

The Ministers Write...

From Rev. Lynda Russell

Dear friends,

One of the biggest topics of conversation at the moment is of course the World Cup. (For some of you I might have to specify that I mean football!) Most of you will know that I have absolutely no interest in football, but the previous World Cup does have one abiding memory for me.

I was ordained on 27th June 2010 - the ceremony began at 3.00pm on the Sunday, just as the England football team began what was to become their last match. (There were some who had a hard choice to make!!) There were 11 of us being ordained in the Cathedral, and the preacher began by making the comparison between the eternal significance of what was happening in the Cathedral that day, and the fleeting or shallowness of the 'other event' taking place at the same time with 11 people!

However, each year, before the ordinations, the Methodist Church takes all those due to be ordained off on retreat for several days. This is a real gift: time to pause and reflect, time to pray, time to pay attention to what God is saying, time to recognise God's voice, time to meet up with friends. It is altogether an occasion for refreshment, rest and blessing. Those being ordained this year on 29th June will have had the same gift of time.

All of us need these times in our lives. Times put aside when we deliberately step out of the normal cycle of events and press the pause button. July and August are quite often times when we can do this, since the usual routines often change. Sometimes holidays can be those times, although of course depending on our circumstances they can be just as frantic and perhaps even more stressful! However this shouldn't stop us trying to carve out even small chunks of time for ourselves in order to maintain our inner lives so that we can connect with God.

Jesus often took time out to spend time in reflection, to step outside the hectic pace, for he knew what it was like to be constantly sought out, and in demand, but he also knew how important it was to keep

that deep inner oasis of calm based in his relationship with his Father that sustained him through everything going on around him.

So I challenge you to try to press the pause button over the summer. Step consciously out of your normal routine even if only for a few minutes here and there. Use the time to rest, reflect and listen to what God is saying to you. I believe that God will bless us in many different and even unexpected ways if we do this. Let me know how you get on!

From Rev. Kim Plumpton

Dear friends,

I was asked if I would share this excerpt from a sermon I gave recently so here it is:

"Musharraf was one of many children giving us a glimpse into life at a secondary school in Bradford as part of the documentary called Educating Yorkshire. Musharraf suffers from a chronic stutter and on many occasions he would communicate via the computer. The programme follows him as he comes towards his GCSE English. Within it, 20% of the marks are given following an oral examination. Conventional therapies had come to no avail for Musharraf, until one teacher remembered *The King's Speech*, how the therapist for the reluctant King George VI began to distract him with music whilst reciting poetry. The teacher places a set of headphones over Musharraf's ears and asks him to recite a piece of poetry. The results are astonishing and Musharraf who falters a little manages to recite the poetry in its entirety.

At the end of the school year in the leavers assembly, with headphones attached, Musharraf reads a letter of thanks to all those gathered. Musharraf talks about finding his voice at last, his life-long disability overcome. He was grateful to all his peers and especially the teachers for helping him to become the person he could be, with a future that looked promising. The children were crying, the teachers were crying and to be honest so was I by the time I finished watching it. Musharraf went on to receive 5 A*-C grades and one of them was in English.

In the advert for Channel Four he recites a piece of poetry by William Arthur Ward. It is made all the more powerful by this young man's determination to say the words.

*"To laugh is to risk appearing a fool.
To weep is to risk appearing sentimental.
To reach out for another is to risk involvement.
To expose feelings is to risk revealing your true self.
To place your ideas, your dreams, before a crowd
is to risk rejection.
To love is to risk not being loved in return.
To live is to risk dying.
To hope is to risk disappointment.
To try is to risk failure.
But risks must be taken, because the greatest hazard
in life is to risk nothing.
Those who risk nothing, do nothing, have nothing,
and become nothing.
They may avoid present suffering and sorrow, but they
will not learn, feel, change, grow, love, or live.
Chained by their fear, they are slaves who have forfeited
their freedom."*

Freedom is a precious commodity, the ability to act, think, speak and move in freedom is one which we often take for granted but rarely recognise as one of the greatest gifts we have in this country. To have the opportunity to be risk takers, to be a people that experience life in all its fullness, to be a people that have the capacity to push the boundaries are indeed God's blessed gifts. How we use them is another thing entirely.



The Ride & Stride 13th September 2014

Most counties in England hold an annual Ride & Stride, on the second Saturday in September, to raise money for the restoration and repair of buildings for Christian worship.

