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# *The Ministers Write...*



## **From Rev. Kim Plumpton**

Dear Friends,

In these coming weeks we move ever closer to Easter but it is not just a journey that we make towards the cross but a journey towards God. For each of us lent will provide us with an opportunity to come ever closer to God.

*"Lent is an invitation to be reborn, an invitation to die. An invitation to allow ourselves to be overwhelmed with God's love for us. An invitation to journey deep inside ourselves and come face to face with the wonder of our hidden being. An invitation to discover the mystery of who we are that Christ should gladly sacrifice himself for us. Lent is an invitation to face up to our fears, a time to respond to Gods call." Joan Brown.*

It is in the moments of quiet contemplation or in study or in the times of fasting that we deliberately confront who we are in light of the cross. It is at the cross and the resurrection that God reveals the extent of his love for us. Engaging with this kind of love I find very challenging because it rises beyond any concept that I can grasp.

Every year I find myself buried in a swathe of lent material and as I come towards my preparations for Maundy Thursday, Good Friday and Easter morning I find myself almost overwhelmed not by the extra work that it might entail, but by the intensity of the event. How I can come even conceivably close to representing the love that is poured out for each of us on the cross and at the resurrection. I am made abundantly aware not just of my frailty but of God's grace and the depth of God's love for his creation. No amount of words however well they are liturgically crafted can even come close to representing such love.

Yet the journey towards Easter confronts us in such a way that we cannot overlook it, we cannot walk around it or ignore it, this love is too strong, it is a love that shouts out to us that no one is beyond redemption.

As we journey towards Easter this transformative love challenges us, reforms us, holds us, equips us and offers us hope beyond our expectations. What can we offer in return? Only ourselves but I suspect that is exactly what God requires of us, to offer as much of ourselves as we possibly can.

May you be truly blessed this Easter.

## ***From Rev. Ian Howarth***

Dear Friends,

For me, Lent and Passiontide is perhaps the most meaningful time of the Church's year.

It offers us a time for space and reflection, in groups, in worship and on our own, and at its heart is that incredible story of the last days of Jesus' life. That story, so full of meaning still touches me deeply, as it confronts the stark reality of our world.

Our reflection on the passion story challenges those who say that religion is an escape from the real world. As we travel with Jesus those last days, we realise that Jesus himself had to confront conflict and suffering, doubt and fear, and in our devotions we can acknowledge the conflict and suffering, doubt and fear in our own lives, and reflect on how they are shaped and transformed through our relationship with Jesus, who is beautifully described in a new hymn in Singing the Faith, as wounded Healer, hated Lover and broken Victor.

There is a real temptation in religion to put up barriers to help us escape from the pressures of the world, but that is not the way of the cross. The healing, the love and the victory that Christ brings, come through the wounds, the hate and the brokenness, not from running away from it.

This challenges us as his followers to live in the real world with all its ambiguities, with all its pain and suffering, and to seek to be his agents of healing and love within it, despite our weakness.

Sadly, the evidence is that when religious people put up barriers to protect themselves, they tend to cut themselves off from those in need, and in the name of orthodoxy can find themselves discriminating against others on grounds of gender, race or sexuality.

Jesus cut through the barriers, but it cost him. However, it is through bearing that cost, that he opens the way out for us to his healing, love and victory.

I pray that as we reflect on the passion of Jesus this Lent and Holy Week, we will again be inspired to follow him out in the real world, acknowledging the reality of conflict and suffering, of doubt and fear, but confident that as we face them with Jesus, his sacrificial love will bring real transformation and new life.

## **A letter from Lynda Russell (your incoming Minister)**

Your stewards have asked me to write a personal introduction, so that when I arrive you will already know a little about me. So as we journey through this season of Lent, let me tell you something of my life journey with God which brings me to this point.

### *The Journey begins...*

I grew up in Chessington and then New Malden (in the Kingston Circuit), where I attended Chessington Methodist Church for most of my 'formative' years. Through the love and care of people there I encountered Jesus and heard his call to commit my life to him at the age of 15. After three years at University at Warwick I went to France to teach English in a primary school for a year, sadly a difficult and unhappy time other than my involvement in a church with a lively youth group! However while there, I decided to go to study the Bible (since I knew very little!), so I went to a Bible School near Paris. It was during this time that I heard God's call to follow and serve full time. I thought then that this would entail staying in France as a missionary, but after a painful broken engagement not long before the wedding this didn't happen!

### *The Journey continued...*

For some time I continued working and doing lots of things in the Church. I taught in Sunday School, I served on the Church Council and so on, but I also knew that God had a plan for my whole life which was working itself out in all I was doing. The Easter People event (which I went to for many years, and now ECG [*Equipping, Calling Going - the National Christian Conference. Ed.*]) was again and again a time when God spoke to me through the Holy Spirit and confirmed not only His intimate and deep love for me, but also His hand on my life. During these years God also called me to become a Local Preacher. I worked for two years in the DHSS, and then in a manufacturing company as a team leader, production manager, and translator. Somewhere along the way I met my husband, John and we moved to Wallington, near Croydon. I left the manufacturing company and retrained in IT and became an IT software trainer.

