From Rev. Kim Plumpton

Dear Friends

I have had time to reflect on the last year and to consider what this new church year might bring. In Effingham, as well as celebrating the 400th Anniversary of the King James Bible with a range of events in the autumn, we will also be engaging in an ecumenical move to provide contemporary worship in Effingham in the style of Café Church. The intention is to begin on the first Saturday in October offering a more informal style of worship.

Croissants and coffee will be the order of the day interspersed with worshipful conversations and music. The venue is yet to be decided, but volunteers will be needed to offer this to the community, so if you feel that God is inviting you to offer your services or to enjoy something different please come and have a chat with me and we can discuss it further.

I also smile when I consider the richness that is this five-way pastorate; I have enjoyed our interaction in the past and look forward to more opportunities to engage with each other socially as well as worshipfully.

All of these bring a smile to my face and I hope that you feel a sense of excitement too as we move forwards together. Many have worked so hard this last year and this coming year will make demands upon us, but I hope that it will be in God's strength and not our own, because in God's strength and with God's guidance we can go so much further.

Dear Friends,

In September it would be normal for a Methodist minister to wish his or her churches a happy New Year, as the Methodist year for administrative and financial purposes begins on 1st September. In the context of our United Pastorate it is still appropriate to celebrate the start of a new year, as September marks a year since the Pastorate was formed, since Kim joined us as minister in Effingham and Cobham and I became minister of Christ Church.

From my perspective the year has gone very quickly and it has been good to see relationships between the churches grow and develop over that time. For me there is a sense that this has very quickly come to seem a natural arrangement for many of us, and I believe that is a sign of real hope for the future.

The idea of a new year in September as well as January may seem strange to those outside Methodism, (although those in education have a similar rhythm), but to be reminded twice a year that the Christian life is full of new starts and new opportunities is no bad thing. When we turn to follow Jesus as the Lord of our life, we make a new start, and we do it not just once when we come to faith, but over and over again, as we respond to God's grace and Christ's self-giving love.

How the Link is printed

Since we started our United Pastorate magazine, the question of printing has been an issue. The print run is just short of 300, and with eight or nine A4 pages to be printed on both sides, collated and stapled, the in-house method previously used for the former Methodist Link using the LMC photocopier was not really an option. We sought some quotes from local printers, and this could still be an option, but the costs ran to around 75p to 90p per copy including folding and stapling. We thought this was probably too much, but comparable with the LMC photocopier rate which would run to 80p or 90p per copy depending on number of pages, but with d-i-y folding and stapling.

We found an on-line printing company in Gloucestershire who promised top quality, low prices and a 48-hour turnaround. It sounded too good to be true, but we tried it nevertheless. We were really pleased with two of the three promises - the price (around 47p per copy) and the quality, which we thought was excellent. However, the 48-hour turnaround was, in reality, 160 hours for the first issue and 215 hours for the second issue. My wife Maureen and I were on holiday when the second issue was due for delivery, and so our thanks to Carol Stoves at LMC who masterminded the circulation which was very last minute. The magazines were delivered on the Saturday and Carol somehow managed to get the magazines into all five churches for the following day. Thank you Carol for this; it is much appreciated. The company tell me that they have had problems with machinery and are getting a new printer which should improve matters. We are therefore trying them again for this, our third issue and, as I write this, I am hoping that their promise holds. Editor

'Well....Well...Well'

an initiative by St Mary's Stoke d'Abernon, Cobham Methodist Church and Cobham United Reformed Church Wednesday 27th July

After lots of planning and much fun and laughter between the four of us, Andrea deGama, Ally Menke, $R_{\rm H}v$. Diana Thornton and myself, the day finally arrived. With an array of helpers from church folk to teenagers, who we are entirely indebted to, we set off on our adventure.

As the children began to trickle in they looked a little bewildered to begin with but it didn't take long for us all to get to know each other. The theme was 'Water' so our day was focused around four sessions, two outdoor activities (no guesses what that might be) and two indoor. The outdoor activities involved transforming a cardboard box into a well, an assault course (trying to gather as much water at the end as you could), hook the duck and splat the balloon. The other two held inside the church were craft and drama. The crafts enabled the props for the drama to be made and the drama incorporated scenes from Creation, Noah, Baptism and the woman at the well.

