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The Ministers Write...



From Rev. Kim Plumpton

Dear Friends,

It seems to have been a month when I have asked the same question to myself time and time again, how does God reveal himself to us? How can we know what is truth from that which is fanciful speculation? The Rev. Dr Janet Tollington, lecturer at Westminster College Cambridge, spent the morning with us at Cobham URC. 'An introduction to the Old Testament' was the theme for the morning and we welcomed a group of visitors from across the pastorate.

I remember thinking like so many people that the Old Testament was only something to be grappled with if you had several commentaries to hand, or a learned scholar to explain them. I spent hours under Janet's tutelage at College, always exciting and inspiring, Janet had such a gift in the way in which she revealed God to us through Old Testament scripture. I came to realise that I could find the God of the New Testament just as easily if I allowed myself to understand the context and literary style it was written in.

Janet's desire for the morning to be engaging, informative and stimulating was certainly fulfilled. By the end of the morning Janet had revealed to us the very beginnings of an educated and informative glance into the formulation of the texts.

Questions were quickly forthcoming. Why does the Old Testament appear to present the picture of a wrathful God who is happy to condone slaving others so that the faithful few can be saved? Many could relate to the suggestion that instead of grappling with the texts, the church has over the years remained silent, even the lectionary is selective. Theological understanding of the God of the Old Testament had remained the domain of the few, and little had been explained about the genre and literary perspectives found within the texts. In our Sunday Schools, the Old Testament stories have often been sanitised, cleansed and presented in such a way, there seems to be some disconnection between the God we knew as children and the God we would later read about as adults. Myths, poetry, allegories, parables or stories, all mixed together to create a sacred text, our difficulty is how we read it without recognising what we are dealing with.

There was a real sense of liberation as the biblical text was interpreted through our Hebrew scholar and teacher. How can we know that this wasn't simply fanciful speculation? Because it made sense, like pieces of a jigsaw puzzle coming together but it was something more, something within us seemed to affirm this truth. God had truly been revealed to us in a way that we might not have imagined when we first walked into the room. There have been calls for Janet to return next year to open up some of those particularly challenging texts for us, a request I hope to make possible.

Thank you to all who made the morning such an exciting occasion.

Dear Friends,

I always find November a reflective time of year. The nights draw in, the rush of Christmas is still a few weeks away, and events like Remembrance Sunday lead us to prayer for those who have died, and those who still suffer, as a result of our inability as human beings to live in peace with each other.

In a way it is a sombre time, it includes also at the beginning of the month the festivals of All Saints and All Souls, but it can also be a profound time when we consider prayerfully issues of loss and hope, and through which the presence of God can be truly felt.

Memory is important to who we are, both our individual memories and our corporate memory as a nation and as a church. It is why the loss of memory is such a disturbing and tragic thing for people, because it affects their very identity.

The challenge for us as Christians is to honour the memories that are important to us, of people, of traditions, of past times, while at the same time looking forward hopefully to the future. On Remembrance Day we do that by honouring those who have suffered in war, by committing ourselves to work for peace and reconciliation. We also honour our other memories not by living in the past, and preserving them in aspic, but using them as a resource to help us live in today's world and look towards the future, remembering that the God who has been faithful to us in the past, will not desert us as we move into new uncharted waters.

In our increasingly uncertain world, with so many potential crises, economic, political, environmental, it is tempting to live in the past. But these crises need a proper Christian engagement, where we need to interpret our understanding of God from the past and find ways of making His love, His care, His hope real today. If we do that, I believe we will find the best way to honour the past is to change and adapt so that we find the right way to communicate the message of the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, the love of God and the fellowship of the Holy Spirit to a world that with all its changes still desperately needs it today.

On walking to church

I was brought up in a suburb of Edinburgh. As stern Presbyterians we walked regularly to church some four miles from our home. On the way we passed by a cluster of churches of various denominations which would all nowadays be welcomed within the embrace of the United Reformed Church. My father insisted that it was important to make some sacrifices by walking to church, rather snootily ignoring the various welcoming kirks. The anomaly struck even a dull teenager. But the issue passed because the time came when I started cycling to church, setting off some half-an-hour later than my father.

