

From Rev. Lynda Russell

Dear friends,

Some of you may know that a few weeks ago I had the immense privilege of marrying my step-daughter (John's daughter) and her fiancé Chris. They got married in Central Methodist Church in Chippenham, and for all those of you reading this who have occasion to steward at weddings, I have to say that it is vital work! The stewards were absolutely lovely, and treated us all as if we were family, making my job so much easier.

I read this true story when I was looking for illustrations for the sermon: The happy couple were posing for their photos outside the church after the service. They had all the usual groups in the photos: bride and groom; with family; friends; and so on. They went off to their wedding reception, and the photographer went away to work on what he had done. He then came to the evening reception, hoping to sell copies of his photos to the guests.

There was only one problem: behind the bride and groom in every photo was the church noticeboard. It prominently displayed a Bible verse: there, just for the happy couple, were the words of Jesus on the Cross: 'Father, forgive them, they don't know what they're doing.' (Perhaps we should think more carefully about our noticeboards!)

Now Melissa and Chris had been together for 11 years since they met in the first week they started at Uni, so I think they **did** know, as much as anyone can, what they were doing as they got married.

I thought and prayed for a long time about what to say as we reflected on the beautiful readings they'd chosen.

"Love from the centre of who you are" says the Message version of Romans 12. How much do we need this advice in our homes, our churches, our schools, our towns and our society at this time?

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Yesterday on the news with immense sadness and disbelief I watched a man who apparently wanted to bar the entrance of all the children from the Calais camp to the UK, and send them back to where they came from.

As Christians, our centre is rooted in Christ, and our love comes from his love for us. It is only by making sure that our centre is grounded in Him that we can love from that foundation, and know that it will be secure. Then that love will spread to others around us. It is critical at this time in our national identity that we as Christians show the love which comes from the centre of who we are. As the implications of Brexit become more apparent, and attitudes to refugees, migrants, or simply those who have lived here all their lives but look 'other' could become more hostile, we may be called to stand up and speak out. "Love from the centre of who you are."

From Rev. Kim Plumpton

Dear friends,

I was blessed to be a judge once again at the speech competition in London for the Women's Federation for World Peace. There were seven entrants from across the UK. There was of course a prize, as well as an opportunity to attend a conference in Bratislava drawing on peacebuilding.

I was one of three judges, a lecturer from Kings College and a former vice president joined me as we listened to some inspirational speeches. There was a clear winner, a 32 year old called Valentine Nkoyo.

Here is her story which she kindly gave me permission to share:

"I grew up in a small Maasai village in Kenya. My father had two wives. I have eight sisters and five brothers. As a young girl, growing up in such a big family wasn't easy, especially given that my father didn't have a lot of wealth to educate all his children. Girls lost out as educating boys was, and still is, more important than educating girls.

Subsistence farming was the sole source of income for my family. Despite long hours in the farm, infrequent rains and occasional droughts led to loss of livestock and poor farm produce. I vividly remember the many days we went to bed on empty stomachs. These incidences upset me greatly, but also inspired me to work hard in school to change our future.

Being a woman, my mother could not own property. We made do with old clothes with the exception of occasional new second hand purchases or the 'hand me downs' from our rich cousins. I got my first pair of shoes aged fourteen.

Mother encouraged me to study hard as this was the only way out of poverty. On trips to the river, she would say "I want you to work hard in school so that you don't have to do this all your life. Education will help you buy me a water tank so we don't have to walk all day for water". A few years back, my mother cried with joy when I had a water tank installed at home. I remember her saying, "I can see you listen my child and you never forgot what I told you. Look at my feet, they are no longer as strong as they used to be. God bless you my child".

I lost several years of my education as my mother couldn't afford to pay my school fees so I was thrown out of school. During such times, I helped my parents and worked as a labourer in local farms for money. I was constantly coaxed to get married. I remember this old man who used to bring me presents. He argued that I was wasting my time at home seeking school fees, as other girls my age were already married. I told him I could listen to him if he paid my school fees (£10) but he refused. I was castigated for "begging for education". The thought of being married off aged fourteen gave me sleepless nights. I avoided anyone who mentioned marriage to me.

