



The Ministers Write...

From Rev. Lynda Russell

During the month of January both at LMC and at Christ Church we have had our 'Back to Church' Sunday. Yes – I know it's usually held in September, but we weren't ready then, and there's no time limit on when we invite friends, family and neighbours to church, particularly those who have in the past been church goers and might have drifted away.

I spent a long time thinking and praying about what to focus on in the morning service. Should we just go with the usual lectionary readings, or was there another, relevant theme we could reflect on which might be appropriate both for us and our (expected and invited) visitors. Eventually I felt that it was right to look at the area of worry and anxiety – something which can be a problem for all of us, not only those outside the church.

We thought about what makes us anxious, the resultant brain waves (those pesky churning beta waves) and what Jesus said – and did - on the subject. And what we could do to help calm those beta waves down to lovely relaxed alpha waves! We acknowledged that it wasn't at all easy, even though some tried to make it sound as if it should be, and that we would probably be with the disciples most of the time!! However, putting our trust in Jesus, who understands where we're coming from, and starting with the small things, is the only way to leave all these things behind. And often we need to do it every day!

I've written before about the ECG (Equipping, Calling, Going) Conference in Scarborough that takes place the week after Easter. A group from LMC & Christ Church went last year and everyone had a great time. This year the theme is very much connected to what we thought about at our Back to Church Sunday:

AUTHENTIC **as the maker intended**

"What is it that wakes you up in the night, that plays on your mind in the darkest hours? We worry about the past, we worry about the present, we worry about today and we worry about the What does it mean to be an authentic disciple? What is authentic worship?

How do we build authentic community? How do we engage in authentic mission?

THE WORLD INVITES US TO BE REAL – DARE WE BE AUTHENTIC WITH THEM?

From Rev. Kim Plumpton

Dear Friends,

If I take a glance at the year ahead, 2016 is looking to be an interesting year full of change and challenge. This year is a significant year for each of our five children. Not only is Lianne expecting our first grandchild at the end of March but Krisstion is also expecting our second grandchild in August. I know, who would have thought when I uttered the words 'I'm not quite ready to be a grandma yet' that I would be looking at 2016 with such joy and excitement.

What other changes face us in 2016? Samuel is hoping to go to university to study human rights. Of course his A levels are pending but all indications suggest he should be okay. Joel will also be taking his GCSE's and has a conditional offer at the Academy of Contemporary Music, which is his dream. Each of them is anticipating a year of real adjustment and both Col and I will adapt

Almost four years ago our son Karl began an extraordinary journey, having lived with gender dysphoria, he made the decision to face it head on and seek a full transition from male to female.

His name became Carmel and we began the process of seeking professional support. It was a difficult journey to begin and at times it felt like an uphill struggle. Yet at the heart of this journey I am reminded of the words she once said when she first realised she was different from those around her: "Will God still love me mum?" response for the person I had come to love was that her physical appearance was of little importance to God, but her inner soul was. The person that God had created to be a caring, sociable, loving and faithful individual had not changed, only that her shape would be different from that which we had come to know. Of course the experience Carmel has faced this last few years has sometimes been far removed from a loving response (particularly while living in Birmingham). She's been spat on, even worse physically assaulted and verbally abused by complete strangers, Carmel's journey has been one that speaks of our difficulty to face difference. I have sat on countless occasions wiping away the tears from her face, I have wept at the way people can be so cruel and ignorant of the deep difficulty faced by someone who is not comfortable in the body they have been given. 2016 heralds the beginning of many operations to make the transition from male to female with the first in February. I can only walk this journey with my 'new' daughter, I may not understand entirely all the physical or psychological challenges that Carmel has faced or is still facing but I do know one thing - God loves her.

"Will God still love me?" is not just on the lips of some in the transgender community but it rests on the many who still feel ostracised from the church. Somehow in some places and in some ways we have sent out the message that the church only welcomes those who conform to our own image and it speaks less about the love of God and perhaps more about our need to accept and understand.

Our churches also face different seasons in its lifetime and some of those are exciting and joyous, but some seasons raise more questions, more challenges, they make us feel more vulnerable. Whatever season we are in, we do so in God's strength not in our own, we do so with God's love not our own, we do so with God's grace and not our own.







