The Ministers Write...



From Rev. Ian Howarth

Dear Friends

This year, at the beginning of July, I am attending the Methodist Conference in Southport. At the time of writing I just have the first volume of the agenda, all 380 pages of it. I am (eagerly?) awaiting the arrival of Volume 2, with another 350 pages.

It includes reports on everything imaginable from the Board of Management of Methodist Independent Schools, to the Methodist Heritage Committee. The fact that the Conference technically has oversight of so many things, speaks to a real difference between the governance of the Methodist and United Reformed Churches. Every Methodist church is under the oversight and authority of Conference, and each church has a constitution which follows the standing orders agreed by Conference and which are contained in another huge volume, the Constitutional Practice and Discipline of the Methodist Church, on which I had to be interviewed before I was allowed to be ordained! In the URC, oversight rests with the Church Meeting and the role of the General Assembly as I understand it is less central, although I am still learning.

However, alongside the more business oriented reports are two that come from the Joint Public Issues team of the Methodist, United Reformed and Baptist Churches, that are challenging and thought provoking. They are on 'The Big Society' and 'Poverty and Inequality.' They address some of the issues raised by the Archbishop of Canterbury in his rather controversial piece for the New Statesman, but they do so in a less party political way and at greater depth. They are, however, challenging reports. They encourage the church to 'continue to speak prophetically about what it means to live in community, and to highlight the impact of public spending cuts.' and reaffirms the Church's commitment to 'ending the scourge of poverty and to promoting the welfare of the poorest and most vulnerable', while calling on church members 'to consider how best they may play their part in bringing this about, be it by prayer, charity, social action or political action.'

Some have argued that the churches should not get involved in such areas, but in doing so the church simply seeks to take its place within

the tradition of prophets like Amos and Isaiah, and New Testament writers like James, as well as seeking to live out the teaching of Jesus in the Sermon on the Mount.

Christians do not agree on all the details, and I look forward to lively debate on the reports at the Conference. However, whatever our views, the reports, like the Archbishop's article, challenge us to work out how the message of God's love for all people, and God's affirmation of the value of each human person in Christ, is worked out in practice in our society.

Dear Friends,

In the living room of the manse we have a beautiful framed photograph of Fountains Abbey in North Yorkshire. An historical site housing the largest abbey ruins in the country. Not too far from where we used to live, it holds many memories for us as a family and so we were delighted to be given this as a gift. It's interesting that when we were given it as a leaving present, I took one look at it and I struggled to recognise where on earth it was at all. Some might say I am the least observant person they know but actually when it comes to doing anything myself, detail is important to me. The photograph was taken at such an angle, with the sun beginning to set; somehow, the image that I had become so familiar with, just didn't register at all. I puzzled over it for ages much to the bemusement of our dear friend. Sometimes you need to step away from something and look at it from a different perspective just to be able to appreciate it in its entirety; somehow you notice things you had never picked up before. In a way you only receive a partial picture of something when you first look at it.

After spending nearly a year in ministry, a baby amongst so many seasoned ministers, I have learnt one thing (of many I hope), that what you see is not what you get. The Bible has so many layers to it, it will surely take more than my lifetime to understand its message. The people I meet and the problems I encounter will only ever present a partial picture of what is really going on beneath. There is so much that is unseen.

What is wonderful and reassuring to me in all of this is that we need each other and we need God to reveal to us those things which are important for us to see. No matter how tiny they may seem, we are enriched by adding a speck of colour to a picture that is unfinished. Our creator God fills in the gaps a bit at a time and the scales are lifted from our eyes when the timing is right.

I hope that during this time in the summer, traditionally a time for rest and recuperation, we might return refreshed and renewed ready to catch a glimpse of another part of the jigsaw puzzle.

All we are is what he is

John Pridmore takes issue with the glorifying of stories of the ascension

I have no difficulty in believing that 12 men climbed a mountain, and that, having reached the summit, one of them carried on climbing. It is no problem to me that the last sight his companions had of him – as depicted subsequently in many a stained-glass window – was of two feet disappearing into a cloud. I am untroubled by the claim that at that point two other men, in long white coats, appeared from nowhere to reassure the bewildered 11 that their friend would return in due course in the same surprising way that he left them.

What bothers me, what I find far harder to believe than this strange tale of self-levitation, is what the story has been taken to mean. St Paul steered subsequent interpretation of the ascension with what we hear in our reading from his letter to the Ephesians. "God has seated Christ at his right hand," Paul writes. Jesus the suffering servant has become Christ the triumphant warrior. He is Christus Victor, back from his battlefield, all his enemies slaughtered. He does not hang from a cross, but sits on a throne. There he sits and there he stays. There will be no further need for him to get to his feet, for the conquest of his foes is complete. That is what I find hard to believe.

The refreshments are gobbled up appreciatively, after members have taken turns to say The Grace.

...Started in 1972 by Molly Eaton, who arranged the first walk for teenagers. Some of the mums came too. When Molly asked the youngsters if they would like to do it again, they said no! But the mums did! It consists of a leisurely circular walk never more than five miles, led by Anthea Willis and Pam Roberts, ending with lunch together, either packed to eat outside or in a local hostelry.

All of these three events are great fun as we all get to know each other better.

Dave's Family Bible



It's an illustrated copy of "The Self-interpreting Family Bible" with explanatory notes by the late Rev. John Brown of Haddington, and was a gift to Dave's greatgrandfather, Thomas, from his great-grand father, W. Cripps in 1878. He's also written an inscription on the flyleaf, from Romans 1 v 16 -

"I am not ashamed of the Gospel of Christ, for it is the power of God, unto salvation to everyone that believeth".

Very large and in need of repair to the leather cover and one of the metal clasps, this is a family treasure which will be on show at our bible exhibition in October.

