunder bounced noisily across the dales followed by bright flashes of lightening; there seemed to be no break in the storm. Fewer and fewer cars seemed to pass me by until it seemed as though I was out there all alone. Huddled at the side of the road curled up in my mack, with the rain bouncing off my legs, a car pulled up. I realised it was my dad who had come searching for me knowing that the weather had turned so stormy. I was so glad to see him and as he strapped the bike to the top of the car, I was grateful that someone had cared enough about me to come searching for me when things had become so difficult.

It strikes me that we can trust in a God who searches for us when we are lost, who holds us when we struggle with difficult and complex situations. We are not abandoned but held, carried until we can stand again. This is our God, one that wishes to protect us from all that might harm us, who negotiates the journey through life with us and never leaves us alone.

"Do not fear, for I have redeemed you; I have summoned you by name; you are mine. When you pass through the waters, I will be with you; and when you pass through the rivers, they will not sweep over you. When you walk through the fire, you will not be burned; the flames will not set you ablaze. For I am the LORD your God, the Holy One of Israel, your Saviour; I give Egypt for your ransom, Cush and Seba in your stead. Since you are precious and honoured in my sight, and because I love you." (from Isaiah 43).

How wonderful!!!

Introducing Ministerial Development Review

As disciples we all want to offer our best to God. As part of a community of disciples we all want to encourage and support one another in becoming the best we can be for God.

That is why this year your minister will be taking part in a new process of Ministerial Development Review. It will probably happen without most of you knowing when it is happening, but it's important that you should be aware of the ways in which the church tries to support your minister and what you can do to offer support as well. This is what Martyn Atkins, the General Secretary of the Methodist Church has written:

Ministerial Development Review has its roots in the Church's responsibility to support its ministers, and in the Conference's specific desire to provide a structured means for ministers to reflect on and review their ministry.

A key feature of Ministerial Development Review is the annual review meeting – a significant event which provides an important opportunity for ministers to share their reflections, insights and hopes with others who have a responsibility for their well-being and for their growth in ministry (one other minister and a lay person). But whilst the organisation and facilitation of the review meeting is a key task, Ministerial Development Review is about much more than this. At its core, it is not an annual event but an ongoing process of collaborative reflection and learning, of reshaping ministry in the light of experience and feedback, of sharing and addressing blockages to progress and growth, and of celebrating successes and affirming gifts and graces.

It is my hope that Ministerial Development Review will strengthen the Christian ministry in which we share, and help us all as we focus on our prayerful and active intention to be a discipleship movement shaped for mission.

You can all help by regularly praying for the ministers in your circuit and their families. To realise that you are being prayed for by someone, sometimes without asking, can be very affirming. You may be asked to give some feedback about some area of your minister's work. You will have been asked because your minister and those helping them in the review value your insights. If you are asked, it's an opportunity for you to encourage your minister to be the best they can be for God.

When we came to Cobham in August 2010 it was a massive change to where we had lived for ten years in Birmingham. Especially when you consider all the problems a city brings with it - the number of outcasts in society with addiction, health, social and homeless issues.

After a few weeks of our arrival I heard about the Pitstop charity and decided to get involved. Now here we are one year on and I thought it would be good to give you an update. We now have a lot of Christian input at the trustee and volunteer level, people are not preaching the gospel but are living out the gospel in the truest of ways by being there for those in need. People from Pitstop are opening up about their own faith walk, which is a great opportunity to listen and discuss with them at length issues of life and faith. As well as this, I have had discussions with a few homeless people and found that there is a need for tents and sleeping bags as a separate service to that which Pitstop offers.

Due to the love of God working through church people we have so far been able to meet the needs of several people in the area so that they can at least be warm and dry. Just because we are in a fairly affluent area of the UK, there are still many people who are in desperate situations who need our help. Thank you for those who have chosen to support this work; I will write at a later date and let you know how things are going. Your prayers would be greatly appreciated.

Prayer Walking

"Prayer is an integral element of the Christian faith and permeates all forms of Christian worship."

In many situations we find that prayer is one of the most precious tools we can use to communicate to God our joys as well as our concerns. A sacred space where we might take time to listen for God speaking to us.

There are all sorts of ways in which we might consider how and where we might communicate with God. One such way is prayer walking. This is simply what it suggests, walking around a particular town/village whilst praying for the community. In Effingham last year a group from Churches Together began prayer walking the village. As an example, it might be that we begin by walking towards the shops, in which case we might consider the struggles and difficulties experienced by all those in the retail industry with particular reference to those in our own community.

You might say I can do this from my home, so why is it important to walk? Actually making the physical movement around the village focuses the mind and will actually allow you to consider areas for prayer which you may well not have thought of had you not been standing right in front of a particular building or communal space.

It is a wonderful opportunity for prayer so if you feel this might be something you would like to experience then please join us on the **14th February at 2.00pm** (meeting at the entrance to St Lawrence Church). We will spend time in prayer and reflection for approximately an hour; all are welcome and we would be delighted to see you.

On another note concerning prayer, we would like to bring to your attention the fact that the village has **a Prayer Box** (on the wall by the entrance to the Methodist Church). The prayers are gathered regularly and offered confidentially in prayer over a period of weeks. There may be many in the community who are unaware that the prayer box exists so please encourage those you know that we are a community that acknowledges the power of prayer and the benefits for those we pray for.

What the Dickens!

