## The Minister Writes...

#### From Rev Gavin Hancocks

Dear Friends,

These past few months have presented us all with some significant challenges and probably more than a few questions about what the future might be holding for us. As usual, it's not so much about what the future holds as it is about who holds the future! I am really pleased to be able to confirm that our conversations over the past month and a bit have yielded the positive result of an appointment to the Circuit for the Leatherhead Churches and the Pastorate of the Rev Jan Hofmeyr as from the 1st September 2018 on an interim basis to be reviewed annually.

Jan comes to us from the Methodist Church of Southern Africa together with his wife Angela and they arrive in the UK in mid-August. Jan is a retired minister and he and Angela are relocating from South Africa to be nearer their UK based family who live in Wimbledon and Kingston-upon-Thames. Despite being retired, Jan had no hesitation in responding in the affirmative to my plea for help and we are grateful to the Connexion for enabling a somewhat unusual opportunity to become a reality.

Jan and I were ordained together at the Methodist Conference in 1988 in Queenstown, South Africa. Except for one period in which we served in the same District, our paths have not crossed much except that we were part of a group of ministers who were exploring contemplative spirituality together. Jan brings with him a great deal of experience of a diverse ministry covering a period of huge instability and great change in both country and church. He has also served as a Superintendent Minister in two different appointments and latterly has been working as a retired minister in a United Church in South Africa. These partnerships include Anglican, Congregational, Methodist and Presbyterian congregations coming together to share in ministry and mission.

As I said above, Jan's appointment is an interim one that we trust will enable us to engage in an effective review of the Pastorate and the partnership between the Leatherhead Methodist Church and Christ Church United Reformed Church. As all of that unfolds,

decisions will be made about the future shape of ministry about which we will say more as they become apparent. For the moment we give thanks to God for the provision made and look forward to welcoming Jan and Angela in September. Jan's Welcome Service will take place at LMC at 3pm on Sunday 2<sup>nd</sup> September and the Rev Conrad Hicks will be the preacher. Please note that date in your diaries.

We can't look forward without also looking back. David and Carol have written a note of farewell to Lynda and John, expressing our gratitude for the gifts Lynda has brought to this appointment and to that I would also like to add the gratitude and thanks of the Circuit Leadership Team to Lynda for her ministry amongst us. Lynda has helped give shape and direction, especially to the initiatives with intergenerational worship at LMC, amongst others, and her pastoral ministry is greatly appreciated. Unfortunately, circumstances changed, and we were not able to sustain what Lynda required and so we bid both Lynda and John farewell. We wish them well and pray God's continued blessing on them both as the next stage of their journey unfolds.

Of course, we are not only saying goodbye to Lynda and John but also to Hannah and Jack. Jane Smith has very kindly written elsewhere in The Link expressing our gratitude for Hannah's ministry amongst us, so I commend that to your attention. Yours in the Gospel, Gavin



#### From Rev Kim Plumpton

Dear Friends,

Dreams are funny things aren't they, they have the ability to comfort us, confuse us and sometimes scare the living daylights out of us. I have always been given to dreams and as a child suffered night terrors as well, which were difficult to grapple with, a place where I was neither awake or asleep. I remember one particular night screaming hysterically, my father wrapping his arms around me trying to comfort me, yet all I could see were spiders crawling everywhere. As I have grown older I am less given to night terrors, sleep walking or sleep talking, thank goodness.

Of course in the bible dreams are often channels for God communicating with individuals, in the Old Testament we see Joseph as one who not only experiences dreams but is also one of the most famous dream interpreters. In the New Testament we are witnesses to Joseph where God sent an angel to him in a dream, convincing him that Mary's pregnancy was of God. After the birth of Jesus God sent two more dreams, one to tell Joseph to take his family to Egypt and another to tell him Herod was dead and that he could return home. Dreams are not unfamiliar channels for God to make his purposes known.

The very familiar piece 'Footprints' begins with the words 'one night a man had a dream, he dreamt he was walking with the Lord.....' dreams speak to us.

So make of it what you will but I offer you a dream I had one Sunday morning because I believe it is for us all.

"It was a hot day and I had chosen to go to the local park. The park itself was not familiar to me. It was a large open space with little shade from trees so I decided to erect a tent. The tent was only big enough to accommodate three of us, I was unsure who the other two people were but we were equipped with bottles of cool water for us to drink. I sat at the opening of the tent and smiled at people walking past, inviting conversation where I could. Whilst spending time talking to others I turned around to discover that the tent that originally could only accommodate three of us, was now extended. In fact what looked like a huge navy sheet now covered the back of the tent. The tent itself was now five times bigger with more bottles of water piled up in one corner. Suddenly people came into the tent, some from the front and others from the back seeking shade from the hot sun, thirsty and in need of water which they were given. They sat in the cool of the tent and talked about life and in the gentleness of the moment we touched upon our faith, it was not forced but organic and spontaneously beautiful. There was an attentiveness to the conversation with questions being freely asked about God. In time more and more people came in and left when they felt the time was appropriate. It was during those moments I felt a voice say 'people are in need, offer what you have and what they need, it is not difficult."

