From Rev. Kim Plumpton

Dear Friends,

Recently a group of us went to Sevenoaks for a session with Lucy Moore the founder of Messy Church, the session was called 'Making disciples in Messy Church.' *

"The first Messy Church began in 2004 when a group at St Wilfrid's in Cowplain near Portsmouth were frustrated because, as a church, they were hardly reaching any children with God's story. They felt they had lovely buildings and facilities but weren't using them enough. They had creative people in the church, and the area needed as much community-building as possible."

Over the last ten years, Lucy has fielded many questions on what discipleship might look like for those families that attend Messy Church. For those at Cobham, Leatherhead and Effingham, it is of course a question that many of us have asked, what next? Hence why we were eager to attend the afternoon session.

Lucy's response was an eye opener for me and one which brought with it a reality that I had not quite appreciated, not just for Messy Church, but for the church in general. We often talk of scattering seed in the hope that it might fall on fertile ground but Lucy believes that we are not even at the stage of having prepared the ground ready to receive the seed. We are at the stage of trying to get the heavy stones out of the field. We are so far back in the process it may be a long time before the ground is ready to receive the seed. Lucy paralleled this with Messy Church families, there is no longer the foundation that once existed, and many have little or no understanding of the biblical narrative. What they do recognise is hospitality, a place to develop relationships, a safe place where they might be supported and encouraged to explore key themes.

The temptation is to hurry the process on but Lucy clearly teaches us that this is about a long term investment in families. It entices us to think of walking with families rather than individuals. The process of discipleship with messy church families may not look like the traditional view. It is not likely to encourage them to suddenly start attending a Sunday morning service or join a bible study group, but it may give rise to a new way of being church. But we must be open to understand that God is indeed doing a new thing.

In Effingham as you go into the church to one side is a notice which reads "Do all the good you can, by all the means you can, in all the ways you can, in all the places you can, at all the times you can, to all the people you can, as long as ever you can." - John Wesley.

Whatever the future holds for Messy Church and the church, Wesley teaches us that we are called to do all that we can, by all the means that we can and importantly in all the ways we can.

Now that is exciting. Let's not hold too tightly to what we have known before but to what might be.

News from Birmingham - Rev. Ian Howarth



Dear Friends,

It comes as something as a shock to realise that is now over eighteen months since we arrived here in Birmingham and I began my new role here as Chair of District. It was a wrench to leave a place where we had felt so settled both in the churches and the community, and the town where we had seen our children grow up. It was also strange to be moving just as a couple, ironically moving into an even bigger house than the Church Road manse, with a massive garden that keeps Barbara in particular very busy.

Mark does not seem particularly fazed by our move, other than having somehow grasped that my appointment is initially for six years, he keeps saying: '2018 mummy and daddy home from Birmingham!', although where he thinks home is we don't know as he is so happily settled in his supported living in Cranleigh.

David is now based in Whitehall in his Civil Service career, where at the moment he is enjoying the challenges of working for the Department of Health. Rosie is following her dream to be a choral conductor on the first year of two at the Welsh College of Music and Drama on the MA course there.

We have been surprised by how much we enjoy living in Birmingham. Moseley is a lovely place to be, not far from the city centre, (I usually cycle in to meetings there, as parking is so difficult!), but also easy to get out to the southern side, including to my mother in Evesham, only 45 minutes away. The cultural life is particularly rich, with high quality theatres, and the Symphony hall all on the doorstep.

Another difference is the cultural diversity of the city. Half the children in infants schools in Birmingham are from the Black Minority Ethnic communities, and there is a very significant Muslim population. Making links with Muslim groups is not easy, but what I have picked up at a couple of recent meetings with Muslims is the real fear of the established Muslim groups, with their middle-aged/elderly leadership, about the direction their young people are heading and their desperate desire to develop and teach a moderate

version of Islam. Some of our inner city churches are beacons of hope in bringing communities together across faith lines.

On the whole I am really enjoying the work of District Chair. It is challenging, particularly in recognising the steep decline in Methodist membership and trying to discern the way God is leading us and keeping the District mission focused rather than simply managing decline. It is both rewarding and frustrating preaching in a different church around the district, from Lichfield to Hereford, each Sunday. The variety and the warmth of the welcome is great to experience, but there are times when I miss the opportunity to work with a regular group of people to help develop a church's worshipping life. This is particularly true at festivals like Christmas and Easter, when I do miss the opportunity to celebrate as part of a church community.

A key part of the role is the oversight and pastoral care of the 60 ministers in the District, and particularly working with Circuit Superintendents to support them in their demanding roles, and this I find very rewarding and humbling. This comes to the fore particularly in stationing ministers to new appointments, where with my colleague Chairs we have to balance our pastoral care for ministers, the needs of local churches, and the overall shortage of ministers. This takes a significant amount of time between May and January.

I also have to oversee the business of the District. I have to chair three Synods each year, one just for ministers and two for all the ministers and lay representatives from circuits. Trying to make sure these are inspiring days, that conduct the business in a way that is focused on mission is a real challenge.

As the Methodist representative in the area, I find myself invited to some events to sit alongside Bishops and Moderators, and am building a good sense of colleagueship with some of them. It will be particularly sad to say goodbye to Roy Lowes, my URC counterpart when he retires this summer.

However, at heart, I think I am still a circuit minister in my DNA, and try and make sure I look at things from a local minister's point of view, when I am sitting on national committees and Chairs' meetings. The experience of 16 years at Leatherhead, and the variety it offered, is constantly brought into play.

We still think of folk often, and enjoy hearing from people. If anyone needs a place to stay in Birmingham we have plenty of room!