The idea is that cyclists and walkers are given a list of churches and chapels in the area of their choice. They map out their own route to pedal or walk having asked their friends to reward their efforts.

The money collected is divided into two. Half the monies go to the church or chapel of the cyclist's or walker's choice - probably your own - the other half is retained by the Surrey Churches Preservation Trust for distribution to churches in need. In the dozen years that the Bike Ride (now Ride & Stride) has been running in Surrey over £250,000 has been raised.

The umbrella organisation for our county is the Surrey Churches Preservation Trust whose trustees are from most Christian denominations. Grants are given out twice a year for deserving applications.

Encouragement to take part in Ride & Stride is provided by the SCPT County Organiser and distributed by Area Organisers to individual churches and chapels across Surrey. The Area Organisers support the Church Organisers by providing them with all the necessary paperwork and any guidance they need.

Ride & Stride is a fun way to spend time on a pleasant September Saturday while at the same time supporting a worthy cause. Why not make up a group and join in this year!

Supporters who prefer not to 'ride or stride', please consider sponsoring volunteers involved in this important event.

No room for coloured and Irish!

This was the sign that was put on the doors of many houses in Stockwell, London in the 1960's when my husband and I lived there for five years. So we decided to offer a big room at the top of the manse to "coloured" families. The first family we had as lodgers were Michael and Betty Falade from Nigeria, who were in London studying, and their little boy who was fostered out of London but brought back for weekends and holidays. He was called Shegun. They were a lovely Christian couple.

Many years later when we were in Sheffield, we were surprised and delighted when Shegun arrived to study for his 'A' Levels at the FE college there, and made contact with us.

After the Falade's left we took on some friends of theirs as our next lodgers. They were also students and were called Florence and Solomon Adetunge. While staying with us their baby was born and brought up for two years living in their room with them. What a joy that was! I will never forget Solomon's reaction to having passed his exams. He quite literally jumped for joy, all round the garden, dancing and singing at the top of his voice.

So when a young Nigerian came to our chapel in Effingham recently one Sunday and sat alongside me I was interested to talk to him. I discovered that he was doing a course in Bookham which finished with exams that he had to take on the Friday, at the end of that week. He had to leave his B&B that night and had nowhere to stay. So as I no longer have Fireman John staying with me when he is on call, I decided to offer the room to this student, Jerry Bukola. So the week was spent encouraging and cheering him on and finding that he was equally ecstatic when his exams were over. He went down on his knees and presented me with a beautiful bunch of flowers and a card and has left three bottles of Body Shop shower gel as a thank-you. Amazingly, through a friend of his who is a policeman in Lagos, Nigeria who Jerry persuaded to go round to the last address that I had there for Betty and Michael, he was able to make contact with Betty Falade's family in Lagos, and although Betty didn't believe I could be still alive I have recently had a phone call from her!



War casts a very long shadow

On 4th August 1914 the world changed for ever in a conflict that still has repercussions today. History tells us that the WWI peace treaty, signed at Versailles on 28th June 1919, sowed the seeds of Hitler's rise to power and was one of the main causes of WWII, and possibly the almost constant unrest in the Middle East! Millions have died on both sides, fighting for an ideal. A "Just" war!!

My grandmother lost her husband, a brother and a brother-in-law in the trenches in France. I remember her always dressed in black or navy. When she died in 1974 she had been a widow for 56 years, forced to bring her baby up alone and to find work at a local laundry in East London just to keep food on the table. After her death I found my Grandfather's medals and a few photographs. One smudged with tears, pictured her brother Bill and his friend and brother-in-law Walter who were both killed on 20th May 1917. On the reverse is a quote "He gave his life for others. What can a man do more for his God, his fellow creatures and the honour of his Corps."

She never spoke about WWI and WWII was about rationing and servicemen billeted in her spare room. My Mum married one of the servicemen, who was in the RAF but part of an air command unit on an HQ ship on D-Day. He didn't talk about the war much either!

Now our TV screens show Iraq erupting into civil war and atrocities done just for the cameras. Dave and I were among a million people who tried to say "Not in my Name" in London in 2003 but were ignored.

Sadly WAR seems an inevitable part of life throughout our world, with catastrophic consequences for our future. Millions of refugees, living in camps full of death and disease.

So all we can do is pray: ...**O God make it stop!**

Please help the United Nations, which held its first meeting in Methodist Central Hall, Westminster in 1946, to broker a more lasting peace in the war hotspots throughout the world. Help inter-faith groups to work for peace, tolerance and human rights. Especially for women who suffer rape as a weapon of War. Help governments to control the illegal arms trade, and learn to talk more and fight less!