Ally's skills in the crafts department were invaluable and Diana's expertise with drama was inspiring. With two teaching spots held during the day, one focusing on the biblical use of water and the other on the ecological and humanitarian perspective, we felt it provided helpful insights for the children. For instance, did you know that 884 million people do not have access to safe water and that 1.4 million children die each year from conditions caused by unclean water and poor sanitation. Staggering isn't it?

The day would finish with a presentation for the parents, bringing together everything the children had learned and created. Puppetry, endless yards of material, buckets of newspaper cuttings (our water of course!), headbands and dancing/singing/speaking children (with the odd adult for good measure), our presentation lasted for 30 minutes with coffee and cake to follow.

The performance was a real credit to all the hard work the children had put in and a credit to all those who had taught/cut/pasted/fed/ watered and got wet on the day. The support from parents for the day was also very encouraging and a testament to the possibilities of ecumenical partnerships.

I cannot thank my co-leaders enough for their enthusiasm when we first discussed holding such an event, and for their continued support. And to all those who offered their help on the day without whose support and willingness we would not have been able to hold it, thank you.

We look forward to considering what other ways we might serve our community.

Church Walk

Two Glasses of Wine

When things in your life seem almost too much to handle, when 24 hours in a day are not enough, remember the mayonnaise jar and the two glasses of wine theory.

A professor stood before his philosophy class with some items on his desk in front of him. When the class began, wordlessly, he picked up a very large and empty mayonnaise jar and proceeded to fill it with golf balls^{1,3} He then asked the students if the jar was full. They agreed that it was. The professor then picked up a box of pebbles and poured them into the jar. He shook the jar lightly. The pebbles rolled into the open areas between the golf balls. He then asked the students again if the jar was full. They agreed it was.

The professor next picked up a box of sand and poured it into the jar. Of course, the sand filled up everything else. He asked once more if the jar was full. The students responded with a unanimous "YES."

The professor then produced two glasses of wine from under the table and poured the entire contents into the jar, effectively filling the empty space between the sand. The students laughed.

"Now," said the professor, as the laughter subsided, "I want you to recognise that this jar represents your life. The golf balls are the important things; your family, your children, your health, your friends, and your favourite passions; things that if everything else was lost and only they remained, your life would still be full.

The pebbles are the other things that matter like your job, your house, and your car. The sand is everything else; the small stuff. If you put the sand into the jar first", he continued, "there is no room for the pebbles or the golf balls. The same goes for life. If you spend all your time and energy on the small stuff, you will never have room for the good things that are important to you. Pay attention to the things that are critical to your happiness.

Play with your children. Take time to get medical check-ups. Take your partner out to dinner. Play another 18 holes. Do one more run down the ski slope. There will always be time to clean the house and fix the waste disposal.

Take care of the golf balls first; the things that really matter. Set your priorities. The rest is just sand."

One of the students raised her hand and inquired what the wine represented. The professor smiled. "I'm glad you asked. It just goes to show you that no matter how full your life may seem, there's always room for a couple of glasses of wine with a friend."

## Dorking and Horsham Circuit NEWSLETTER

Dear Friends,

In a rather silly wartime movie spoof (called "Top Secret!") a German officer enquires on the phone over the condition of a severely injured guard. He listens for a moment and then says, "I see. Let me know immediately if there is any change in his condition." He puts down the receiver and announces, "He's dead."

Of course death is the one condition in which there is no movement, no progress, no change. If we see something changing and developing we know it is alive. The same could be said of churches. I was once asked how many church stewards it took to change a light bulb. I admitted my ignorance and repeated the question back only to receive the horrified response, "Change??!!"

Naturally I'm exaggerating. The idea of a rigidly unchanging church is a caricature, though one with a hint of truth in it. And you might point out that churches do need stability as well as change. Quite right. Living creatures grow slowly, and some aspects of life don't change at all. For example, I'd like to think that I have changed a lot over the years, but I still have the same number of fingers and toes I started off with.