I woke very excited and with a great sense of joy, there wasn't anything complicated happening in my dream yet it was exciting and invigorating. In the tent we were reaching people in such a simple way, people's thirst was being quenched, not doing anything extraordinary simply being a presence, offering hospitality.

Is it about being fully present in the moment, about recognising that our presence regardless of where we are is an opportunity for God to work? I think it is. Is it about identifying that what we have to offer: no matter how small or simple or insignificant it may seem to us, it is still a place where abundant fruit can grow? Perhaps so! Is it about identifying what that need might be that entices people to sit with us and speak with us? I get the feeling that in the simplicity of this dream the indications are that we need not strive as hard as we do, that somehow the less obvious options are staring us in the face and will not stretch us beyond what we are already able to do.

As I continue to ponder on the many possibilities concerning this dream I wonder if there are those among us who have other interpretations, so I offer this dream to you and ask you to see if it speaks to you and if so drop me a line on <a href="kimp-822@hotmail.com">kimp-822@hotmail.com</a> What do you think God is saying to us?

### Heritage Weekend ~ Effingham Chapel

The Chapel will be open for *Heritage Open Days* weekend again this year, on Friday 14<sup>th</sup> and Saturday 15<sup>th</sup> from 10am to 5pm and on Sunday 16<sup>th</sup> from 12noon till 4pm with an Exhibition and refreshments including ploughman's lunch and cream teas with home-made cakes and scones.

Heritage Open Days theme for 2018 is Extraordinary Women, in recognition of the centenary of the Universal Suffrage Act, when (some) women finally gained the right to vote. But as well as celebrating the unique achievements of the suffragists, and suffragettes, we'll look at women who have changed our lives, in both large and small ways. Women like Ada Lovelace, the first computer programmer, who was married to the Earl of Lovelace, Lord of the manor of Effingham in 19<sup>th</sup> Century; Bess Raleigh, who fought for her right to inherit; Mary Anning, fossil hunter and palaeontologist; and farmer's wife Ann Lamplugh, a founder member of our Chapel.


The exhibition also includes Village history, including local heroes :

**Lord Howard of Effingham**, of Armada fame, and WWII hero

Sir Barnes Wallis.

We've also been researching more of Effingham Methodists' early history and how our Society first worshipped before the Chapel was built.

Most counties in England have an annual 'Ride & Stride', on the second Saturday in September, to raise money for church restoration and repair. Cyclists (and walkers) are given a list of participating churches in their area, but map out their own route by bike or on foot, and then get friends to sponsor them for a fixed amount per church visited. The money collected is divided into two, with half going to the church of the cyclist's choice; the other half is retained by the Surrey Churches Preservation Trust for distribution to churches in need who apply for a grant. In the dozen or so years that the Bike Ride has been running, Surrey has raised over £250,000.

Suffragettes in Surrey
Surrey History Centre in
Woking has been awarded
£100K grant by Heritage Lottery Fund to explain the contribution local people made to
the cause of women's suffrage.
The story of Surrey's role will
be told on the Exploring Surrey's Past website, with let-

be told on the **Exploring Surrey's Past website**, with letters, photos, books and newspaper cuttings.

Surrey was home to many notable activists and organisations on both sides of the debate which raged for decades, including Mary Seton Watts, a women's rights campaigner and wife of the famous artist GF Watts, and Dame Ethel Smyth, the Woking composer who was imprisoned for her suffragette activities. The county witnessed key moments in the long-running campaign, including Emily Davison stepping out in front of the King's horse at the 1913 Epsom Derby, dying of her injuries four days later, and Emmeline Pankhurst being implicated in the bombing of a house in Walton-on-the-Hill being built for David Lloyd George, then Chancellor of the Exchequer.

Methodists were for & against the Vote which split society. Suffragists were peaceful but ineffective! Suffragettes used violence and arson to get publicity! Anti's claimed to speak for the silent major-

ity!

We're researching this thorny subject for our **Heritage Exhibition in September** and what it meant locally here in Effingham! Our only true Methodist link so far is that some of the early Suffragette meetings took place at **Methodist Central Hall, in Westminster** and it has continued to host many meetings seeking women's rights and equality ever since. **A1P**




#### **Prayer Breakfasts**