O God make it stop!

Rev. Kim Plumpton's visit to The Nomads

Our Rev. Kim Plumpton was invited to give a talk to the members of the Prompt Corner luncheon at the Nomad Theatre in Bishopsmead, East Horsley on Wednesday 21st May. We were delighted to welcome Kim and before the meal, our Chairman showed her around backstage. As is our custom, our speaker pulls out the cork from the drum for the monthly draw. She began her talk by telling us about her first Christmas raffle in Effingham, and this amusing anecdote was the start of an enlightening talk entitled "Using The Unexpected".

She said that as a youngster and into her thirties she was very shy but was encouraged to join her local amateur theatre company where she gained confidence. She and her husband Colin had five children so she decided to be a stay-at-home mum. However after a debilitating illness and with the support of Colin and their children, she eventually pulled through. When her vicar suggested she should enter the ministry she was amazed but with the enthusiastic support of her family she trained at Westminster College, Cambridge which enabled her to do her degree at Cambridge University. Part of this training was to spend time in Belmarsh Maximum Security Prison and also a three and a half week visit to Zimbabwe when the country was suffering from economic downfall with little food, water and electricity. Kim was impressed at how the local people managed to keep going, smiling under such dreadful circumstances.

Kim told us how in 2010, she and Colin moved from Birmingham to Cobham and about her involvement with the two churches there and our Methodist Church in Effingham. Apart from her numerous duties within the Church, she also finds time to be Pastoral Convenor for the Surrey Area and Assessor for General Assembly for candidates wanting to enter into ministry. Outside the Church Kim is associated with Women's Federation for World Peace (WFWP) under the umbrella of the UN. In 2013, travelling to Paris to represent the UK at a conference entitled "Building Lasting Peace in the Middle East", she met representatives from 21 countries and was delighted to meet Mrs. Vera Baboun, the new mayor of Bethlehem. We could have listened to Kim for ages, but after her allotted time, Kim was warmly applauded and our Chairman and members extended an invitation for a return visit.

THE DEBT TRAP: Exposing the impact of problem debt on children



The Children's Society has launched a campaign aimed at reducing the harm to children caused by problem debt; reducing the impact of problem debt on families; and introducing early interventions to prevent problem debt.

The report reveals the scale of the problem and “lifts the lid on how around two and a half million children are living in families with problem debt, behind on £4.8bn of payments on household bills and loan repayments.”

The research undertaken by Step Change analyzed an original survey of 2000 UK families, added information from an online YouGov survey of 4442 adults and interviewed 15 families to gain a qualitative dimension. Problem debt was defined as having current arrears with at least one household bill or credit commitment.

Many readers may use credit cards to pay for the big ticket items like holidays, Christmas and unexpected expenditure, but many in problem debt borrow to pay for essentials such as food, clothing and heating. The spiral of debt can push people into accessing more expensive forms of credit and this fuels even greater need for expensive short-term loans.

The particular concern in this report is on the impact of problem debt on children. “One mother described the ‘short week’ each month when the cost of sanitary products for her daughter affects what she has available for food. Other families weigh up similar choices about spending money on food or buying things for the children.”

The report is commended to you and churches may wish to consider practical support by becoming a money advice centre. Further information is available from Community Money Advice or Christians Against Poverty. Individuals could train through Citizens Advice and the government website moneyardviceservice.org.uk might be a useful tool.

From the desk

I have held the post of Synod Church and Society convener for nearly two years and this is the fourth newsletter. I am grateful to those who comment and use the publication to start conversations in church. I have visited a number of Synod Areas to promote the work and have learnt that many congregations are involved with a number of initiatives. I have a growing appreciation of individuals who concentrate efforts on particular aspects of Church and Society concerns like Fairtrade, Commitment for Life, Foodbanks, and Peace Fellowship.

Unlike other groups in the Synod and wider Church, I have not thought it necessary to meet as a committee to take the work forward. However I am keen to widen and deepen the profile of this aspect of the church's calling and would appreciate comment, feedback and suggestion in order to make this happen.

One way would be to ensure we could respond to requests from congregations and individuals to specific requests for help, advice and resource by linking those involved in particular action already with those looking to start an enterprise. This requires a network of knowledge, expertise and capacity throughout the Synod.

