

From Rev Jan Hofmeyr

Dear Friends,

The President of the Methodist Church for this year has chosen as her theme, 'So what's the story?' It's an encouragement to each of us to speak to others about the story of Jesus in our lives. That's one of the reasons we are doing the course 'Talking Jesus' in our home groups at LMC.

The best model for being a witness for Jesus is Jesus Himself. So we need to ask ourselves, 'What kind of a witness was Jesus?' For one thing, Jesus witnessed through His actions. He witnessed by caring for people, by feeding people, by healing people, by listening to people. People experienced the love of God through His actions. And equally, people will experience God's love through our actions. Francis of Assisi said something to this effect, 'Go and be a witness for Jesus, and, if necessary, also use words.

We can talk all we like about Jesus and our faith in Him, but if that is not backed up in our actions it isn't going to count for much. But having said that, our words are also important. If we go back to Jesus as our example, He spoke and taught and witnessed to the love and grace of God. But His teaching was mainly for those who were already His followers. Once people had been attracted to Him through His deeds, they were then more likely to listen to what He said. As someone has put it, 'People won't care how much we know until they know how much we care.'

But our words remain important. I remember hearing of someone who decided He would witness to Jesus purely through his actions, without saying anything. After a while a work colleague said to him, 'You know, I have seen a big change in your life recently; what has happened? Have you become a vegetarian?' Peter says in his first letter, 'Be ready at all times to answer anyone who asks you to explain the hope that you have in you, but do it with gentleness and respect.' (1 Pet 3:15) We must never see the other person as merely a target for our evangelism. Rather we need to see that person as someone whom God loves and for whom Jesus died. It's also important to remember that in the end it is only the Holy Spirit who can work a change in a person's heart – we cannot 'convert' anyone. I like the definition of witnessing that says, 'To witness is to share Jesus in the power of the Holy Spirit and to leave the results to God'.

I remember a programme on TV which described a rescue drama. A person on a snow-covered mountain fell into a deep crevasse. She was in very real danger of falling even further to a certain death or otherwise of dying from cold. Her companion couldn't help her, but fortunately he was able to locate another climber who had some basic rescue equipment with him. Through some very clever thinking and at great risk to himself, this stranger was able to pull the woman to safety. As he held and hugged her, I tried to imagine his feeling of joy at knowing that he had just rescued a fellow human being from certain death.

Each of us has that opportunity – to intervene in someone's life and be an agent in God's hand to help rescue them, not physically, but spiritually; to rescue them, not just for this life but for eternal life. That alone should encourage us in this important task. And remember, when we invite someone to come to Jesus, we are not inviting them to some strange and foreign place; we are inviting them home.

Dear Friends,

Some of you may well remember this striking 26-foot-tall 'Knife Angel' sculpture built entirely out of 100,000 knives donated by the police to remember the victims fallen to the increasing knife violence in the United Kingdom. Its creator Alfie Radley spent 2 years working on this statue. When asked about the process required to create such a statue, he said, "every knife had to be cleaned of any biological material" and that he had to "**blunt every single knife to make sure they're not sharp anymore, and can't create damage."**



The statue is a shocking and poignant reminder of the violence people experience in our country every day especially where knife crime is concerned.

Of course in some respects when we look at other parts of the word we live in relative safety. Recent conflicts on the Syrian Turkish border and the continual loss of life in Afghanistan reminds us that conflict is never far away from us.

Whilst I was attending a recent conference a banner held these words, "Humanity is calling for reconciliation, compassion, love, service and sacrifice. Today's problems cannot be solved by the logic of power. Our present problems can only be resolved by the logic of love." On reflection of the statue and the banner, I am drawn to this idea of needing to "blunt every single knife to make sure they're not sharp anymore, and can't create damage," as well as this 'logic of love.' It is I think an aide memoire. This pursuit of peace which we desire for our world, involves us all, it pivots around our own actions, and our own words, the need to be reshaped, blunted so that we are less able to hurt one another. Made clean, cleansed so there might be a purity of purpose, for we are part of God's loving plan for his creation, that we might be reconciled to God and to one another.

As we remember those who have sacrificed so much in pursuit of peace may we learn the lessons of the past and work towards a future that is more 'blunted' and loving, less volatile, more forgiving and gracious in its dealings with one another. And when opinions differ from our own be more embracing of difference. But also, that when the need arises, to stand up for justice when voices are absent.