These thoughts came to me recently when I decided to walk to church. To be more accurate, I decided to walk back from church. Actually I was given a lift to church but the car was not available for the return journey and I determined on making an experiment. So on a warm settled day I set off from the URC, Cobham for the four mile walk to remotest Oxshott. I was of course, the only pedestrian. But I had the company of cars galore all the way and the more cordial company of joggers and cyclists. It confirmed the old dictum that Elmbridge is not amenable to pedestrians.

I proceeded along Stoke Road in an easterly direction. Then I encountered the lethal crossing from Stoke Road to Blundell Lane. Half-a-mile on, the pavement narrowed; in another quarter it petered out entirely. I took my life in my hands on the notorious railway bridge.

Shortly I turned off the road onto the bridle path, past the Furze and the radar mast. On up the hill to the playing fields of Danes Hill School and down Wrens Hill to the ever menacing A244, the famous supplement to the M25. Home at last in about an hour, six times what it would have taken by car.

I shall not do this idiosyncratic thing for a while, especially not during winter. Of course, it gave me a sense of achievement, needed physical exercise and all that. True, it gave me time for cool reflection on the service. No one can deny the necessity for that. But alas it fell short of my memory of yesteryear when walking to and from Church was a spiritual experience. Or so I was told!

What Can We Do About Metal Theft?



I've just read a letter titled "An Unregulated Industry" in the letters page of the Methodist Recorder for the week 13th October, and watched Breakfast TV today about this growing problem. It strikes a cord with us in Effingham as we had a telephone cable stolen in August which left over 800 homes without a landline or computer access for nine days.

St. Martin's in Dorking have a £25,000 repair bill after persistent theft over the last few years. 14 brass memorial plaques were stolen from Carshalton war memorial last month and a local church had its bell stolen. Churches are vulnerable and insurers won't cover the cost if it keeps happening.

A recent debate in the House of Lords discussed *Scrap metal theft: Laws in the age of 'Steptoe and Son'.* The UK's laws on scrap metal are still in the age of Steptoe and Son, and called for police to be given more powers to shut down traders selling stolen scrap metal.

The crime cost £770m last year.

Smartwater, the official police security initiative, won't work until the whole industry is properly requlated. At the moment а large amount of scrap metal is shipped off to other parts of the world to be dismantled.

So let's write to our MPs and keep up the pressure for a change in the law.

Wear your Poppy with Pride

Another feisty 90 year old celebrates this month. The **Royal British Legion** was formed on 15th

May 1921, bringing together four National Organisations of ex-Servicemen begun after the Great War of 1914-1918. When the Legion's leaders looked around them in 1921, not only did they see a gigantic task in front of them looking after those who had suffered, but they also sought to prevent further sacrifice by reminding the nation of the human cost of war and to work actively for peace. The tradition of an annual **Two Minute Silence** in memory of the dead had already been established, but the first ever **Poppy Appeal** was held with the first Poppy Day on 11th November 1921. The *Legion* was granted "Royal" status in 1971.

This year they hope to raise £5 million and to do this every year for the next 10 years. The *Legion* will be working with the Army, the MOD, Veterans' agencies, Service charities including Help for Heroes, Erskine, SSAFA and ABF, the Soldiers' Charity in a joint effort to ensure that wounded, injured and sick men and women are given the best possible help to recover. Synod at Camberley

Synod is not new to me. I have been attending for a number of years. During that time I have written reports for Women's Network, made bread for Communion, taken part in the Communion Service itself, and arranged prayer stations. Synod is rarely boring. Parts can be a bit dull; a lot depends on the speaker and subject.

