From Rev. Kim Plumpton

Dear friends,

This time of the year gives rise to spring school, when the ministers from Southern Synod gather for a time of teaching and fellowship. An opportunity to be refreshed by the teaching we receive, to have time to share with ministerial colleagues the joys and sorrows of ministry.

We were blessed to receive teaching from Revd Dr Stephen Barton lecturer at Durham University and author of many books such as 'The Spirituality of the Gospels,' 'Reading Genesis after Darwin,' amongst others.

Our key theme for the week was centred around this, if we believe that the bible is the key source of moral guidance, then what kind of guidance does the bible offer? Especially in light of the fact that the bible was written in a world so different from our own. How is it to be interpreted, given that some of the issues we face today were unthinkable in biblical times? Drawing on recent scholarship, we would consider various approaches to the use of the bible in Christian ethics.

Now it has to be said that by the time we got to the end of the week we had been intellectually challenged by the intensity of the lectures, and by the depth of teaching we had received. The lectures were full of meat, worthy of digesting at a slower pace than we had during our time at Spring School, so I resolved to process them when I returned.

Only on my return I found that my notes and his, 50 pages in total, were so complex, my hope of sharing some of them in this letter was misguided, (Sorry if you thought for a moment you were about to receive some amazing insights, you may well have to purchase one of his books).

Why? Because to some extent it was in a language I struggled to understand. This is no reflection upon Revd Dr Stephen Barton whose intellect and theological reflections are applauded in the academic world, but more of a reflection of where I find myself today. There was a time in the recent past where I would have fitted into that world more readily but today the practical application of theological understanding is foremost in my mind. In what way will the teaching I receive impact upon my ministry and therefore my ministry to others. It seems to me as we journey through this world revelation whether academic or practical is of little use to us if we are not in the right place to receive it.

I was struck recently by the interaction of the Holy Spirit on the day of Pentecost. Many are gathered, an extraordinary sound fills the air, so loud people come running. The scene is dramatic and confusing: "They're speaking our languages, describing God's mighty

works!^{"12} Their heads were spinning; they couldn't make head or tail of any of it. They talked back and forth, confused: "What's going on here?"¹³ Others joked, "They're drunk on cheap wine." Acts 2:11-13 (The Message).

Yet amongst all the confusion about 3,000 are added to their number.

Being in that right place to receive the Holy Spirit's direction, to recognise the way the Holy Spirit moves through us and through others, the way it weaves around us, dances between the earthly and the heavenly, may often leave us feeling confused. For it goes where it will and more often than not conforms to a spirituality that makes us a little nervous. For at times it nudges us in directions we'd rather not go and we don't always understand what it asks of us. Where does that leave me? I suppose in the knowledge that I will never understand everything, there are times, for whatever reason, that I am unable to receive what God intends to give, but that's ok. It's okay because somehow God works through our weakness, our humanness and even through the confusion he can add to the king-

dom those who are just like me!!







Dorking and Horsham Circuit NEWSLETTER

Dear Friends,

As we move into the second half of 2017 we enter 'Ordinary Time' on the Christian calendar. That is the time between Pentecost and Advent, when it all starts all over again! However, as I mull that thought over, it seems to me that this is going to be anything but 'Ordinary' time!

As I write this column we are caught up in campaigning again that, by the time you read this, is going to have shaped our reality once again. I wonder what that shape will be? The political turmoil we have been living through these past years seems to be growing and all around the globe. Henry Thoreau's observation of '...leading lives of quiet desperation...' (Walden Chp1) seems to be taking on new significance. Somehow, the frustration has built/is building and all over people are questioning the values that have shaped our lives previously.

What I find disturbing is the extent to which that questioning appears to be a regression. As I think back over the struggle against Apartheid in South Africa, one of the challenges was dealing with the 'Laager mentality' – circling the wagons. Somehow, as we find ourselves stretched by the challenges of diversity and inclusivity, we seem to reach a point where we just give up and narrow down the focus and form the 'Laager' once again. It's hard not to when we feel threatened and overwhelmed by the anticipated tsunami supposedly looming large on the horizon.

However, we have just lived through the period of an altogether different tsunami in the Christian calendar – the tidal wave of God's love! Despite the narrow focus of his detractors Jesus refused to allow that mindset to shape his own. Rather, he reminded us that no matter how overwhelming the problem, God's love is always bigger. What we fear most is that the supply will be quenched, the well will dry up, we will be left with nothing. Nothing could be further from the truth. The Cross, the Grave and the Flames of Fire all speak to us of the superabundance of God's provision. Just when everything seemed lost the love of God exploded again into the world and still it does today. My prayer for us is that as God's church in the world today we will allow ourselves to get lost in that tidal wave and in so doing dispel the wave of fear and despair looming on the horizon. (John 12:24)



Writing to Wesley ?

Can you help transcribe the earliest Methodist letters?



Among the thousands of documents held in the **Methodist Archives and Research Centre** at Manchester University's *John Rylands Library* are 153 letters written by ordinary people who joined the Methodist movement in its earliest years. They date from 1730s -1780s and are particularly significant as they are mainly written by women. Rarely heard voices!.

The letters were written in response to a request from **Charles Wesley** for testimonies from members of the new Methodist societies that could be used to encourage and exhort others to faith. They are full of rapture and visions, anguish and

yearning. Although steeped in the language of the period, the Bible and preaching of the day, they reveal real people, with recognisable doubts and problems, as well as lives transformed by their experience of God. A glimpse of the first people called Methodists.

Academics have studied them for years, but most people in the Methodist Church will not know that they exist. They are now digitised and available online, but difficult to read, like all hand-written documents ! This is where YOU can help !

Methodist Heritage needs volunteers to become transcribers. Each letter will be checked by 3 people, who may interpret words differently !