Chatterbus is on the Road


Chatterbus, the new local community bus service, is now in operation. In its orange and turquoise livery it is becoming a familiar sight, on weekdays between Oxshott, Cobham and Weybridge, and on Saturdays on the road to Fetcham and Leatherhead as well.

This is the first time on a Saturday that a public bus – C2 on Surrey County Council timetables - has been available to take Fetcham and Leatherhead residents on local journeys to Leatherhead station, town centre and Leisure Centre, and Woodbridge Tesco. Further afield, the Saturday service goes west to Oxshott, Cobham Station and town centre, Cobham Sainsbury's, and Brooklands Retail Park. For leisure time at some of the most interesting attractions in Surrey, C2 includes stops at Painshill Landscape Garden, Mercedes Benz World and Brooklands Motor and Aviation Museum.

Extracts from the timetable show that, for example, the first bus leaves Leatherhead North Street at 9.07am, and arrives at Brooklands Museum just before 10am. A family can enjoy over three and a half hours there before getting the bus back at 1.37pm. If shopping at Marks & Spencer or Tesco at Brooklands sounds like a good idea, leave Fetcham Orchard Close at 10.44am, spend just over two hours at the stores and be back by 2.22pm.

Chatterbus is run by a Community Interest Company (CIC), and was set up in response to the identification of Elmbridge as 'transport poor'. It was discovered that inadequate transport is limiting access for those without use of a car to a wider choice of shopping, entertainment, recreational attractions and sports facilities, as well as opportunities for employment, training and even access to state benefits, causing real hardship in some cases.

Fares are £2 per adult for a single journey and £1 for under-16s. Concessionary travel passes and disabled passes are accepted. Full details of timetables and fares, answers to frequently asked questions and access to regular newsletter updates are available at www.chatterbus.org.uk.

# **Reflections from Messy Church**

Just before Easter, a number of us went to a workshop on "Discipleship in Messy Church", led by Lucy Moore, who created the very first Messy Church. The question of "how to make disciples" is a very live one in the Messy Church movement. Messy Church is determined not to be "just" a fun activity for children, nor is it "just" a stepping stone to traditional Sunday morning worship. For many families, it is the only way they engage with church and we need to make sure that we are able to offer real opportunities to encounter God and grow in faith.



As ever, this was not a session that gave all the answers. But it did ask a lot of interesting questions! Like - how good are we at noticing when God is already at work? Can we stop fretting and celebrate what he's already doing, rather than trying to squash his work into a traditional model?

During the last few months at Messy Church, I have noticed an increasing openness among parents to chat about the Bible stories we are exploring. I have also noticed that prayers are being articulated, by both adults and children, which express deep needs. There is a sense that Messy Church is a safe place to talk about what's on your mind. And some of us have been able to pray with and for families who are going through difficult times and who wouldn't have much, if any, opportunity to be prayed for outside the Messy Church environment.

I also have to keep reminding myself that EVERY MONTH we welcome new families (how many Sunday churches can say that?!) EVERY MONTH, we explore the Bible, pray together, praise God and use our God-given creativity to share faith together. We do this across generations, with many people who would otherwise never come through the door of a church. Who knows where this will lead? Hopefully God does! Please pray for us as we enjoy the ride!



And the busier business gets the more young people Allsaints will be able to give this life enhancing opportunity to. Also this month, Allsaints has now opened up its hot-desking service alongside. 

# "One Mission" -MWiB District Day, Tonbridge

At the end of March, I went with Kim and Pat McElhill (Effingham) to the MWiB District Day at Tonbridge. These days are always good, with quality speakers, plus it is an opportunity to catch up with those I have known for many years, particularly women from the old London SW days.

This was no exception. Rev. Dr. Philip Luscombe, Assistant District Chair, began the morning session with a time of excellent worship, the essential to get the day off on the right foot. Rev. Alison Walker was the main speaker for the day. She had been a Mission Partner for three years in Florence, Italy. It may seem a little unnecessary that 'mission' is needed so close to home, but Italy is on the main route for refugees from North Africa, particularly girls and young women who have been caught up in trafficking.

During the morning period, Alison spoke of her work centred around the Methodist Church in the city. She was most surprised to find that a woman wearing a dog-collar was frowned upon, a difficulty to overcome before she even started! The congregation was small, with very few children, and the Methodist Church made very little impact on the community. On 'White Sunday' (and I am not sure of the time of the year, nor whether it was restricted to Florence), Alison found out the whole city emerges and jollification goes on all night, so it was decided that is what the church would do too! With her small band of helpers, the church was filled with numerous displays of art and ceramics, live music and movement,



food and drink. Interest was slow to begin with, almost as if people were afraid of the unusual in a church, but as the night wore on, a few ventured in and others followed. It was a great success! Alison illustrated her talk with a wonderful collection of slides.

Time with her in the afternoon was different again, concentrating on mission within our own churches, with audience participation. Listening to women speaking about all their churches do, made me think 'what exactly do we do at LMC?'.

Home mission at Leatherhead cannot be faulted. There is so much and it is very varied, from involvement with children and young people, to the Food Bank and much else, mostly working as Churches Together. Our Overseas Mission is mainly Junior Mission for All (in the process of change) and our Heart for Romania project. At least, that is what we are aware of! If we were to make a list of all that people do but do not ever shout about, it would be endless. Many sponsor children in India, used postage stamps and cards are collected for the Mission Aviation Fellowship, drivers are part of car pools, others help at hospital shops, and regular giving to favourite charities are just a few examples.

But - - could we, should we do more? When did we last have a coffee morning for charity, a quiz evening, a meal together or a plain old-fashioned social - enjoying each other's company and doing good at the same time? Is it that our attitude is we are too old? Too poor? Too lazy? Good idea, but don't ask me!" I wonder?




