Dear friends,

Over Christmas I have been thinking about the number of journeys in the Christmas story that have surprising endings: Mary and Joseph, the shepherds, the kings, all get surprises, some not so good like 'no room in the inn' and some wonderful, like 'a baby laid in a manger,' who is God's chosen one.

As we begin the New Year, as always, looking into the future, we journey into uncharted territory. For Christ Church and LMC that is more true than usual this year. In February the Christ Church Church Meeting, and the LMC Church Council will vote on whether to commit to joining together to become one church on one site. If that is agreed, in a few months we will have the report from the architects offering us options on how we might do that in practice and we will have some challenging choices to make.

Also, in this year, in July, I move on to my new role in Birmingham, and it is a great joy to know that Lynda Russell, currently ministering in East Peckham and Paddock Wood in Kent will come to take over as minister in Leatherhead.

For the churches and for me personally this year involves a journey whose ending is uncertain. Like all those travellers in the Christmas story we have to learn what it means to travel on in trust, knowing that sometimes we will get some surprises that are not so good, and sometimes we will get wonderful surprises, but either way, journeying on knowing that we travel in the company of our gracious God.

At the beginning of the year, we renew our commitment to God in our Covenant service using the traditional prayer that begins: 'I am no longer my own but yours. Put me to what you will, rank me with whom you will...' As we travel on into new situations with new people, we need to take that prayer with us, committed to God's service in every aspect of our lives.

If we do that, I am confident that God will open up to us opportunities for mission and service that will be exciting and challenging. I am also confident that as we respond to God's call to travel on with him, we will discover that those he calls he also equips, and we will find ourselves inspired and enabled to fulfil our calling as disciples of Jesus Christ, wherever he leads us.

Southern Synod

To all churches

So the Lord's promise came true, just as the prophet had said, "A virgin will have a baby boy, and he will be called Immanuel," which means "God is with us."



Dear friends,

Sometimes God comes demanding great trust of us, requiring that we just accept a fact of our lives without explanation or justification. I imagine it was exactly like that when God came to Mary and Joseph. God came with an explanation that was beyond explanation - an explanation that required great trust.

It is easier for me to understand how Mary might have felt. But what was Joseph feeling. Away from all the gossiping, Joseph knew that Mary was with child. He did not know why or how, Joseph's instinct was to turn to God in prayer.

God responded in a dream. Through the angel God told Joseph that the child was the result of divine action. Therefore he should take Mary for his wife. It amazes me how God stated a fact without explanation and suggested what Joseph should do about it. That was enough for him.

Joseph solved his dilemma by simply going ahead and being himself: being Joseph to Mary and being Joseph to Jesus and leaving the rest up to God. God, after all, chose Joseph to care for Mary and Jesus. In the process of being himself, he found a place for the baby to be born, a humble stable, the embodiment of ordinariness.

Later he saved the baby from the envy of King Herod. After living for some years as a refugee in a foreign land, he returned with his family to Nazareth. There he supported the child and his mother again by the ordinariness of his profession, through hard work. Whenever God told him to move, he moved, but most of the time he just stayed put and did ordinary Joseph things: he worked; he loved Mary and Jesus; he listened carefully for the will of God whispered quietly to him through the ordinary events of his daily life. Yet Joseph's story is truly extraordinary. It is a familiar story and there is nothing new in my telling of it. But I do tell it again as a reminder to us to trust in the purposes of God.

We have just celebrated 40 years of the United Reformed Church. It is a very different church from 40 years ago. But it is the church to which we belong as the body of Christ. There is much talk of dwindling congregations, lack of finance, lack of young people, lack of direction ... but maybe we should be focus less upon what we lack, and rather more upon the bounty of life in Christ God calls us to live. After all, we are called to trust in God's purposes. Perhaps, like Joseph, we need to get on with the business of being church, the whole people of God. Perhaps, like Joseph, we need to listen to the will of God whispered quietly to us in the ordinary events of daily life.

Let us not forget that, by being the whole people of God, we have done some great and glorious things as the body of Christ together and spearheaded many with our friends of other denominations for which we should give thanks and rejoice. But most of the time we go about our ordinary business of being God's people for our world.

As I travel around the Synod I see the shoots of hope and real possibility but I know it is not always easy. For your commitment and patience I say a genuine thank you.