Another might be to arrange a Church and Society expo event inviting organisations to promote their interests and have a keynote speaker. (This would need a planning group and meetings!)

Please let me have your thoughts together with contact details for the 'champions' that you are aware of with the area of interest they hold.



Leatherhead Food Bank

The Leatherhead Food Bank has now been operating since the last weekend of September 2013 on every Saturday Morning from 10.00am to 11.30am at the North Leatherhead Community Centre in Kingston Road. It is run purely by teams of about six to eight volunteers, many from local churches but also from the community.

Those who call on us have to have a "Red" Voucher and are from a wide spectrum of our community. All those who come are in need of help and support and each voucher is issued by a partner agency such as the CAB. For each Voucher presented, depending on whether it's for a single person, couple or family, a package of food for three days and also toiletries and possibly pet food is offered.

Those who seek help vary from people in a sudden, usually multiple crisis situation to those who have long term problems, often facing multiple challenges. The highest proportion seem to be single people and couples, with little groups of families who arrive on certain Saturdays.

We offer a tea and coffee service, and volunteers to talk to and often pray with those who arrive. This is I suspect the only time many of these people have a safe place to discuss the quantum of their challenges, as the various agencies are often only interested in a particular aspect.

It would be difficult to generalise the difficulties but they include unemployment and lack of skills, ill health often with long term conditions, a significant number of often shorter term mental health conditions, family break up and homelessness.

The national media coverage strikes me as both a little histrionic and also not totally accurate in regards to those we see. I suspect that these individuals and families have existed for many years; the Food Bank though is now working as a safety net and a welcoming place for those at the bottom of society, somewhere they are not judged but helped.

The last available statistics we have for the end of March show that the four food banks in our federation:

(Epsom, Ewell, Merland Rise and Leatherhead) fed 1220 people in the previous six months from October. North Leatherhead residents used 135 vouchers, behind the highest area which was Court Ward/Longmead Estate in Epsom.

The main causes according to our statistics are Benefit delays 28.4%, Low income 25.9%, Benefit changes 11.2% and Debt 10%.

So what should we do? As individuals and families, please donate food etc. at Tesco's and other collection points, consider being a volunteer, or give a financial donation. Please pray for the project and volunteers.

Finally talk to people you meet about the facts. More are available if you want more information.

NEW FIRE

Our “contemporary” service New Fire has seen a few changes since it began almost six years ago. There has been a complete change of clergy at our three churches and the musical leadership has passed from the Parish Church music group to Jay who has built so well on their firm foundations.

When asked, regulars say they value a number of things about New Fire. First among these is usually the informality. You will be reminded at the start of the service that you can stand, sit, dance or jump up and down during the songs. There is no pressure for uniformity and therefore no need to feel awkward, especially if you feel like a bit of a rest by the time we get to the fourth or fifth song!

On the subject of songs, please don't be put off by the word contemporary. Of course we have learnt new songs but there's a fair number of older worship songs that you will recognise from morning services and even (sorry to destroy any preconceptions) an occasional traditional hymn. Again, informality is key. If there's a song that's new to you, just listen and enjoy – there's no expectation that everyone will sing every song and before long you will know it and be able to join in. The band is led skilfully and sensitively by Jay and regularly includes some familiar faces from his old band (the oldest youth band in the world) for those who remember Triumph at BFree, as well as James on guitar and Ricardo on percussion.

New Fire continues to evolve and grow and in recent months we have been delighted to welcome two new young members of the band – Danielle on vocals and Caleb on guitar, together with the return of some familiar faces from the past – Martin on guitar and Caroline on vocals. We have also replaced the formal talk with personal testimonies, perhaps a return to traditional Methodism?

If you haven't been to New Fire for a while, or if you've never been before, why not come along and give it a try. It's on the fourth Sunday of each month at 6.30pm at LMC. We'll be there on 27th July, away in August, but back in force on 28th September...

New social enterprise launched by director of Centre for Social Justice

100 people attended an event hosted by Leatherhead Youth Project (LYP) to announce the launch of Allsaints, a new social enterprise being launched by LYP to benefit local young people. The new venture, a coffee shop and sandwich company which will provide work and qualifications for unemployed local young people who have no other opportunities, has been described by Leatherhead Youth Project as the 'missing link' in the work that they do with local young people.