How We Started

TALK was first established in Guildford in 1998 when a group of volunteers took over the running of two aphasic support groups previously organised by the Stroke Association. The volunteers' achievements were recognised in 2005 when TALK was awarded the highly prestigious Queen's Golden Jubilee Award for Voluntary Service to the Community. This recognises society's "Unsung Heroes".

What is Aphasia?

Aphasia (also referred to as dysphasia) is a communication disability caused by damage to the language centre of the brain, usually as a result of a stroke. People with aphasia may have difficulty with speech, understanding, reading and writing. In many cases they will know what they want to say or write but will be unable to form the words or put the relevant letters to paper. Aphasia can affect relationships, work and personality. The resulting frustration and isolation can impact not only on the recoverer's quality of life but also on that of their family and friends. Approximately 250,000 people in the UK live with aphasia.

What is TALK?

TALK is a registered charity 1072526. Grants, fundraising events and donations help fund the service and two part-time employees. We have 5 groups in Surrey which meet once a week during school term time. The groups are situated in **Ashford, Guildford (2), Knaphill and Walton-on-Thames** and are run by volunteers who undertake speech and language therapist led training. All our volunteers have had enhanced CRB checks. We have approximately 80 volunteers and help approximately 80 recoverers in the five groups.

How We Help

We aim to support people with aphasia by enabling them to practise all aspects of communication in a supportive environment thus promoting confidence and leading to increased participation and independence within the community. Recoverers usually work one to one with a volunteer within the group setting. Each session has a different theme and provides a lively, stimulating environment with the emphasis on communication in its many different forms. Everyone participates as much as they can and the sessions are organised with a variety of ideas and input. Activities include quizzes, number and word worksheets, art, music therapy and occasional outings. A home volunteer service may be available for recoverers who cannot attend the weekly workshops.







You may be interested to know that production of the Real Easter Egg has moved to Banbury due to the high level of demand for eggs! So it's now a fully UK manufactured product. The blend of chocolate is better than ever! Which is good news for chocolate lovers, as a popular rival brand has seen sales plummet, when the American owners tampered with the taste!

Increased sales of the *Real Easter Egg* also means a bigger **Fairtrade Premium** is paid to farmers who grow the sugar and Cacao used in the egg's production. Cash from the premium is used to invest in their communities, where everything from schoolbooks to solar panels has been purchased.

The Real Easter Egg began its public life in 2009 encouraged by individuals, churches and schools in Oxford Diocese, so it is fitting that sales are sufficient to warrant *Fairtrade* chocolate being moved to Banbury.

Happy Leap Day!

Let's celebrate an extra 24 hours. It's a Leap year but WHY?

When Rome emerged as a world power, the difficulties of making a calendar were well known, but the Romans complicated their

lives because of their superstition that even numbers were unlucky. Hence their months were 29 or 31 days long, with the exception of February, which had 28 days. However, four months of 31 days, seven months of 29 days, and one month of 28 days added up to only 355 days. Therefore the Romans invented an extra month called Mercedonius of 22 or 23 days. It was added every second year.

Even with Mercedonius, the Roman calendar eventually became so far off that **Julius Caesar**, advised by the Greek astronomer **Sosigenes**, decided to simplify things and added days to different months of the year to create the 365 day calendar. 46 B.C. was made 445 days long by imperial decree, bringing the calendar back in step with the seasons. Then the solar year (with the value of 365 days and 6 hours) was made the basis of the calendar. The months were 30 or 31 days in length, and to take care of the 6 hours, every fourth year following the 28th day of Februarius (29th February) was made a 366-day year. Moreover, Caesar decreed the year began with the first of January, not with the vernal equinox in late March.

This calendar was named the **Julian calendar**, and is still used by Eastern Orthodox churches to this day. However, despite the correction, the Julian calendar is still 11½ minutes longer than the actual solar year, and after a number of centuries, even 11½ minutes adds up! Astronomers figured this out around the second century A.D., but the calendar system didn't change, and by the 16th century it was nearly 10 days off-track, even with the leap year system.