Are you superstitious? Do you walk around ladders and try not to let a black cat cross your path ?

Well my Grandmother was very superstitious, and particularly after Christmas, when she would fret until 5th January, then insisted that all the festive greenery, pine needles, dried-out tree, cards and old paper chains were burnt on our bonfire. Apparently Twelfth Night was when all <u>Christmas Decorations</u> had to be removed so as not to bring bad luck upon the home. If any were found later, they stayed up all year, and we never heard the last of it !

It's ridiculous really, but I still feel guilty if I discover any decorations that have not been filed away, even though she's not been able to nag me for nearly forty years. She was 90 when she died in 1974, but her beliefs can be traced back to folklore about the pagan *Green Man* and a good harvest.

Long ago it was thought that leaving the <u>decorations</u> up would cause a disaster. People believed that tree-spirits lived in evergreen holly and ivy etc., and so it was brought into the house to provide a safe haven during the harsh midwinter days. Once this period was over, it was necessary to return the greenery back outside to release the tree-spirits into the countryside once again. Failure to do this meant vegetation would not be able to start growing again: Spring would not return, leading to an agricultural disaster. It was also thought that any greenery left in the house meant that tree-spirits would cause mischief until they were released. Despite decorations now being made of foil or paper, and even though the tree-spirits are long forgotten, the superstition still survives.

Fingers crossed for a wonderful 2013.

A Christmas Carol (Part 2)

continued from December's magazine

In last month's magazine I wrote about Charles Dickens' story. Scrooge's attitude is very uncharitable to start with, but the ghosts of Christmas past, present and future appear to him and bring him to the point of repentance and he says, "Re-create me tell me it's not too late to learn".

He says, "I have seen a future full of darkness - all the darkness of my heart. At my door a world in need of kindness. All the hours and days and years I've wasted - all the joy and love I've never tasted - give me time to change. I can change the world -it's my duty. God forgive me - let me try". Scrooge says that he will "go where kindness and my conscience lead me, give my heart and soul to all. God speed me on my way and to God I pray. Let the Christmas spirit live within me".

So the message that we can take from this story is, "Let the stars in the sky remind us not so much of man's compassion or lack thereof, but of God's compassion shown when He sent His Son to die a cruel death on a cross. Let us love 'till we die and God bless us every one. If we turn back to God there can be a light in our heart that shines like a star in heaven".

So Scrooge undergoes a revolutionary change and suddenly becomes amazingly generous and also much happier. He says, "I'm as happy as an angel. What a day, what a sky, what a happy man am I, what a joy to be alive and well. If I'd known what I know, I'd have done it years ago. Oh the whole world is new and it all has to do with me". Other people around Scrooge are amazed at the change in him and realize that something has made him see the light.

I wonder if you've seen the light? Those of you reading this article may not be like Scrooge, but nevertheless the message about him is very relevant in the very materialistic society that we live in today which focuses so much on money. Scrooge was a banker in Dickens' story and of course greedy bankers are very much in the news at the moment. How different would the world be if bankers today underwent a revolutionary change like Scrooge and suddenly all with one accord decided to use their bonuses to help repay the national debt or to help reconstruction in Afghanistan or to feed the starving in Ethiopia? As Christians we believe that such a revolutionary change can be brought about in our own hearts not by the appearance of ghosts but by the coming of the Holy Ghost or rather Holy Spirit into our hearts when we invite Him in. King David, even 'though he was a godly man sinned very badly against the Lord which only goes to show that however good we might like to think that we are, we can still go badly wrong. Yet in spite of committing such a terrible sin, he doesn't end up in a situation of hopeless guilt and despair. He still has confidence in God's loving kindness and tender mercy. He still hopes for God's mercy.

God's purpose in sending the apostle Paul to the gentiles was to "open their eyes, and to turn them from darkness to light, and from the power of Satan to God, that they might receive forgiveness of sins, and inheritance among them which are sanctified by faith that is in Jesus". It is my prayer that in this New Year we also instead of focusing on material things might also turn back to God in repentance and have our lives changed by the power of God through faith in the Christ who died and rose again so that we might be forgiven and reconciled to God.

Dear Christ Church,


Thank you for the lovely box of chocolates; I shall enjoy sharing them with my family over Christmas.