Christian Guy, Director of the prominent think-tank the **Centre of Social Justice**, delivered the keynote speech on the night, describing the poverty-relief work his organisation supports and the impact communities can have when we work together to help those in need. The event also featured talks from key guests including Sian Sangarde-Brown, author of the Surrey Uncovered report which reveals hidden deprivation statistics across the county, who particularly highlighted the needs in Leatherhead North. Also speaking was Laura Thurlow of the Community Foundation for Surrey, who support grassroots community organisations across with funding grants and whom have been a huge supporter of the work Leatherhead Youth Project over the previous six years.

Allsaints was formally launched with the showcase of a new promotional video made by Leatherhead Business of the year Liquid Productions, with LYP Community Projects Manager, Andy Gill announcing that the coffee shop will open its doors to the public in September. In the mean time, LYP are seeking to raise £30,000 from within the local community in the next 60 days (finishing on 14th July), and have created an online fundraising page on website indiegogo to allow donations from individuals. The event was sponsored by ExxonMobil and supported by Leatherhead & District Chamber of Commerce.



- Leatherhead Youth Project has been running youth projects, including BFree Youth Café, for local young people aged 11-19 since 2005.
- Allsaints, a new community interest company (CIC) run by LYP, will be an independent coffee shop and sandwich company based in Leatherhead North run from our centre in All Saints Church/BFree Youth Café. It will be open to members of the public from 8am-3pm six days a week and then continue to be open to young people as BFree Youth Café after school and in the evenings. Allsaints will launch in September and will be a multi-purpose café space including WIFI, hot desking with six iMac computers, meeting room hire and a selection of lunch sandwiches and snacks.
- Allsaints will employ four local young people to begin with who will gain an apprenticeship in Customer Service and also gain food hygiene and first-aid qualifications. Allsaints will also help local young people to start their own businesses.

Principal points raised at the Leadership Team meeting on 27th May and additional points made at the subsequent Church Council on 3rd June.

Children and Families worker: The Parish Church will be employing a full-time Children and Families worker just for the Parish which will have implications for us. Some people mentioned that they felt things were moving forward too slowly. Lynda explained that we mustn't be in too much of a hurry about this as we have to do it right. We must improve our communication to all the people in our two churches. Pastoral Leaders can help make sure their pastoral group are aware of what is happening. We will make sure more information is placed on the board at the rear of the church. Stewards will also point our new information in notices etc. from the front of the church at the beginning of services.

Prayer Breakfast: The first prayer breakfast on 18th May went very well. Lynda commented on how wonderful it was to have the children feeling able to join in with sharing their prayers when surrounded by adults. This is a real testament to the parents, the junior church teachers and our church family; that the children feel comfortable and able to do this. The next Prayer Breakfast will be on 15th June at 9.00am.

Special Services at LMC

June began with the Circuit Easter Offering Service. It was a well balanced service following the title: 'Risk the path he trod', inviting us all to take risks in our own situations as part of the World Church family. An easy task compared with the desperate situations described in stories we heard.

The Easter Offering is one of the oldest services in the Methodist Church, beginning in 1884 when a group of women in Manchester dedicated their 'Christmas Pennies' to support women's work overseas. In 1987 Women's Network (now Methodist Women in Britain - MWiB) began the more organised service as we know it today. The E.O. today helps to support the work of the 65 Partner Churches overseas.

As a Circuit Service it was not well attended, just 35, although the majority of the churches were represented. I think it is still regarded as a 'woman thing', and not as the one event in the year for all to be together to celebrate our commitment to Overseas Mission.

It was an added pleasure, therefore, to see the building packed for the ecumenical Pentecost Service the following Sunday morning. It was also a pleasure to have with us Rev. Susan Loveday, a visiting preacher, a rare thing at LMC.

The three churches shared the responsibility for prayers and readings, with the clergy from St Mary's helping to distribute the elements at Communion. In her sermon, Susan emphasised the need to share together all our resources and talents as congregations covenanted together. Unfortunately the service was exceptionally long and many were not able to stay and socialise over refreshments at the end.

MWiB Area Day

Wokingham Methodist Church opened its doors to the ladies from the ten Circuits in the Western Area, so they could chew over the title 'Am I Bothered!' The title was adapted from the Connexional Conference in April at Swanwick, and the day was an opportunity to discuss with women closer to home some of the main concerns from that gathering. Communication was a bit lax, so the news about the day did not reach all Circuits, and that was reflected in the numbers attending. It was, nevertheless, an excellent day of fellowship, learning and socialising. One lady from Bracknell, who had never attended a MWiB event before, remarked that it was worth it just for the great laugh we had in the little church garden at lunchtime, with a mad scramble to escape a sudden heavy downpour as we finished.