### *Surprises on the Journey...*

In 2003 I was working as a trainer in a charity when I was made redundant. Although this had been expected (the usual 'downsizing') I found it difficult and wondered what to do next. I put all my energies into trying to get a new job, but then to my surprise suddenly realised that God was telling me to stop and wait for new direction. I waited for a few months, and then went to see the Superintendent to offer my temporary services in the circuit for whatever needed doing (I thought).

However what came out of that meeting was indeed a new direction, since he suggested I consider candidating for the Ministry. As he spoke I had a real conviction this was the right path for me, a continuation of God's call to full-time ministry and service in the church begun all those years ago. So I offered to the Methodist Church as a candidate for Presbyteral ministry and after many interviews was accepted.

### *On-going Journey...*

I trained full-time at Wesley House, Cambridge for two years, and now have been working and living in East Peckham near Tonbridge for the past 4½ years. I have pastoral charge of the village church, and what I call a 'part-share' in an Anglican-Methodist LEP in the nearby town of Paddock Wood, which occupies 30% of my time, where I work closely with the Vicar and Curate.

I want to encourage us all on our journey with God, who at this time of Lent and Easter calls each of us to follow the way of the Cross through to Resurrection. I have seen this time and again as God has led me onwards over the past years, through the ups and downs, through the 'wanderings' and the 'wonderings', that Christ's way of love and service to others leads to transformation and blessing. I am so looking forward to joining you all in September and to hearing your life stories as well.

**12th & 26th March at 11.00am**





# Beware the Ides of March!

Who can possibly forget that dire warning given to Julius Caesar by the Soothsayer in Shakespeare's play? And the warning was justified because his enemies were plotting against him and he was stabbed to death on the steps of the Senate House that very day in spite of another encounter he had with the Soothsayer in the morning, when he pointed out to him that the day had come and he was still alive, and the Soothsayer replied that the day had not yet gone!

But what is significant about the Ides of March? In my family it was significant because it was my mother's birthday, but what about Roman times? Apparently it was just part of the Roman calendar founded by Romulus the founder of Rome and the ides marked the middle of every month, and the one in March was no more intimidating than any other ide. So the Soothsayer was simply telling Caesar to watch his back, as people were plotting to kill him. That is a relief to me, as I am planning to go by train to visit my friends in Sheffield on that day, so I turned to my Bible notes for that day, "Words for Today" and looked at the reading from Job 26: 5-14. It contains these words:

"What a fine help you are to me, poor weak man that I am! You give such good advice! Who can know how truly great God is?"

What a pity Caesar didn't feel this about the Soothsayer! Let us hope that we can pray this prayer on March 15th:

"Praise be to God for nesting boxes, crocus bulbs and butterflies, for tadpole ponds and window boxes and trellis by the door. Praise be to God for grass that's cut and grass gone wild, for trees that tower, leaves being raked and soil to be dug. Praise be to God for seedlings and cuttings, hedges and patios, bushes in bud and hedgehogs. Praise be to God for a world on our doorsteps."

**SUPERINTENDENT'S LETTER**

Dear Friends,

Early in January I heard on the radio of a vicar who insisted on not putting up the Christmas tree in the church until Christmas Eve and then leaving it up for the full forty days of Christmas – much to the amusement and sometimes annoyance of the villagers. ("When are you going to get rid of that Christmas tree, vicar?")

The fact that Christmas lasts forty days was news to me. I always thought it lasted twelve days, finishing on Epiphany (6<sup>th</sup> January). But in some high church circles it seems that it lasts right through to 2<sup>nd</sup> February, known as Candlemas, the day which commemorates the presentation of the baby Jesus at the temple.

The great truths of the Christian faith are actually timeless. The fact that God became a man in Jesus; that Jesus died for our sins; that he conquered death and was raised to glorious new life; that he sent the Holy Spirit as our guide and strength – all these things are part of our day to day experience of God. They are reasons for constant celebration and thanksgiving. We shouldn't remember them only on Christmas Day, Good Friday, Easter Sunday and Pentecost and then forget about them for the rest of the year.

But having a whole season when we can focus our thoughts on particular aspects of our faith is a good idea. It means that over the course of the year we have chance to think through the major themes and really appreciate them.

By the time you read this, the Lent will have started – forty days in which we think about the passion and suffering of our Lord. It's important to have such an extended time to do this, especially with Good Friday occurring midweek. These days some people are committed to work and not able to take time to mark the day Jesus died.

As a minister I am usually involved enough in various services and events over Holy Week that I find myself living through the passion narrative in reasonable detail. But those who only come to church for the Sunday services find themselves leaping from the celebrated arrival of Jesus on Palm Sunday to the joy of the resurrection on Easter Sunday. One day to mark the death of Jesus is not nearly enough. Blink and you miss it. Lent gives us the time we need to absorb what Jesus did for us on the cross.

And one day of Easter is not nearly enough either. The presence of the risen Christ should be a constant source of joy and wonder through the seven weeks after Easter, right up to the day of Pentecost when we shift our thinking to the coming of the Holy Spirit.