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Mother's attempts to fundraise for my fees were met with hostility as it would bring shame to the family. As a teenage girl, I was not allowed to speak directly to my father. I could not question his decision not to sell livestock or land to educate me, while he did it for my brothers. Long days spent as a labourer while other kids went to school infuriated me. I could not understand how being a girl meant I was to be treated differently. I became dejected and felt suicidal. I sought ways to approach my father by writing this poem in Maasai:

TAKE ME TO SCHOOL FATHER

Take me to school father So I may be like Elizabeth Who drives the red car And who is always happy For was she not a girl like me? Take me to school father So I may not be like Naserian Who has now five children Strands of wire covered by skin Is what they have for bodies Skinny, scrawny, skimpy With teary eyes they gaze Despairingly at their mother Who has naught to offer. Take me to school father For those children haunt me Will I end up like Naserian? Whose husband whips her daily? For is she not his sixth sheep? And by the way A present from a grateful age mate Why was I born a girl? To become a symbol of gratitude? Take me to school father You tell me I will deviate And I shame you with bad manners Is rejecting an old man bad manner? Is declining initiation bad manners? Is planning my family bad manners? Is dressing smartly bad manners? Is being a girl child bad manners?

Take me to school father For the symbol of labour I detest! The symbol of pleasure I detest! The symbol of gratitude I detest!

Valentine's persistence led her father to sell his favourite bull so she could go to school but he died shortly afterwards and she fought to be educated.

Valentine sought scholarships for secondary school, she spent two years seeking funding for university, she graduated with a first class honours in 2011. After working as a programme Coordinator for African programmes for three years, she got a scholarship to take an MBA at Nottingham Trent University in March 2014. Valentine is hoping to start her PhD on Gender and Discrimination in 2017. At this present time she is financing her brothers', nieces' and nephews' education.

Valentine's story speaks of struggle and perseverance and a belief that God would bring about justice, that her prayers would not go unnoticed. There were moments when she wrestled with God, God seemed to take his time to answer but then Valentine realised it is often in our adversity we find out who we truly are, but also who God is.

Wrestling with God it seems is not something to shy away from, it seems to give rise to a questioning, a determination, a resilience, a knowledge that God will not let us go, that God's justice will prevail.

Something to hold onto in the messiness of this world, a world that needs God's justice and mercy.

The destruction of Aleppo must stop

The Baptist Union of Great Britain, the Church in Wales, the Church of Scotland, Quakers in Britain, the Methodist Church and the United Reformed Church have released a statement calling upon the Syrian and Russian Governments and other forces to stop their bombardment of Aleppo.

The humanitarian crisis in eastern Aleppo has become a tragedy. United Nations Special Envoy for Syria, Staffan de Mistura, has stated that in the two weeks following the collapse of the ceasefire, 376 people have been killed, one third of whom were children, and a further 1266 were wounded. The international humanitarian organisation Medicines Sans Frontieres said recently that there have been 23 recorded attacks on Aleppo's eight hospitals since the end of July. Seeking medical care has become a danger in itself.

The statement below has been signed by leaders from the six churches representing more than one million people in the UK.

We are appalled by the attacks on civilians by the Syrian Government, Russian and other forces. Life is a gift of God. The targeting and killing of civilians can never be passed off merely as a consequence of war. Aerial strikes on homes, hospitals and aid convoys are never acceptable, under any circumstances.

The responsibility for such attacks lies first and foremost with those who have carried them out. But the frequency of such attacks in Syria also underlines a failure on the part of the international community to uphold long-established principles concerning the immunity of civilians in conflict. Member states of the United Nations should seek to hold to account the parties responsible for indiscriminate attacks on men, women, children, hospitals, humanitarian and rescue workers, which could be construed as war crimes.

The world cries out for an end to the death and destruction in Syria that daily adds to the largest flight of refugees since the Second World War. We join with our brothers and sisters of other churches and other faiths in praying for the people of Syria. We claim no simple solution to a complex political reality but offer the simple message of our faith: that every life is valued by God and that the slaughter must end now.