Rev. Nick Thompson led the worship at the beginning, which included some inspiring words from Charity, a minister in training. Carol Jewell, our recently retired District President, led the first plenary session, bringing us up to date with the history of MWiB. She reminded us that women's activities in the Methodist Church go back to 1858 and how appropriate the butterfly is for the new movement. The life cycle of the insect has four distinct stages, each symbolising the development of MWiB. The 'egg stage' is the offer of new life to all who believe in Jesus; the caterpillar is the stage in which we grow as disciples. The chrysalis is our powerhouse of prayer and we then emerge as 'butterflies' a symbol of the resurrection and new life in Christ, freedom and perfection.

In the afternoon, Rev. Elizabeth Dunn-Wilson led the second plenary session focussing on the Dalit Partnership with the Church in North India. From September this will be the new District Project. (The present 4Aurora support totals £13,000+). Dalits are the lowest of the low, the untouchables. It is a caste that people are born into. In places they are known as the 'mongrel scavengers' where the women search the scrap heaps for anything that might make life more bearable.

MWiB aim to find ways to allow Dalit girls to get a decent education, and to build secure hostels. Linda Crossley (National President) established, during her visit to the area in 2013, links to ensure any monies will reach the necessary places of development. Much more information will become available as time goes on. A Dalit Solidarity pack is already out. (I have one).

Creative writing and craft group work produces some very thoughtful additions to the final worship. All in all, a good day. Pat and Freddie at Effingham could tell you more about their thoughts.

80 years ago

According to the Advertiser, "Sunday saw the final services in the Leatherhead Congregational Church in North Street where services had been held for the past 90 years. The church and site have been sold and the authorities are to erect a new building in the Epsom Road (*now the present Christ Church*). In the meantime, through the kind invitation of the Leatherhead Methodist Church, members of the Congregational Church will worship in the Methodist building."

So here we are again talking about the coming together of the two congregations although perhaps this time it won't take 80 years!

Continuing with history, the theme for this year's **Heritage Weekend** on **13th and 14th September** is "Life 100 years Ago" which will encompass the start of World War I in 1914.

Leatherhead Methodist Church will be opening its doors again to the general public, welcoming people with refreshments and having on display archives relating to the history of the church (built in 1893). Also we shall have the story of John Wesley's journeys and his last visit to Leatherhead in 1793 when he preached his last sermon.

18 members of the congregation enlisted in the armed forces during WWI and a memorial plaque in the tower porch of our church lists five members of the congregation who lost their lives including A E Weller (Miss) who is not recorded in the Town memorial. Apparently she was employed as a cook and is buried in the Parish churchyard.

Heritage Weekend gives us the opportunity of opening our church doors which normally remain closed for most of the week. Walkers and cyclists raising money for church restoration will visit on the Saturday and if you would like to help with the event please let me know.



Notes of Meeting on Working Together

Three groups have been set up between LMC and CC to look at mission, finance and working together. The latter group met on Thursday and agreed the following terms of reference: *to explore ways of working together better, bearing in mind our commonly agreed mission. As we were the first group to meet, we realised that to some extent we were putting the cart before the horse. However, we found plenty to discuss and made some recommendations.*

We agreed that communication was vital. Messages did not always get through, and some people in both churches felt "out of the loop". Carol Stoves and Jeanette Chamberlain were now sharing information and the situation was improving. The Link was very helpful. We also agreed that each church should have access to the other's membership list.

We discussed matters of church organisation, and decided that while we occupied two buildings, it was better kept separate. However, we would continue with joint elders and stewards meetings, approx. every three months.

It was decided to continue the monthly united services, encouraging more people to attend, and CC asked for help in running children's worship when they were hosts. It was felt that cell groups were a good way of deepening fellowship. Currently there were two, both led by LMC, and Lynda hoped there would be a third.

We talked about the combined church project - Heart for Romania - and events to support it. We agreed that some of the momentum seemed to have been lost, and we need a few well organised, well attended social events.

The group felt there could be more liaison over pastoral care and that CC elders could attend the LMC pastoral prayer meetings. Lynda mentioned that she had been approached about taking services at the Beeches, and that this could be something for the churches to do together.

We also discussed the appointment of a children's and families worker, noting that the Parish Church had decided to appoint their own.

Another meeting was arranged for Tuesday 29th July at 7.30pm at Mike Essex's.