Over the coming few months may you find time to appreciate and wonder at all Christ has done for us – firstly in his willingness to die for us, and secondly in his triumphal victory over the grave.



# Glimpses of God

The other Sunday morning we were shown some very out of focus pictures. The congregation was asked to guess what they were. Of course, we couldn't, not until they were brought into proper focus, and we could all see they were a lion, the Pope, the Queen, Ian, and lastly, Pippa Pig. The only one we got more quickly than the others was Ian! Perhaps because it was one of the last shown and our eyes had got more used to seeing through the vagueness, or perhaps, because of all those illustrated, he was the most familiar. The visual aids were demonstration of the Transfiguration of Christ and how the disciples could not recognise the Christ they knew so well. The blinding light of his appearance put everything out of focus.

And even today, that is still a problem. Do we always recognise God in unusual circumstances when he is staring us in the face? It is not God's way to shout 'Hey! Here I am, look at me!' He wants us to find out for ourselves.

Early in 2010, Haiti was affected by a violent earthquake, resulting in horrific destruction and the loss of many thousands of lives. The television coverage showed dramatic scenes of those who were lucky enough to escape, sitting silently in wide-eyed bewilderment. Yet the first words of a woman, rescued after being entombed for eight days, were 'Thank you, Lord.' In the midst of the horror, she recognised God's presence. There were similar reports after the rock-fall in a mine in Chile. After many days, the miners were rescued. On being brought to the surface, the miners fell on their knees, and gave thanks. When John McCarthy and Terry Waite were held hostage in Beirut for so long, it was their recognition of God that helped them through their times of despair.

Most of our lives are very ordinary, yet we still have occasions when we experience our own 'rock-fall' that knocks us for six and we cannot think straight. Or there is the 'earthquake' that shakes us to our very foundation and our hold on life seems precarious. Although such traumas are upsetting in their own way, and life is out of focus for a while, can we still catch a glimpse of God listening out for our cries of distress? Or do we accept that He is there all the time and will respond because that is the way we always view our experiences? I hope so.

## **BBC Lent Talks 2012 (continued)**

As I scientist then, I am not ashamed or embarrassed to be a Christian. After all, Christianity played a large part in giving me my subject.

The mention of Kepler brings me to another issue. Science is, as I said earlier, by and large a collaborative activity. Yet real breakthrough is often made by a lone individual who has the courage to question established wisdom and strike out on his own. Kepler was one such. He went to Prague as assistant to the astronomer Tycho Brahe, who gave him the task of making mathematical sense of observations of planetary motion in terms of complex systems of circles. The view that perfect motion was circular came from Aristotle and had dominated thought for centuries. But Kepler just couldn't make circles fit the observations. He then decided on the revolutionary step of abandoning Aristotle, approaching the observations of the planets from scratch and seeing what the orbits actually looked like. Kepler's discovery, that the planetary orbits were not circular but elliptical, led to a fundamental paradigm shift for science.

Kepler had the instinct to pay careful attention to things that didn't fit in to established theory. Einstein was another such. For things that don't fit in can lead to crucial advances in scientific understanding. Furthermore, there are things that do not fit in to science. For, and it needs to be said in the face of widespread popular opinion to the contrary, science is not the only way to truth. Indeed, the very success of science is due to the narrowness of the range of its questions and methodology. Nor is science co-extensive with rationality-otherwise half our university faculties would have to shut. There are bigger matters in life - questions of history and art, culture and music, meaning and truth, beauty and love, morality and spirituality and a host of other important things that go beyond the reach of the natural sciences - and, indeed, of naturalism itself. Just as Kepler was initially held back by an assumed Aristotelianism could it not be that an apriori naturalism is holding back progress by stopping evidence speaking for itself?

It is to such things that my mind turns at this time of Lent. In particular, to the person of Jesus, the man, above all others who did not fit in to the pre-conceptions of this world. Just as Kepler revolutionized science by paying close attention to why the observations of the planets did not fit in to the mathematical wisdom of the time, I claim that my life and that of many others has been revolutionized by paying close attention to why Jesus did not, and still does not, fit in to the thinking of this world. Indeed, the fact that Jesus did not fit in is one of the reasons I am convinced of his claim to be the Son of God. For instance, Jesus does not fit in to the category of literary fiction. If he did, then what we have in the Gospels is inexplicable. It would have required exceptional genius to have invented the character of Jesus, and put into his mouth parables that are in themselves literary masterpieces. It is just not credible that all four Gospel writers with little formal education between them just happened simultaneously to be literary geniuses of world rank.

Furthermore, there are relatively few characters in literature that strike us as real persons, whom we can know and recognise. One of them is my intellectual hero, Socrates. He has struck generation after generation of readers as a real person. The reason for that is that Plato did not invent him. So it is with Jesus Christ. Indeed, the more we know about the leading cultures of the time, the more we see that, if the character of Jesus had not been a historical reality, no-one could have invented it, for the simple reason that he did not fit in to any of those cultures. The Jesus of the Gospels fitted nobody's concept of a hero. Greek, Roman and Jew all found Him the very opposite of their ideal.