The theme of Synod was Leadership and Teamwork. We were welcomed by Rev. Stephen Robinson, the Superintendent Minister of Aldershot, Farnborough and Camberley Circuit, followed by the usual housekeeping information. Rev. John Hellyer, Chair of the District, led Holy Communion. In his sermon, John spoke about being able to grow and understand what kind of disciple we are called to be, to be willing to serve and give. He stressed the need to engage with each other and recognise the diversity among us. We are all leaders, he said, and all leaders are disciples of Christ, following Him in the way of the Cross.

Clergy new to the District distributed the elements from four positions in the hall. It was a continuous process, going to the nearest station, the only possible way with the numbers involved. It is not a procedure that really appeals to me. Somehow there is not that opportunity for a quiet moment of one-to-one with God.

The latter half of the morning dealt briefly with Synod business, most explained more fully in leaflets sent prior to the date. Once over we explored the theme of 'Leadership'. Following a general introduction, we were invited to view ten very diverse pictures on the theme. A lot of them did nothing for me. Ian explained one showing an orchestra, then I got stuck working out one which showed three men with a ladder approaching a gap that they had to cross still holding the ladder!

Lunch was 'chat' time, catching up with those around the District, new friends and old. After lunch there were some excellent and informative presentations. Rev. David Chapman, Superintendent of the Central Sussex United Area (formerly at London Road, Horsham) spoke about the Methodist World Council held in S. Africa earlier this year. Not only is he an eloquent speaker but his talk was illustrated with photographs. The captions were so funny and Synod was in fits of laughter! Sometimes I found myself forgetting to listen because I was waiting to see the words under the next picture!

There was a report proposing changes to the membership of Synod. Normally these propositions go through with a show of hands. It was recommended that the number of Circuit lay representatives should be reduced. It provoked a lot of discussion and, eventually, a vote taken, agreed. I did not! I think it is the lay people who take back information to their Circuits and churches, and often instigate ways in which that information can be acted upon. Lay people volunteer to attend Synod and have quite a different mindset from those who attend because of an office held.

It was a good, stimulating day. No doubt LMC Leadership Team and Church Council will hear more.

Women - for such a time as this

Methodist women in Britain (MWiB), the new movement for women, was officially launched at the July Conference in Southport. Not only was space there very limited, but distance also prevented many from attending. To compensate, a series of six Launch Roadshows have been arranged at venues around the country.

The first was at Central Hall, Westminster on Sunday 18th September. There must have been about 500 people there - it is very difficult to gauge numbers in such a huge space. It was a very varied programme, with a focus on Dalit women, one of the special action concerns. Kasta Dip, the desk officer for Justice, Peace and Reconciliation in the church of North India, spoke very movingly of the problems Dalit women encounter. As a Dalit himself, he spoke from family experience.

Rev. Val Ogden led a lively and interesting Bible Study based on the story in Matthew, of the healing of the Official's daughter and the faith of the haemorrhaging woman who touched Jesus' cloak. There were many thoughts to challenge new ways of thinking. Rev. Jenny Impey, co-Chair of the London District, was interviewed about her job, and particularly the role of women in leadership in the Church. Rev. Nicola Vidamour, a keen lover of art, reflected on a picture of an African woman embracing a child. She stressed that now is such a time as this to embrace the present. Rev. Dr. Mark Wakelin brought greetings from Conference. Rev. Femi Cole-Hjie led prayers and the whole gathering affirmed their support of the new leaders of MWiB. Peter Baker, as light as will o' the wisp, flitted around in a dance/drama telling the story of Esther. Leytonstone Youth Choir led music accompanied by drums and keyboard - very loud!

I could go on and on there was so much, all tidily linked together by Jill Baker, MWiB's first President. Her theme 'for such a time as this' held together and bonded the programme.

As always on these occasions, the singing was wonderful! There were friends from far and wide to chat with. There were resources to examine and buy, and welcome cups of tea to wet parched throats. Gathered outside the Great Hall at the end, that number of women make an awful lot of noise!

Between now and next March there will be five similar Roadshows held at Bristol, Loughborough, Chester, York and Edinburgh. All have excellent speakers and each will highlight another of MWiB's social concerns.

The is much going on in the movement for such a time as this.