A Century since the first 2 minutes silence !

At 11am on each Remembrance Sunday a two minute silence is observed at war memorials and churches across the UK. The silence is meant as a tribute to those who lost their lives fighting for their country - but what is the significance of that date and time?

On the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month in 1918 the guns of Europe fell silent. After four years of bitter fighting, The Great War was finally over. The Armistice was signed at 5am in a railway carriage in the Forest of Compiegne, France on 11th November and six hours later, at 11am, the war ended.

The first Remembrance Day took place in 1919 throughout Britain and the Commonwealth. A 2 minutes silence was suggested by an Australian journalist and a proclamation was issued by the King. So, since 1919, on the second Sunday of November, a two-minutes silence has been observed at 11am at war memorials, cenotaphs, religious services and shopping centres throughout Britain and the Commonwealth.





International Day of Prayer for the Persecuted Church (IDOP)


Release International and **Christian Solidarity Worldwide** have resources for <u>3rd & 10th November</u> and this year the organisers are call-

ing on churches to pray for persecuted believers, using the message "Persecuted but not Abandoned ".

Millions of Christians around the world are persecuted for their faith daily. Routinely facing harassment, discrimination, violence and even death for their faith in Jesus. Over the years, the IDOP has served as a platform to highlight the stories of persecuted

Christians and mobilise the global Church to respond to their plight. IDOP has been a source of solidarity and encouragement to persecuted Christians by reminding them that they are part of a larger, global family of believers.

CSW are also asking people to get involved in **Red Wednesday** on **27th November**, when churches and public buildings across the UK and around the world will light up in red as a sign of solidarity with persecuted Christians.



You don't need to have a big building or a technical setup to join in! Marking **#RedWednesday** can be as simple as wearing red, holding a 'red coffee morning' (a good excuse to eat red velvet cake) or giving out red balloons – anything as long as the theme is red and, of course, standing with the persecuted church!



Alarming Figures from UN Worldwide Study

1 in 3 women and girls experience physical or sexual violence in their lifetime, most frequently by an intimate partner

Only 52% of women married or in a union freely make their own decisions about sexual relations, contraceptive use and health care

Worldwide, almost 750 million women and girls alive today were married before their 18th birthday; while 200 million women and girls have undergone female genital mutilation (FGM)

1 in 2 women killed worldwide were killed by their partners or family in 2012; while only 1 out of 20 men were killed under similar circumstances

71% of all human trafficking victims worldwide are women and girls, and 3 out of 4 of these women and girls are sexually exploited

Violence against women is as serious a cause of death and incapacity among women of reproductive age as cancer, and a greater cause of ill health than traffic accidents and malaria combined.

I have to say that some of the lectionary readings from the Bible leave me wanting, perhaps this is because there are no helpful notes to explain what the readings are all about and their significance. Max Lucado in his Daily Bible compilation really hits the spot on many occasions. He says about Philippians Chapter 4 and verse 8:

Change the thoughts, and you change the person. If today's thoughts are tomorrows actions what happens when we fill our minds with the thoughts of God's love? Will standing beneath the downpour of his grace change the way we feel about others ?

Paul says yes, absolutely! It's not enough to keep the bad stuff out, we've got to let the good stuff in. It's not enough to keep no list of wrongs. We have to cultivate a list of blessings. Think about the things that are good and worthy of praise. "Think about the things that are true and honourable and right and pure and beautiful and respected". Thinking conveys the idea of pondering – studying and focussing, allowing what is viewed to have an impact on us. Rather than storing up the sour store up the sweet !

Max Lucado also says on Colossians chapter 4 verse 5:

Those who don't believe in Jesus note what we do. They make decisions about Christ based on watching us. When we are kind they assume Christ is kind, when we are gracious they assume Christ is gracious. But when we are brash, what will people think about our King? When we are dishonest what assumption will an observer make about our Master? No wonder Paul says " be wise in the way you act with people who are not believers making the most of every opportunity". When you talk you should always be kind and pleasant so that you will be able to answer everyone in the way you should. Courteous conduct honours Christ.

It also honours his children. When you surrender a parking place to someone you honour him. When you return a borrowed book you honour the lender. When you make an effort to greet someone in the room, especially the ones others may have overlooked you honour God's children.

Tea is ready before the meeting and afterwards. The AGM is followed by a piano concert to which all are invited




