#### From Rev. Ian Howarth

Dear Friends,

At the beginning of July, the Methodist Conference and the United Reformed Church General Assembly will both be meeting. The Conference in Plymouth and the General Assembly at Scarborough. I hope the distance between the two meetings is not a sign of the two denominations going in different directions. One thing I notice from the Methodist Conference agenda is that there is a report that in the past year there have been twelve new sharing agreements between URC and Methodist churches coming together.

Both bodies induct their denomination's figurehead leader, the Methodists will be inducting Mark Wakelin, (who happens to be an old school friend of mine), as their President for the next year, while the URC will induct Michael Jagessar, as their moderator for the next two years.

Both bodies also have contentious reports to consider. The Methodist Conference have a 120 page report on training, called 'Fruitful Field' which will have significant consequences if it is agreed on everything from closing two of our theological colleges, to completely changing the way Local Preachers and Worship Leaders are trained. It is an attempt both to save money and to get some consistency in the way lay and ordained are trained throughout Methodism. Although it may seem a distant thing, its effects will be felt in every church in some way or another.

The URC are grasping a nettle the Methodist Church has avoided for the last 19 years, and are debating same sex relationships, particularly the blessing of civil partnerships and whether same sex weddings could happen in church. As we know it is an issue on which Christians hold deeply held views on both sides.

Alongside these big issues, there will be debates on social and political themes, such as education and the use of drones in warfare, as well as on the mission of the church, and how we resource new ways of mission and evangelism. (The Methodist Conference also has to formally approve my appointment as Chair of the Birmingham district from 2013!)

While many of us do not have much sense of belonging to a wider church, the decisions of these councils are significant for the future of our local churches, and I hope over the first week of July you will remember both the Methodist Conference and the URC General Assembly in your prayers. Kim is going to General Assembly, and we pray for her as she engages in the debates, and look forward to hearing her reports when she returns.

# Heritage Weekend: Effingham Chapel

The Chapel will be taking part in *Heritage Open Days* again this year, and will be open on *Friday 7th and Saturday 8th from 10.00am to 5.00pm* with refreshments all day, and an exhibition about our village, some famous local heroes, and our

Chapel's history. We'll also reveal some of John Wesley's **"Rotten Remedies"**, from his medical handbook, *Primitive Physic or an Easy and Natural Method of CURING most DISEASES* published in 1747. He wanted the less well-off to be able to treat themselves, rather than paying for physicians and apothecaries:

"A plain and easy way of curing most diseases, to set down cheap, safe, and easy medicines, easy to be known, easy to be procured, and easy to be applied by plain and unlettered men". The book is infused with Wesley's belief in holistic salvation, although the remedies and cures are not Wesley's own, but he does indicate those that he believes to be the most effective, and the way the book is laid out was his idea.

He re-wrote the work of reputable physicians of his time, listing the ailments alphabetically, giving a brief description of symptoms, and suggesting a range of treatments, providing remedies for a range of ailments and diseases, from headaches to the plague, and gout to obesity. Some of his remedies should stay firmly in the 18thC, such as drying and powdering a toad to make pills to help ease asthma! But he was also way ahead of his time in re-establishing the value of prevention rather than 'cures'; recommending fresh water, a light diet low in spices and salt, and exercising around two to three hours a day in order to "soften the evils of life".

**So can you help?** We'd greatly appreciate more volunteers to talk to visitors or help to serve teas or make scones this year.

# An American Dream Holiday!



We've just come back from a fabulous astronomy holiday in America. Nearly three weeks touring south-western USA with specially arranged visits to observatories and even a chance to view an eclipse of the sun without the threat of rain. There's been a drought in the states of Nevada, Utah, Arizona and California for years, but no hose-pipe ban! It was amazing to see

how the desert bloomed where there was water. Miles and miles of arid mountainous land with no sign of human habitation, except for a petrol station cum general store in the middle of nowhere. We travelled nearly four thousand miles but only saw a tiny part of this vast country, and only had rain when we got back to Heathrow.