What has started me reflecting on change? In many Methodist circuits at this time of year welcome services are being held for new ministers. In our own circuit we are part way through a period of stability in terms of our ministers. No-one is leaving. No-one new is arriving. You'll be seeing the same familiar faces in your churches for a while longer.

But I'm glad to say that changes are afoot in other areas of church life, if not in the circuit staff. Churches are seeking new ways of worshipping which will both address the needs of the current congregation and be attractive and accessible to those joining us. Churches are pursuing new initiatives in working with fellow Christians in other denominations and with secular bodies too. Churches are thinking in terms of mission rather than maintenance.

Our circuit is very much alive. And I for one am glad that I can continue to work with the same familiar colleagues as we pursue those changes in which we believe our Lord is leading us.

## Women in Leadership – Leading in Excellence

This was the title of our second conference arranged by Westminster Women's Outreach. As with the first, it was excellent. Some 200 women came together to listen and worship. After opening the worship, Ophelia (from Croydon) next to me whispered that there was a buzz in the air that sent shivers through her body. The prayerfulness and singing, especially the singing, had to be heard to experience the almost electric atmosphere!

There were five main speakers, each emphasising a different aspect of a woman's place in society. The first was a pastor from the US addressing self-confidence. She had plenty of it! Her message was to know who you are, to build from each other, just 'be' who you are. Her own confidence was a little over-the-top and loud for me.

In contrast, Rose, the second speaker was so ordinary. She was also American, has been Chaplain to the Queen and is presently the

first woman Chaplain to the Speaker of the House of Commons. She spoke about women's role in the church. She reminded us we all have gifts that make up the 'one body of many parts'. We were advised to listen to God and what he calls us to do, whether menial or magnificent, and to bloom where we are planted, and to pray for wisdom to know what that is.

At lunch I sat with Beaulah, a Catholic lady from Woking. She was highly intelligent and eager, but frustrated by 'putdowns' and lack of opportunity within her own church and the negative attitude of her priest. She had found the information on the internet and came to find out more. She talked about how she could branch out – I hope she succeeds.

After lunch, Katei, of Antiguan descent, spoke about women in leadership in the family. She used insights from four Biblical women who were in the right place at the right time in their families: the widow at Zarephath, the Samarian woman, Esther, and Elizabeth mother of John. None had straightforward lives but each had faith for hope and expectation – as we have too.

Then Cham spoke, an Asian minister in the Baptist Church, talking about women in the community. She suggested we sometimes need to cross boundaries and go out of our comfort zone in order to build bridges. As someone from a Sikh background, she emphasised how important it was for all to live in harmony as children of God – tough advice in our mixed society.

Grace was the final speaker, talking about women in the workplace. What she said incorporated something from all the other four speakers. She encouraged listeners to have the confidence 'to step out of the boat and walk on water', to have a purpose and be our own person.

It was all stimulating stuff! It was not about being militant feminists, but encouraging women to make the most of themselves in whatever situation.

My last chat of the day was with a lady (I didn't find out her name) who caught up with me on the concourse of Victoria Station. As the world and his wife milled around us, she spoke with such delight about the day and how lucky we were to have such able people to arrange it and invite quality speakers to take part. And I agree whole-heartedly!

The next meeting is on 19th Nove<sup>27</sup>ber. Join me – I would appreciate company.

### **Merry's Musings**

Since LMC and Leatherhead URC have been working together more closely, we have borrowed from Christ Church the idea of individuals' weekly news items whereby in the early stages of the Sunday morning service, the minister or substitute will wander amongst the congregation with microphone in hand and invite any person to tell of any family news which might be of interest.

For me, June had been an exceptionally eventful month, with a wedding, a funeral, a move involving a Worsfold family moving from Surrey to Dorset, six birthdays, a new Worsfold baby born named Matthew who was responsible for my promotion to great granddad, and finally my son Robin's retirement celebration. All of this required two week-end trips to Dorset. I had not related my family news before on a Sunday morning so I thought - now is the time, but I must restrict my comments to the last event.

Robin and Mary attended Sunday School in the 1960s at LMC. Rob joined the Youth Club in its heyday; later he married into an Anglican family and has worshipped in that community during his lifetime since.