Remembrance


In November we come to remember How war tore our country apart, From village and town and all around Men and boys left home and hearth.



'Raise the Song of Harvest Home', and we certainly did, at Cobham. We had, I am pleased to report, a full church, as we had invited the Cobham Community Church and T.G.C.M. (The Great Commission Ministry - Filipino Church) to join us in our celebration. We decorated the church in the



traditional way, brought with us a traditional Methodist service, with good old Harvest hymns, (and a couple of modern praise songs thrown in for good measure), and a twist or two; the Filipino church added their Pastora, to preach the sermon, an awful lot of enthusiasm, and somewhat more vocal support for the sermon than perhaps we are used to; and the C.C.C. added their singing support, and their only slightly less vocal enthusiasm. And it worked! We had the sort of service that made you feel glad to be serving God; you know that feeling you sometimes get, when after a day of rain, you happen to glance out of the window, and suddenly see a truly glorious sunset,

A Day of Reflection on Prayer -A Spiritual Retreat Led by Bernard Fidder

At the other end of the Sanctuary was another semi-circle facing the back where Bernard gave a laptop presentation on to a screen.

He started with the URC Vision 2020 summary and explained we were going to concentrate on the "Spirituality & Prayer" aspect. We would explore prayer.

Bernard is such a gifted guy. Whilst he obviously had his standard presentation he could ad lib and pick up and build-up on any points raised in the discussions. There was also a lot of quick repartee and laughter involved. This was important as there was also a lot of anxiety when it came to workshop items and some of us, especially me, found it difficult to openly talk about how and when we do or don't pray and what happens if and when we do pray.

We started with "Why do we need to pray" and then discussed in small groups our prayer efforts and rated them between 0 worst to 10 best. We concluded, dependent on our personality, some of us are systematic, some are spontaneous and some are "Yoyos" – praying only when we think it might help us! Bernard emphasised no way is the right way – it is whatever is best for us.

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In a similar vein we explored "God listens to you", "Different ways of praying" and "Listening to and discerning from our Prayers". Always to remember – Does it give glory to Jesus Christ and does it bear fruit?

"Different ways of praying" was very challenging. Bernard gave us lots of different ways with handouts to help us. We then chose whatever we thought might suit us. I chose the Labyrinth which is following a drawn labyrinth into the centre and letting whatever thoughts surfaced. Ditto while in the centre and ditto on the way out. We did this for 45 minutes.

Finally in the afternoon we tried putting it into practice. We all prayed for a short while and noted whatever popped into our minds. Bernard captured all these one-liner thoughts on to a flip chart and then we tried to make sense of the theme of what God was saying to us. It was very difficult. We did it three times. The first two conclusions were rather fuzzy but I think this is what we concluded:

- We wanted a new church with a large congregation.
- If we put our trust in God, all will be well.
- God promises us a good harvest but there is a lot of work to do. God may be getting impatient with us and wants us to get out of the carriage and get on with it. If we do, there will be a good harvest and we will soar like an eagle.

There is no way I can convey fully our experience. When I write about it, it sounds clinical. However, I have learnt that my previous idea of praying – basically asking God for good things to happen is not necessarily the best way of praying. It is briefly speaking to God and then LISTENING. During periods of silent thought – one may even go to sleep; something will pop into our minds. Subsequently what popped into our minds may connect with something that bears fruit.

'A Day of Spirituality'

Our suggestions were then written up on a flip chart, to see if through them, we might glean an idea of what God was trying to tell us about our church, or our

church life, or perhaps our personal life. For our group, no clear concise message was forthcoming, but, for me, I found the day forbidding, instructive, exciting, exhilarating and Spiritual; and I hope that there will be another one, to stretch me further!





Are we there yet?



The Advent Offering service, a connexion-wide event, raises money for the ongoing work of the Mission in Britain Fund, which supports mission-orientated church projects through grants for the following categories:

Mission Action on Poverty and Justice Ministering at Methodist Heritage sites and Chaplaincy - Helping churches to serve local communities and Sharing the gospel with all ages.