Strange but we began to miss the rain, and found the dry heat and altitude left us both with a dry cough. Although the tour wasn't strenuous, it was demanding. Early breakfasts to ensure we got to the observatories for the scheduled visits and with enough time to raid the gift-shops. There were photo-opportunities but not the freedom to stop the coach and leap off to visit that church or watch a bird circling overhead, or just chat to people about life.

We moved hotels frequently. We flew to Las Vegas but had no time to be led astray as we drove to Zion National Park the following day, then onto Bryce Canyon where we stayed for a couple of nights so we could view an "annular" eclipse of the sun - a ring of fire, which we watched with some local people including a deputy sheriff and a Mormon preacher and his family. At last a chance to meet some real Americans!! Then onto Lake Powell to view the dam and hydro-electric power station, and just so hot you could fry eggs on the pavement! Fortunately the coach was air-conditioned or we'd never have survived.

A night in another hotel then onto the Grand Canyon. WOW !!!! Fantastic views. Ange visited in February 20 years ago and saw little but snow and a canyon stuffed with cloud. What a contrast now...it's a mile deep and we took an early morning helicopter ride out over the forest and this "Great Hole" created by the mighty Colorado river.....that tiny trickle of water visible between towering walls of rock. Truly awesome, with real Red Indian gifts and evocative music and giant Condors soaring below.

Then onto Flagstaff for a visit to Meteor Crater where winds of 60mph made photography interesting - hair on end and trousers flapping and a guided tour done "on screen" due to health and safety fears.



Then back on the bus and off south to Tucson, where we visited Kitt Peak Observatory, and had a short morning trip to the Arizona Desert Museum for a chance to see the flora and fauna close to at last. Beautiful hummingbirds, but we missed the road-runner. Apparently not as common as wily coyotes these days.

Then back on the coach for the seven-hour trip to Palm Springs, where we escaped the desert heat by visiting the aerial tramway, even though Dave's not that keen on heights these days, and then finding a beautiful mountain observatory on Great Bear Lake, which monitors solar flares -part of a warning system to protect our fragile planet. Then off to Pasadena for a trip to NASA's Jet Propulsion Laboratory, where they're building space buggies to explore our Universe. Awesome technology by



awesome scientists, with incredible vision into the future. A real privilege to meet these experts.

Then finally to LA, where the smog upset Ange's asthma but we still managed a stroll from our hotel to the beach so we could see the Pacific Ocean, and have lunch with the waves foaming on the sand. We talked to the lifeguard about bird-watching and saw skeins of brown pelicans fly by, and the usual sandwich-stealing sea-gulls raiding a picnic basket while the oblivious owners went for a swim. Then back to the hotel to squeeze in those rocks and momentoes before catching the shuttle to the airport.

Our flight home was delayed by two hours so after a 10-hour flight we were exhausted, jet-lagged, and glad to be back home. Phew!!



Most counties in England hold an annual Ride & Stride, on the second Saturday in September, to raise money for the restoration and repair of buildings for Christian worship.

The idea is that cyclists and walkers are given a list of churches and chapels in the area of their choice. They map out their own route to pedal or walk having asked their friends to reward their efforts.

The money collected is divided into two. Half the monies go to the church or chapel of the cyclist's or walker's choice - probably your own - the other half is retained by the Surrey Churches Preservation Trust for distribution to churches in need. In the dozen years that the Bike Ride (now Ride & Stride) has been running in Surrey over £250,000 has been raised.

The umbrella organisation for our county is the Surrey Churches Preservation Trust whose trustees are from most Christian denominations. Grants are given out twice a year for deserving applications.

Encouragement to take part in Ride & Stride is provided by the SCPT County Organiser and distributed by Area Organisers to individual churches and chapels across Surrey. The Area Organisers support the Church Organisers by providing them with all the necessary paperwork and any guidance they need.

Ride & Stride is a fun way to spend time on a pleasant September Saturday while at the same time supporting a worthy cause. Why not make up a group and join in this year!

