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The Ministers Write...

From Rev. Kim Plumpton

Dear friends,

Col and I went on holiday with my whole family in August just for a week. Ilfracombe in Devon became our final destination with a large house all to ourselves, which catered well for all 16 of us. We had a fabulous time but it seemed that every time we went to the beach (just three times) it was filled with some kind of drama. A trip to hospital with Joel after rock climbing was a bit unfortunate to say the least, as the day before he had the displeasure of standing on a weaver fish and had to attend the lifeguard station.

Our final trip down to the harbour was no less eventful having booked a journey around the coast the day before. As we travelled around the headland, well over half an hour into our journey we found a man floundering in the water. His little Yorkshire Terrier was shivering and shaking standing on an upturned Kayak. The man explained that a huge wave had knocked him over. He tried to save the dog first, by which time he was exhausted. Not a young man at all and his energy had all but left him by the time we showed up. The trip was cut short for obvious reasons as we turned around to take him back to shore, wrapped in lots of blankets. He thanked everyone for their help and thankfully looked no worse for the ordeal. The dog? Almost smothered by loving hands, (my children, no one else got a look in). The dog too seemed to recover well.

It is not until you make the journey back to the harbour that you notice the full beauty of 'Verity' standing over 67ft tall at the entrance. The statue was created by Damien Hirst and installed in 2012; like much of his work it received mixed reviews. No photograph can possibly do it justice but you cannot avoid its awesome presence at 67ft tall. It's almost unavoidable whether in disdain or admiration to share in a conversation.

Somehow you feel compelled to do so. Why? Because one half of the statue remains untouched, a young pregnant woman, but the other half is raw and open, skin peeled back showing the inner workings of the body.

Holding a sword in the air, Verity shields the scales of justice behind her back and stands upon a host of Law books. I was intrigued by the statue, it was almost hypnotic, what was Damien Hirst trying to convey to us?

Yet it seemed to me that in this very moment, coming back from what was a difficult journey especially for this man and his dog (we were merely onlookers



caught up in his story), I imagined what Verity might say about life and all its possibilities on the shore we were about to land upon. Hirst describes his work as a "modern allegory of truth and justice". The sword has the capacity to protect or destroy and the hidden scales show the inequality that still exists for many. The statue shows the possibility of beauty and the hidden depths of vulnerability.

The ways of God seem to me to speak a great deal about making ourselves vulnerable, raw and open to his ways more than our own. It is not a comfortable place yet it is a place of necessity. This is where we grow. Verity speaks about new life. I wonder in what way we may need to bring to birth new things within our churches and in what ways we may need to make ourselves vulnerable to be able to do so. As I look at Verity, I am reminded of 'The sword of the Spirit' spoken about in Ephesians 6 as the guiding light amongst our vulnerability, honing and refining our lives daily.

The strength and power of God stands well over 67ft tall, it is beyond measure and has the capacity to transform us from objects of brokenness into a people of great beauty. In each of our churches let's make ourselves open and vulnerable to God and see where he takes us!

The Ride & Stride 13th September 2014

Most counties in England hold an annual Ride & Stride, on the second Saturday in September, to raise money for the restoration and repair of buildings for Christian worship.

The idea is that cyclists and walkers are given a list of churches and chapels in the area of their choice. They map out their own route to pedal or walk having asked their friends to reward their efforts.

The money collected is divided into two. Half the monies go to the church or chapel of the cyclist's or walker's choice - probably your own - the other half is retained by the Surrey Churches Preservation Trust for distribution to churches in need. In the dozen years that the Bike Ride (now Ride & Stride) has been running in Surrey over £250,000 has been raised.

The umbrella organisation for our county is the Surrey Churches Preservation Trust whose trustees are from most Christian denominations. Grants are given out twice a year for deserving applications.

Encouragement to take part in Ride & Stride is provided by the SCPT County Organiser and distributed by Area Organisers to individual churches and chapels across Surrey. The Area Organisers support the Church Organisers by providing them with all the necessary paperwork and any guidance they need.

Ride & Stride is a fun way to spend time on a pleasant September Saturday while at the same time supporting a worthy cause. Why not make up a group and join in this year!