But who was **Rev. John Brown**? According to Wikipedia, the free online encyclopaedia, he was an amazing character. Born in 1722, at Carpow near Abernethy in Perthshire, the son of a self-educated weaver and river-fisherman, his own formal education was scant. His parents died when he was 12 and he had to support himself by working as a shepherd, but he had a thirst for learning and taught himself Greek, Latin, and Hebrew by comparing texts and scripts. In 1738, after hearing that the Greek New Testament was available in a bookshop, he left his sheep with a friend and walked the 24 miles to St. Andrews to buy a copy. There were several professors of Greek in the bookshop, and as they watched this ragged shepherd boy gingerly handle the book, one of them challenged him to read it, saying he would buy it for him if he could. So he returned to his shepherd duties with this free gift. He fought against the Jacobites in the '45 rebellion. He was ordained in 1751, at Haddington, East Lothian, and that was his home for the rest of his life. He gained a just reputation for learning and piety, and became Moderator of the Synod in 1753, which is a remarkable tribute to the talents of someone ordained so recently. wrote a dictionary of the bible, a general history of Christianity but his most famous work is The Self-Interpreting Bible first published in 1778 but still in print well into the 20th Century, so it had been in print for a hundred years when it was first given in 1878! What a remarkable man!

Leatherhead Uniting Churches Away Day: "Forward Together"

35 members of the three Covenanted churches, (Leatherhead Parish, Christ Church, and LMC) joined together at St. John's School with Rev. Stuart Thomas of Ruxley United Church on 11th June, to look at how we go forward together and develop our Covenant relationship.

Stuart used the hymn: 'Moses, I know you're the man' as the framework for our discussion, highlighting lines like: 'Don't get too set in your ways' and 'You will move easier if you are travelling light'.

At the end of the day we were asked to find some priorities to address as we look to go forward together; the following were suggested and will be discussed by stewards, elders and wardens at the next meeting of the Uniting Churches Council in September.

- More shared worship;
- Greater involvement of more people in Leatherhead Trinity School;
- Need to seek God's vision for us together;
- Better communication between and within churches about what is going on;
- An audit of the resources, financial, property and personnel that the churches have, and discussion about how we invest them more effectively for worship, mission and service;
- Greater co-operation between church councils, with a view to possibly sharing more in our governance.

We were encourage to use our imagination as we wait on God for his guidance for the future.

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"Away Day" was a bit of a non-description. We only went as far as St John's School! I took the opportunity to get some reactions at the Uniting Churches Pentecost Service the following day from some who attended. Most comments seemed to begin with a rather hesitant "Well....." and then "Do you want my honest opinion?" Of course I did! Opinions differed. Most enjoyed Stuart's approach using lines from the song "Moses, I know you're the man" (H & P 450) to introduce each session, especially as each

sentence included "the Lord said". Some were not keen on the emphasis of what has happened at Ruxley, but did admit that that was where Stuart's experience lay. One lady just could not connect any relevance with what Ruxley has achieved and our vision in Leatherhead. She left at coffee time. Many were disappointed with the venue, especially those who went to Ockley two years ago, describing the hall as dark and depressing, with poor lighting, "like being locked in a cupboard" was one definition. The reception area was attractive, once, of course, you had worked out how to get through the school's tight security to enter the grounds. A plus for the school but not for visitors!

Generally the day had no great "wow" factor, more a case of, been there, done that. A first timer to Away Days found much of it new but not startling. Without fail all enjoyed the discussion and talking together. It was queried whether there was a need for an annual Away Day. My answer would be "yes" but for more thought given to the venue and the theme. There must be many subjects to create discussion and learn from each other. Perhaps the thinking needs to start now! It will be on the Uniting Churches Council's next agenda.



A Wesleyan Pilgrimage

On a sunny afternoon in May, pilgrims on a Wesleyan Pilgrimage tour from the far east visited Leatherhead Methodist Church. This had been arranged by the Rev. Hazel Yu from the Epsom Methodist Church who many of us will remember when the Chinese Church worshipped at LMC during the 1990s. The 'pilgrims' were, in fact, Methodist ministers from the Singapore and the Indonesian Perguruan Methodist churches, who had expressed a wish to see where John Wesley had preached his last sermon. In the group was The Rev. Dr Chin Chung Chong, President of the Singapore Methodist Church and the Rev. Foyar Liu, President of the Indonesian Methodist Church. Also in the group was Rev. Daniel Lee, an accomplished bass-baritone who, together with his wife, a mezzo-soprano, have made a CD of well known hymns entitled 'How Great Thou Art' which was presented to us.

The visitors arrived in a fleet of cars, everyone jumping out and taking many photos of the Wesleyan plaques on the side of the church. Inside the church many photos were again taken together with group poses, all done with great enthusiasm, humour and smiling faces. They listened to a brief résumé of John Wesley's life and his visit to the family living at Kingston House in 1791 where, it is said, he preached his last sermon before journeying on to London where he died a week later. They were told about the history of LMC built in 1893 and were shown details of our current church activities including Churches Together, the new Pastorate arrangements, B Free and Messy Church. On display were archives relating to John and Charles Wesley including examples of his journal and letters.

The group were then taken on a mini tour of our historic town of Leatherhead to Wesley House where again many group photos were taken on the steps of the house, followed by a quiet prayer giving thanks for the ministry of John Wesley and the hope that his message would continue to spread. We continued down Gravel Hill, past the 16th century Sweech House and on to Church Walk where, by chance, we met Tom Mosoke who was known to Hazel from her previous visits to Leatherhead, a fitting end to an enjoyable visit.

Will this pave the way for future visits and tours to see our connection with John Wesley? We hope so!