This year's theme is 'Are we there yet?' looking at the journey of a new Methodist drop-in centre in Swansea, named **Ogof Adullam** after the cave where *King David* took refuge in *1 Samuel 22*. It provides a place of refuge to vulnerable people in society – the homeless, asylum seekers and those shunned due to their addictions and criminal behaviour.

Based at Brunswick Methodist Church, it opens its doors for three evenings a week, when most other agencies are closed. It provides a safe place free of external influences where people can develop safe, secure and loving relationships in a Christian environment. The volunteers go beyond simply running a drop in centre. They liaise with different organisations in Swansea to direct their guests to night shelters, Christian Rehabilitation centres, chaplaincies and partner with local gardeners who offer work and income for ex-offenders.

Poppies for Remembrance!

Sadly the **Royal British Legion**, the welfare charity for armed forces veterans and their families, faces a revolt from thousands of its volunteer poppy sellers amid an ongoing row over controversial plans to close down its women's section! Apparently last year's proposal to merge the women's section into

the charity's mainstream national organisation has deeply upset the legion's women's section, which has been in existence as a semi-independent part of the charity for 95 years. 30,000 volunteers from these branches play a huge role in running the charity's annual poppy appeal, which raised £48.5m in 2014-15.

The merger would diminish the distinctive historical role of women in the legion, say critics, while the women's section would no longer have an automatic place on the board of trustees, and may lose the honour of laying a wreath at the annual **Remembrance Sunday** ceremony at the Cenotaph in London.

Has it been a bit heavy handed? Centralising saves money but the corporate approach to the running of the London-based charity may have left it out of touch with the wishes of many of its ordinary members. So plenty of need for Prayer here!



HAITI - Urgent help needed to rebuild after Hurricane Matthew hit the west coast of Haiti with devastating effect. At least 900 dead, thousands displaced, their shanty-town homes just washed away.

UN officials are calling this the country's worst humanitarian crisis since the devastating earthquake of 2010.

We have a strong relationship in Trinity Primary School. We are still leading assemblies once a month and Hannah is spending half a morning a week practically serving the school to continue strengthening the relationship. We are looking towards running a lunchtime club for key stage 1, after running a very popular girls-group in the last academic year. At the end of last year, we ran two transition lessons with the year 6 classes to help get them thinking about what it will be like going up to secondary school.



Messy Church is continuing to attract new families. We have been and are continuing to look at children in the Bible and how we can be like them. Thank you to all who serve on the Messy Church team for all your continued support.

Revive has relaunched as a midweek club for those aged 7-11. We have run two sessions so far and although attendance is low, it is quickly evolving into a really precious time where both church and non-church children are learning about the parables Jesus told as well as having time for fun and friendship. We pray that this work will grow and reach more children.

During the summer we tried to hold numerous family-friendly events. These were not well attended and part of this is due to a mix-up with advertising. We have learnt from this and now have a better idea of how to advertise within the school as well as knowing there needs to be clearer communication with the congregation.

Hannah is developing her relationship with LYP as well as enabling there to be a midweek event for those in year 7+ to attend by starting to help Martin with the cell group.

As Hannah as now been working for a year and is well settled, we are looking at how to improve on our family outreach, ministry and pastoral support - watch this space!

LYP Project Update Autumn 2016

BFree Youth Café

We opened for the new term and have had fantastic attendance for September. What has been particularly pleasing is the growing number of year 7's who have been coming to BFree, and we are working hard to keep them engaged. We had over 100 different young people in through the door in September.

We ran a residential trip to Juniper Hall 14th/15th/16th October for Year 7s. We were given 75% of the cost of this by Field Studies Council who run Juniper Hall, and we believe this will be a really good relationship building trip for year 7s who have just begun attending BFree.

Summer projects

The summer programme successfully engaged lots of young people and kept the team busy. Highlights included Romania trip, Making Good, Schools out for Summer on the recreation ground, and a BLAZE swimming trip.

One to One

The LYP One to One service passed its observations by Surrey County Council and we're pleased with the feedback we had from Surrey.