Supporters who prefer not to 'ride or stride', please consider sponsoring volunteers involved in this important event.

Organ donation and Christianity



Jesus taught people to love one another, and to embrace the needs of others. Organ donation can be considered by Christians as a genuine act of love.

The Joint Public Issues Team (JPIT) of the Methodist Church in Britain, the Baptist Union of Great Britain and the United Reformed Church has just produced a free resource on the ethics of organ donation ahead of a change in the law from December 2015, when "presumed consent" will become legal in Wales, and those against must opt-out. This free guide "Sharing the gift of life?" can be downloaded:

www.jointpublicissues.org.uk

It includes arguments, concerns and issues around organ donation, the rights and concerns of patients, personal experiences, as well as a discussion on whether there is a distinctly Christian way of seeing the body. People are invited to use it for personal reflection or to support a group discussion.

Many lives have been transformed by heart, lung, liver or combined heart/lungs, liver/kidney or liver/pancreas transplant, or sight restored through a cornea transplant. Around 1,000 people a year (almost three a day) will die waiting as there are not enough organs available. **Fleshandblood.org** website is a church campaign to encourage everyone to become a donor.

Dear Friends,

In the last few days of my sabbatical I went to the Globe theatre in London to see Shakespeare's "Julius Caesar". During the play the title character is assassinated by several Romans, including one of his closest friends, Brutus. Apparently Caesar's dying words, "Et tu, Brute?" (loosely translated as "you as well, Brutus?"), whilst not historically accurate, was already widely known long before Shakespeare included it in his play.

Brutus had reasons for helping to kill someone he loved dearly. To me they seemed to be pretty poor reasons, but they were enough, within the context of a play, to convince Brutus that Caesar had to die. What it boils down to is this: Brutus (and the other conspirators) did not want Rome to be governed by one man.

It was only later in history that Rome gained an emperor. At this point Caesar was simply a popular figure whose influence had begun to overshadow other Roman politicians. The justification for getting rid of him was based on the principle that the government of Rome should not be in the hands of a lone individual.

It seems to me that this is also an important principle for the local church or circuit. Though don't worry – I'm not prepared to go to the lengths of murder to enforce the principle! It isn't healthy for a church to reach the point where everything depends on one person.

In our recent Bible Study at London Road we were looking at Acts 17. Paul and his companions faced opposition in Thessalonica and then in Berea. He had to move on. Yet the communities of believers he founded continued to flourish without him. In Acts 17:14 it is the Christian community itself which recognises the dangers to Paul and sends him on his way. It's as if they are saying "Thank you for bringing the gospel to us, but we'll take it from here. You are in danger if you stay. Don't worry, we'll cope without you." Paul was a highly influential figure for many local churches, but they didn't fall apart in his absence. (continued on the back page)

- 1. Dave Banko was re-elected chairman for the coming year, as were Anne Thomson secretary and Cathy Noble treasurer.
- It has been decided not to produce Christmas cards for 2014. A group will look at alternative methods of contacting the public. Suggestions were a flyer in the local press and a Christmas tree in the town centre inviting people to provide gifts.



Our Planet from the Air

On 23rd July there was a very good programme on BBC4 called "Our Planet from the Air". It was an excellent statement of the environmental problems caused by our modern way of life. Some of the readers of this magazine may have seen it. For those who didn't I am reproducing here the sub-titles which are displayed towards the end of the film to give you an idea of what it was about:

- 20% of the world's population consumes 80% of its resources;
- The world spends 12 times more on military expenditure than on aid to developing countries;
- 5,000 people a day die because of dirty drinking water –
 1 billion people have no access to safe drinking water;
- Nearly 1 billion people are going hungry;
- Over 50% of grain traded around the world is used for animal feed or biofuels;
- 40% of arable land has suffered long-term damage;
- Every year 13 million hectares of forest disappear;
- One mammal in 4, one bird in 8, one amphibian in 3 are threatened with extinction – species are dying out at a rhythm 1,000 times faster than the natural rate;
- Three quarters of fishing grounds are exhausted, depleted or in dangerous decline;
- The average temperatures of the last 15 years have been the highest ever recorded;
- The ice cap is 40% thinner than 40 years ago;
- There may be at least 200 million climate refugees by 2050;

The full description of the film is as follows:

"Featuring stunning aerial footage from 54 countries, this film from acclaimed aerial photographer Yann Arthus-Bertrand and ecology-minded French director Luc Besson reveals the beauty and fragility of our planet as never before.