Supporters who prefer not to 'ride or stride', please consider sponsoring volunteers involved in this important event.

**Jesus said;** "Come to me all of you who are weary and carry heavy burdens, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you. Let me teach you, because I am humble and gentle, and you will find rest for your souls. For my yoke fits perfectly and the burden I give you is light". Matthew 11:28-30, NLT

I have come to believe that the one thing many of us thirst and hunger for, sometimes beyond anything else, is REST. Not rest like a weekend at the beach or a midday nap, but a deeper rest that speaks peace and calm to the turmoil that can occupy our minds and our hearts. Rest that refreshes us deep on the inside, where we are tired to the very core.

So if it is the one thing that we all long for, why do we find it so hard to simply lay down our burdens and run to the Lord? Surely it sounds so easy, and yet the reality is that to surrender goes against our very human nature. If we are not in control, how will we know we are safe?!

Maybe there are many different reasons we struggle to truly surrender, and the weariness is permeating our hearts. Perhaps we don't recognise what the burdens we are carrying actually are. Unforgiveness, worry, guilt, shame, hopelessness, despair, sin, wrong responsibility - these are all things that can weigh down our hearts and rob us of the peace and rest that our Father has for us today.

A peace and rest that affirms our Father God has us safe in the palm of His hands, as we allow Him to be in control. True rest from the Lord is never conditional on our circumstances. As we run to the Lord, it may not automatically erase the struggles that we are going through, or the difficulties we face. It is purely a gift from the Lord as we come to that place of surrender - a deep assurance that no matter what is around us - our Father God is way big enough to carry what is too much for us to bear. What a wonderful relief!

**Prayer:** Lord Jesus, thank you for your humble, gentle character that beckons me to come to you and lay down the burdens of my heart. Thank you that when I do, you hold them safe and know exactly why I have carried them for so long. Lord, I am sorry for trying so hard to be strong in my own strength. Please teach me to run only to you that I may experience the relief of your rest, knowing you hold it all in your control. Help me Lord to remember that for every situation and burden in my life, your Cross and who you are stands eternally the same. I love you Lord Jesus. Amen.

#### Methodist Women in Britain - Part 2

Last month I wrote about the Friday and Saturday of their first conference in April. Both Saturday and Sunday began with prayers before breakfast. There were plenty of choices to suit all needs and temperaments, from the 'wake up' kind with drums, to the quieter prayer stations. Sunday morning is always stripping the bed and packing (rooms have to be vacated by 10.00am). For me, it meant lugging my case down four flights of stairs because the lift was out of order!

The first session in the morning was news of how working in partner-ship as MWiB was progressing. Very well, would be my opinion. There were updates on the Launch Road Shows that have taken place at venues around the country, with a reminder that there is only one more to come in York. I reported on the London one in last November's magazine. The rest of that session was brief items about Magnet (the Methodist magazine for all Christians), Clem (a self-help partnership in Bolivia), More than Gold, MRDF and Children Unite (a new international organisation devoted exclusively on child domestic workers, protecting children from abuse and to promote their rights).

After the coffee break we met together in the main hall to hear from those who attended the World Seminar of WFMUCW in S. Africa last summer. The focus was mainly on the Millennium Development Goals (MDG's) an initiative established by UN and adopted by WFMUCW as a need for action. For many years now the movement has had a voting place on a UN Committee that is centred on children's needs. Methodist women's work has a far broader reach than just weekly meetings, although that are still an important part! President Jill Baker said we should be proud to be a Methodist, with an understanding of all that happens throughout the world. We are part of a global sisterhood of women. (I have listed the MDG's separately).

The weekend finished with a grand worship session in the afternoon. There was much singing, praying, peaching and three heart-wrenching testimonies from women, who despite unbelievable difficulties, have never given up.

It was a lonely journey home in a packed train, full of students returning to college. It would have been lovely to have someone to chew things over with - I'm always hopeful that might happen! Next year's dates: MWiB at Swanwick, 12th to 14th April 2013.

#### The Church Garden