In 1582, Pope Gregory XIII made his own reforms to the Julian

This year's Charities for Lent Lunches

The Leatherhead Food Bank and Lunchbox, are to be Effingham's Charities for this year's Lent Lunches, but whilst you will have heard about food banks you may not have heard about Lunchbox so let me explain...

You will all know about **PitStop**, a Registered Charity set up many years ago in Leatherhead to support the homeless, lonely and vulnerable. Well, "The PitStop" temporarily closed at the end of August 2015. Sadly, I and the other trustees had been unable to find permanent accommodation in Leatherhead after the disastrous floods of 2013 - 2014 destroyed our home at the Leatherhead Football Club. So since then we have been using Fetcham Village Hall and the United Reformed Church hall in Leatherhead as temporary homes for which we are very grateful. However, despite entering into negotiations for several properties nothing suitable was acquired.

At the end of August 2015, PitStop left the URC Church Hall, where we had been for a year, and made our staff redundant, because our hiring agreement had come to an end and we had failed to find a suitable replacement property.

At this point Kim Plumpton's husband, Colin, and I felt that we had to do something to replace some of the services previously provided by PitStop and so we set up **LUNCHBOX**. We started in October at Leatherhead Methodist Church to provide support, hot meals and food parcels to needy families once a week. We meet on **Wednesdays** from 11.00am to 2.00pm in LMC's Hall. It is ideal because it's close to the centre of Leatherhead, has adequate parking for volunteers, a small hall which comfortably takes thirty, and has a splendid kitchen and toilets.

Colin and I hope that our **LUNCHBOX** will not be needed for very long, however in the meantime we have to pay our running costs which are around £150 a month, so we are grateful for all the support we can get. We are very thankful to all those who have supported us so far and who have made a difference to the lives of those who come along.

North Leatherhead Community Centre

A number of you will know the North Leatherhead Community Centre (on Kingston Road at the mini-roundabout opposite Dilston Road) as home to the local Foodbank on a Saturday Morning. Some may know about other users of the building including the St. Giles Play Group or the Brownies or Bingo or as the polling station for a large part of North Leatherhead. It was an Edwardian School building converted in the late 1970's to a Community Centre.

So you may have become aware from a mixture of social media and the front page of the Leatherhead Advertiser that on Sunday 10th January, Mole Valley District Council took back the management of the Centre from the North Leatherhead Community Association. The Council stepped in due to concerns about the governance, finances and condition of the building. This step was not taken lightly. It involved consultations with both District and County Councillors and several leading figures in the community including Dave Banko of Churches Together and Joe Crome of Leatherhead Youth Project who have formed a reference group.

So why were there concerns? It was discovered that the NLCA had been struck off as a Charity in 2015 due to a lack of financial accounts, which had not been available at the NLCA AGM or submitted to the Charity Commission. The charity also had serious debts estimated as possibly in the range of £30,000 to £60,000. These included over £9,000 to the council for rent, and other debts to HMRC for VAT, the brewery and wholesalers etc. This was not apparent to the organisation's committee, as it seems all documentation went via a single officer who may have been the sole custodian of the bank account.

The three Trustees appointed quite properly in the 1980's were discovered to be no longer active. Sadly one was deceased, another said he resigned a decade or more ago and the remaining one had retired some years ago to Devon. He was in his eighties and was not aware that he was still listed as a Trustee. In addition, the Licensee for the Social Club Bar was also long retired.

The state of the building was also a concern. There was no documentation of electrical testing, boiler checks or water testing for Legionnaires' Disease. A number of small electrical items such as kettles failed "PAT" testing. Also the wiring is a bit of a spaghetti mystery and certain doors and the ceiling are in poor condition.

The council has now held two public "drop in" meetings with about a hundred local residents and building users. After the reasons for the council taking over the centre were explained, many were quite shocked and surprised by the facts. The council are very keen for the centre to offer a revised, more community minded set of activities. A community online opinion poll has already had over two hundred individual responses as to possible future uses.