Scientists tell us that we must change the way we live to avert the eventual depletion of natural resources and the catastrophic evolution of the earth's climate. The film delivers alarming statistics about climate change and how quickly human beings are transforming our beautiful planet into a place that could eventually be uninhabitable.

Along with enthralling images, this is a depiction of how Earth's problems are all interlinked, through an extraordinary aerial portrait."




Surrey Churches Preservation Trust The Ride & Stride

Five Churches Step Up for the Challenge

I thought you'd be interested in what we heard at the June meeting of the Surrey & Sussex Synod.

The meeting began with brief devotions, followed by a welcome to Lynda, who had to go up to the front and be clapped!

The main item was reports from five churches, which had been invited to describe the ways they were working for or with their communities.

East Grinstead URC work with their Churches Together to run a variety of community projects. They have a Justice and Peace Group in which all the local churches take part.

Brighthelm URC is keen on caring for the environment as well as their local community. They have a community centre, a church and a garden. The garden is tended by a group of local people, which interested Anne Cairns, who cares for our garden!

Pulborough URC has a passion for justice, which they channel into Fairtrade activities. Not only their village but also their primary school has Fairtrade status and they are aiming to achieve Fairtrade West Sussex next.

Crawley runs a project called Kairos. They have screened a film, "The Stones Cry Out", showing how the Palestinians are treated; they are campaigning for justice. They are strongly supported by the local Catholic Justice and Peace Group. Crawley also hosts a Tuesday evening drop-in prayer time for commuters on their way home from the station.

Reigate Park with two other churches provides food and accommodation in their buildings for rough sleepers during the coldest winter months. The churches provide volunteers for each of three shifts, which cover the evening meal, the sleepover and the breakfast. Guests and volunteers eat together round the table.

The business part of the meeting followed.

Finally, we were all asked to pray for the General Assembly, 3rd - 6th July, at which some important issues would be discussed, including same-sex marriage. (The outcome was that the 300 delegates were unable to achieve consensus on permitting same-sex weddings in URC churches, although there was broad support; we will continue to seek the mind of Christ on this issue).

Notes from the Church Meeting held at Christ Church on Sunday 27th July 2014

The Meeting was chaired by Rev. Lynda Russell with 20 members present.

- News of Members was shared.
- The weekly service sheet is still needed and the LMC format would be considered.
- Cards for visitors to sign should be reintroduced.

- The calendar had been circulated.
- Harvest Supper on Saturday 27th September will be 6.00pm
 -8.30pm in aid of the joint project.
- The joint project supported by Christ Church and LMC is "Heart of Romania". A number of fund raising events for the project are to take place:
 - Mike Essex is organising a Quiz Night on Saturday 8th November in Christ Church Hall. In order to make a success of this event about 100 people will need to attend.
 - 2. Anthony Cairns is organising a concert during October.
 - On 26th October at the Joint Service at Christ Church there will be a speaker from the charity at the Sunday morning service making a presentation followed by a Bring and Share lunch.
- Lets Praise Song Books borrowed from LMC are to be tried out.
- Anne Cairns asked for volunteers to welcome cyclists at the church on 13th September.
- The Working Groups have met. The Mission Group met on 26th July with Martin Heywood, Mission Officer for the URC Southern Synod to discuss the formation of our Mission Plan. The Finance Group are looking at five or six options for the buildings but these could not be implemented until a Mission Plan is in place.
- Although £2000 was collected in Leatherhead for Christian Aid this year, many of Christ Church collectors felt unable to offer their services next year. It is hoped that we will be able to make up the revenue in some other way.

- Anne Cairns requires a deputy to take on some of her responsibilities around the building and take over at times when she is away.
- Pitstop has been given permission to continue using our premises until the end of the year.