Robin has been teaching at St Joseph's Catholic Primary School for the last 28 years and will be retiring in a few days' time. The School organised a Celebration Party on Friday 24th June to which I received a personal invitation.

Proceedings began at 7.00 with a Mass at St Joseph's Church, Christchurch, adjacent to the new two-year old Hall. The opening hymn was "Shine Jesus, Shine" - happily familiar, then Communion followed and I went with Rob to the row of communicants at the front and stood with arms crossed on our chest to indicate that we would not be taking the elements, and the priest gave his blessing as he passed. The service continued with readings by two of the school governors who had been one-time pupils in Robin's class.

The mass ended and we walked through to the Church Hall for the supper and final fun and ceremonies; about two hundred people including many children had assembled for the two events of the evening. Robin's previous head teacher made a long speech and Rob was presented with the Bishop's Medal, awarded for outstanding fidelity and service in the Diocese. I was moved by the friendship and fellowship of the Catholic community. It was a great joy to me that Robin's years at St Joseph's School had been so happily and successfully celebrated.

The essence of what I have just written is what I wanted to say in my church family news on 3rd July, but of course it had to be much condensed for that occasion, to about twenty lines actually. The usual response is about two or three sentences. After the service that morning three people suggested that I might put it in the Link so here it is.

To me, the undercurrent of ecumenism was an important factor in the whole event of Robin's retirement celebration. This is what persuaded me to pass on this story.

### Immediate future for Christ Church

This is a shortened version of the report I gave to church meeting on 26th June.

Following on the experience of the Awayday and the decision not to accept the proposal from 'One Church 100 Uses', the following were put forward as objectives:

- 1. Keep positive over changes and make the best of them.
- 2. Organise to reflect priorities and resources. Look at possibility of shared governance with LMC.
- 3. Be aware of possible developments regarding buildings, but don't get hung up on problems. Keep buildings in good order.
- 4. Support our fellow churches in the Covenant, CTL and the Five Church grouping. Learn from each other.
- 5. Give maximum support to minister and elders. Produce succession plan and think about elders' election in November.
- 6. Be aware of our identity, and make sure our voice is heard.

#### News around the churches

Epsom Church is engaged in a discussion with the Borough Council about a major redevelopment in which they are situated. The redevelopment would include "a place of worship", which may reflect the fact that Epsom URC have already had a plan approved, which they have put on hold. Their plans also include Ewell URC, with whom they share worship.

Bookham URC has changed its name to Eastwick Road Church. The reasons are interesting. They say it is to make it easier for people to find them, and not to be put off by wondering what United Reformed means.

When we were asked to take over the running of the Traidcraft stall from Betty and Philip Moss back in the day, we had to collect the goods from the supplier in Chessington, usually on the Friday preceding the Sunday service and, after church, take the unsold goods and resultant cash back to Chessington. Quite a round trip!

With the untimely death of Sue, our Traidcraft supplier who was a member of her local Methodist Church in Chessington, Christ Church had to find an alternative provider if we wanted to continue to support Traidcraft.

In September 2006 Sheila Hill who, with her husband Graham, runs the Traidcraft stall at St Mary's Church in Fetcham, agreed to become our supplier; soon after, some of you may remember that Sheila gave us some useful background information on how Traidcraft operates, together with an eloquent appeal for our support, at one of our morning services.

Fortunately for us, we now have a much shorter round trip to collect and return the goods; and we now count the "take" and give Sheila a cheque made out to St Mary's Fair Traders. So this is how we can now tell you that since that fateful day in 2006, Christ Church members and friends – including visiting lay preachers and ministers – have bought a variety of goods for the princely sum of £4,344.39. This averages out at around £79 per month which, although showing a drop from the heady days from 2006 to the middle of 2008 when the average was over £91 a month, it is still a good response from a smaller congregation and, we must say, due in no small measure to the splendid support given by one very industrious cake maker extraordinaire! If you want to buy mixed fruit, raisins and the like, you have to beat Jaqui Ball to the draw!!

Thank you for supporting us, whatever you buy: that odd bar of naughty milk chocolate, sweets for the grandchildren, your coffee fix, crunchy biscuits, hand-made cards, juicy dates (pitted!), garden gloves ... whatever. It all helps.