There's been a lot of Dickens on TV over the last few weeks. From several film versions of "Scrooge", a documentary about his marriage to the much wronged Mrs. Dickens, to a new attempt to finish his unfinished novel. The entertainment world has endeavoured to translate Dickens's immortal stories to the screen since "silent movie" days. The oldest surviving film version is an adaptation of *A Christmas Carol* from 1901. Over a hundred years later, his works are still being adapted for cinema and TV and every one of his 15 novels has been filmed at least twice. This is very appropriate as Dickens believed that enriching people's lives with knowledge and enjoyment of the arts was key to building a fair society and creating opportunities.


On 7th February, Westminster Abbey will celebrate the bicentenary of the birth of **Charles Dickens**, one of Britain's greatest writers, with a wreath-laying in Poet's Corner. On the Abbey's website The Dean of Westminster said: 'Dickens's humanity and compassion made an extraordinary impact on Victorian England through his writings, which remain immensely popular. This bicentenary should help renew our commitment to improving the lot of the disadvantaged of our own day.'

Meanwhile **Occupy**, an international protest movement which is primarily directed against economic and social inequality, with 2,773 communities worldwide as of January 2012, set up camps in several cathedrals last year. This week Exeter and Sheffield are again threatening eviction, but the camp on the steps of St Paul's Cathedral drags on, and the dilemma facing the church authorities intensifies. The protest is not against the Church as such but just happens to be located on its doorsteps, so that it cannot avoid taking sides to some degree in the confrontation between the protestors and the City. The protest is forcing an uncomfortable re-examination of every Church's social conscience as the gap between rich and poor widens. Finding answers to this dilemma will require both wisdom and courage.

Can our government and churchmen rise to this?

Who was Valentine?





The first official St Valentine's Day was declared on 14th February by Pope Galasius in 496 AD, in memory of a 3rd century martyred priest in Rome. It is believed that this young priest rose to distinction after betraying Emperor Claudius in 270AD by conducting illegitimate wedding ceremonies in the capital.

Emperor Claudius claimed that married men made poor soldiers and consequently decreed that all marriages of younger citizens would be outlawed. Bishop Valentine, however, maintained that marriage was part of God's plan and purpose for the world. He continued to conduct marriages in secret between young people, sometimes as young as twelve, in the name of love.

His success gained him unwelcome notoriety, which became Bishop Valentine's downfall. He was jailed and ultimately beheaded, but not before he fell in love with the jailer's daughter. It is thought that on the evening of his execution the bishop passed her a note which read "from your Valentine". This story has blossomed into the defining tradition of Valentine's Day.

An estimated one billion cards are sent each year, making it the second largest card-sending event of the year behind Christmas.

Women's World Day of Prayer

Friday 2nd March

"Let Justice Prevail"

This year's service has been prepared by the Christian women of Malaysia. Malaysia lies just north of the Equator in the South China Sea and enjoys hot and humid climate associated with such regions.

From times BC the peninsula has been inhabited by the indigenous Orang Asli. In the 17th century, under Dutch rule, it became a flourishing trading area, followed by British rule in the late 1800's. After various different forms of government, it achieved independence in 1957, with Singapore, off the southern tip, breaking away to become an independent state in its own right in 1965. During World War II, Japan occupied Malaya, when conditions became extremely brutal and many people were killed. Following the Japanese surrender at the end of the war, Malaya was returned to the British.

The tropical rainforest of the area is the world's largest and most endangered ecosystem. The forest is home to spectacular plants, animals, birds, butterflies and insects.

Malaysia is a multi-cultural society. Although there is acute unemployment, the government is making huge efforts to overcome it, and poverty too. An expanding tourist trade is helping. Primary education is compulsory but not secondary level although five year courses are offered leading up to GCSE standard. All classes are taught in Bahasa Malaysia, with English as a foreign language. Only a very small proportion of the population is Christian (7%), and Roman Catholicism is the dominant denomination. The ecumenical Council of Churches interacts between church and state and organises the Women's World Day of Prayer in Malaysia.

In recent years Malaysian women have made important contributions both socially and financially. They are becoming better educated and many become doctors, dentists, lawyers and politicians. In spite of this progress, women of all races and classes still face discrimination and even violence.

Malaysia's multi-ethnicity forms a rich heritage for its land and people, yet there are still a great many problems and challenges to overcome.

Let Justice Prevail

On Friday 2nd March over 3 million people worldwide will be praying and worshipping together during an annual day of prayer, using a form of worship prepared this year by Christian women in Malaysia.

Jean Hackett, president of the National Committee of the Women's World Day of Prayer movement in England, Wales and Northern Ireland, said: "This is always an exciting day as a great wave of prayer sweeps the world, beginning when the first service is held in the Queen Salote Girls' School in Tonga and continuing around the world until the final service takes place, some 35 hours later, in neighbouring Western Samoa. By then the day will have been celebrated in over 170 countries and more than 6000 services will have been held in the British Isles alone.

"Although Malaysia's multi-ethnicity has added to the rich heritage of its land and people, it has also given rise to many problems. In the service those issues of concern are named and the women voice their hope for the future. Justice for all is their hope. And their prayer is "Let Justice Prevail".

Although organised and led by women, this is essentially a day of prayer for everybody, and all are welcome to Leatherhead's service, which this year is to be held at **St. Mary & St. Nicholas Parish Church at 2.30pm.**