With some small scale repairs, the building is now safely operational. The council has commissioned a complete surveyors report of the building – very similar to the church quinquennial - to report in the next couple of weeks. This will then be discussed with the reference group, users and others in the community so that a long term plan for the community facilities in North Leatherhead can be worked out. As





After we had supped tea and tasted mouthwatering cheese scones, tartlets, chocolate brownie tray bakes and Victoria sponge cake to name but a few we reminded ourselves of those of us who could not be present and had been recently ill or in hospital.

After a demonstration of a robotic car (a Christmas present!) which was viewed with some interest if not amusement we took on a more serious note with the subject of loneliness which had been featured the night before on television. The friendly knock on the door, the unexpected phone call or letter can do so much to lighten the feeling of isolation and we hope that Time for Tea has a role to play here.

Jean then read to us one of her own poems entitled "New":

New Year, new beginnings: Stretched out like a pristine canvas, A palate of paint to colour the coming year. But is it quite as it seems? Can we really wipe out 'the before'? Past shades of life The green of new growth, The purple of darker spells Or perhaps indicating right royal times Blue for the flowing movement of seasons Mixed with sunshine yellows and rich red And the bright orange of high days and holidays, All be combined, blended To shade in the year to come. A poised brush waits to curve a rainbow of hope, The watching and waiting, the anticipation of fulfilment, With a potful of memories at the base Each moment that passes, That speck of time becomes another souvenir New is so transitory, relish it.

Joy told us that last year Time for Tea had raised £100 through the generous donations made by the people attending and we had decided to donate £50 to the Leatherhead Youth Project and another £50 to the Mary Frances Trust in Church Road which looks after people with social and mental health problems.



Chapter 1. The Practice of Radical Hospitality

Out of genuine love of Christ and each other, we are urged to invite, welcome, include and support newcomers, and the more established of our congregation, and to help them grow in faith. In the Methodist Church this goes back to the days of Wesley, when he preached around the country to all and everyone. The author's experience is wide, and quotes many examples of occasions when a friendly greeting is vital. He advises that our approach should be free of "inside jargon". Hospitality, he says, needs prayer, planning and a purposeful attitude - Radical Hospitality has to change the way we look at aspects of ministry. Ushers, greeters, door stewards whatever they are called - need to be trained, taught and prepared to make their service an integral part of the whole. It cannot be assumed that everyone is suitable. Declining numbers are not necessarily because people are dissatisfied, but because people grow old and die, or move nearer to family, and that number tends to

Chapter 2. The Practice of Passionate Worship (PW)

This five-part chapter is so full of what PW is, it is almost impossible to pull out what is most important, recognising that each reader will focus on what is considered most relevant to them. It states that PW connects all people to God and to one another.

It is a time to think less about ourselves and more about God's will. Worship can transform lives, heal souls, renew hope, provoke change and inspire compassion. Without passion, worship can become dry and routine. "Worship" is devotion to God. "Passionate" is an emotional and deep commitment that goes beyond that.

PW is not restricted to any one style but should be varied enough to engage all. Some members get most from the music - loud and modern, others the traditional hymns; some need silence and prayer; others the stimulation of a good sermon; others the learning from talking together to express views on a particular point. It does not matter what appeals most as long as the attendance has fulfilled a need. An hour of PW colours all the other hours of the week. Services need flexibility.

PW should not be the sole responsibility of the minister, but a prayerful communication between all who take part, aiming to develop lay people who feel comfortable and confident in leadership roles, encouraging all aspects of church life beyond Sunday, - to

Shrove Tuesday – Pancake Day

It's odd, really, that confessing one's sins to God should ever have involved making pancakes. And yet the beginning of Lent brings us both – Shrove Tuesday is Pancake Day, and is followed by Ash Wednesday, and so Lent begins.

In centuries gone by, the pancakes were made to use up the milk and eggs before the fasting of Lent. More recently, many readers will have childhood memories of the wonder of watching our mothers break an egg, mix it with milk and flour – and out of that gooey mess, to produce a light and delicious pancake.

These days more and more of us buy pancake mix, or even ready-made pancakes. It seems we prefer the certainty of ending up with pancakes - to the risk of having made nothing BUT a mess of the kitchen.

In many towns and villages they used to hold pancake races on the day. Why anyone would want to run around a field while holding a pancake is not clear, but in Olney, Bucks, they have held a pancake race almost every year since 1445.