Faith groups

Triumph and Cell group are back on for the term and are well attended, including a new group of younger attendees at Triumph from St Marys & St Nics.

Cell group is at the biggest number it has been for recent years and we're looking at whether the group would prefer to split into age groups again

Coffee Shop church is back on Thursday nights for the new term, and is effectively a youth alpha style session for older teenagers, including several who came on the Romania trip.

Making Good

We have established a link with the National Trust ranger at Polesden Lacey and ran a volunteering project there during October half term with our Making Good project.

Romania

We have debriefed with the group after the Romania trip and are hoping to raise funds for a trip in 2017.

Girls Group

Girls Group has started again for the term, every other Wednesday evening, and Kara and Martyina are running the next two together.

BLAZE

Martin has been doing good work with BLAZE for the 11-15 year old boys. He has established a link with the Chairman of Leatherhead Football Club and has taken groups of boys to two recent home matches. They also had the chance to meet new Leatherhead FC Manager, Jimmy Bullard.

BLAZE now runs on alternate Wednesdays nights.

Mikey Dicken started at LYP in September, replacing Oli who is now leading our work in Bookham. Mikey is a long-term LYP volunteer, lives in Leatherhead with his wife Laura, a former Therfield student and has spent the past 10 years working at Esher College with young people with behavioural and special needs.

We have launched our new Bookham Youth Service which Oli Bell is heading up. We're currently getting to know the area whilst working with local churches and working within Howard of Effingham School.

Misc Items

Thanks to Veolia Trust funding and MVDC funding, we are currently renovating the Allsaints toilets and LYP kitchen. This will provide better access and improved facilities.

Joe spoke at the public launch of the Surrey Hills Trust Fund at Cockshot Farm on Leith Hill on 15th September. We are planning an outdoor adventure residential in 2017 called Into the Wild and will be working closely with the Surrey Hills AONB.

We have been linked with Boots Leatherhead as a potential fundraising partner, as they are partners with Children in Need and we are the most local children in need grantee.

We will be involved in running the Kings and Queens event in 2017 in partnership with Mole Valley District Council and B@titude. This will be a lunch event in a marquee on Kingston Road Rec, with young people serving elderly guests.

Joe has been invited to attend the next Small Charities Advisory Group for Lloyds Bank Foundation in October, along with 9 other charities across England.

LYP's 2015 video has been entered into the UK Charity Film awards 2016.

Joe has been invited to a Parliamentary reception for small charities in November.

LMC/Christ Church Quiet Day at Cobham URC - Saturday 26th November

Twice recently I have been asked "What exactly $\underline{\textbf{is}}$ a Quiet Day? So I thought I would put down some ideas that I have collected over the years at other Quiet Days.

First of all, it is difficult to be exact as all I have attended have been so different. Don't imagine that Quiet Days are silent - they are not. There will be periods of quietness, but a whole day of silence for many can seem threatening, over-powering even, and leave you with a feeling of being inadequate for the challenge.

The success of such a day is not necessarily about the venue, although some have an atmosphere of peacefulness to begin with, but the sensitivity of leadership towards the group's needs and each individual's frame of mind on the day. You all have experience of how your own can vary.

There could be a theme to set the mind working and that is reflected in the beginning worship. I can remember a theme about music, another about butterflies, and yet another about life's journey being a river from source to sea. There is often a time of Bible study, again helping to create a course of action. Afternoons usually offer a variety of options - painting, reading, writing, craftwork or simply a private time of reflection. The choice is yours. It is surprising how deep a discussion can become when, with a few others, the hands are occupied and no eye contact is required.

A Quiet Day is gently guided time for each one present, and each person's thought and needs will be personal. Quiet Days are not for everyone. The first I ever went to at Seaford, I walked out after a short time. It was <u>so</u> intense and completely silent, apart from worship at the beginning. I spent the time enjoying the sunshine on the seafront, listening to the music of the sea on the shingle. For me, that was far more restful and therapeutic that the deep silence that made every heartbeat sound like a hammer in my head!


